04. Vice-Chancellor's Review - 2015

a. Brief Introduction

The University of Kelaniya, Sri Lanka, has its origin in the historic Vidyalankara Pirivena, founded in 1875 as a centre of higher learning for Buddhist clergy. It was one of the two great national centers of traditional higher learning, heralding the first phase of the national movement and national resurgence of independence. With the establishment of modern Universities in Sri Lanka, the Vidyalankara Pirivena became the Vidyalankara University of Ceylon in 1959, the Vidyalankara Campus of the University of Sri Lanka in 1972, and the University of Kelaniya, Sri Lanka in 1978.

Today, the University of Kelaniya, Sri Lanka, is one of the major national Universities in the country. It is located outside the municipal limits of Colombo, in the ancient and historic city of Kelaniya, associated with the legends of King Kelanitissa and his daughter, Vihara Maha Devi. The campus is located on the Kandy Road, twelve kilometers from the capital city. It has seven faculties as listed below:

- Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies (Annex I)
- > Faculty of Graduate Studies (Annex II)
- Faculty of Humanities (Annex III)
- Faculty of Medicine (Annex IV)
- Faculty of Science (Annex V)
- > Faculty of Social Sciences (Annex VI)
- > Faculty of Computing and Technology

The most recent one of these faculties is the Faculty of Computing and Technology, which was established on 30th December 2015 by the Special Gazette No. 1947/24. The new faculty consists of three academic departments namely; Department of Software Engineering, Department of Computer Systems Engineering and Department of Applied Computing.

While the Faculty of Medicine is located at Ragama, in a land area of 35 acres, the other Faculties are located at Dalugama in a land area of 55 acres. Centre for Distance and Continuing Education is located in Kiribathgoda.

The main buildings in Dalugama premises are the Student Centre, Science Block, Humanities and Social Sciences Building Complex, Commerce and Management Studies Building Complex, Science Lecture Theatre Complex, Auditorium and Ancillary Building, Sri Dharmaloka Convocation Hall, Aquaculture and Microbiology Buildings, ICT Centre, the Library, and the Administrative Block. Sri

Dharmaloka Convocation Hall has a seating capacity of 1000, while the Science Faculty Auditorium and Professor Sunil Shantha Memorial auditorium of the Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies can accommodate 250 & 300 persons respectively.

In terms of housing, the Bhikku Hostel and the Women's Hostel Complex are located within the Dalugama campus, while the Men's Hostels and some Women's Hostels are located nearby. In providing IT facilities, in addition to the main ICT Centre, each Faculty possesses well equipped ICT Centre s which are managed either by the faculty or by the department. In facilitating learning, research and development Wi-Fi facility has been expanded to cover the entire University and the hostels. Three language laboratories are located at the Faculty of Humanities. All departments of the Faculty of Science and Faculty of Commerce & Management Studies consist of research laboratories in addition to classroom facilities.

At Ragama, the buildings include the Administration Block, Lecture Theatre and Laboratory Complex, Disabilities Studies Unit Building, Molecular Medicine Unit building, Pre-clinical Building Complex, Auditorium with a seating capacity of 200 and men's and Women's hostels.

The total number of postgraduate students enrolled during 2015 was 4104. The international recognition of the university was enhanced by the enrolment of 97 international students to the university in 2015.

The General Convocation of the university was held in 06 sessions during the year 2015, where 2120 internal graduates and 5984 external graduates were conferred degrees. The Postgraduate output of the year 2015 was 1877.

b. Achievements

- The seventh faculty of the University of Kelaniya, the Faculty of Computing and Technology was established on 30th December 2015.
- According to the Webometrix ranking, the University of Kelaniya was ranked 2815 among all the universities in the world.
- ➤ 27 staff members of the University of Kelaniya received Presidential Awards for research publications in 2014.
- ➤ 62 researchers of the University of Kelaniya have been ranked among the top 400 Sri Lankan scientists based on their Google Scholar citation profiles.

- The university has taken a decision to release examination results within one month and to issue the degree certificates soon after the examination results are released.
- The free Wi-Fi facility is provided to cover the entire university and students' hostels. The University of Kelaniya is the first university which provided Wi-Fi facility to cover the entire university. Staff members and students were provided opportunity to access research Journals through a Virtual Private Network (VPN) facility.
- Insurance scheme for all academic and non-academic staff members, student welfare fund and special welfare fund were introduced to enhance the student and staff welfare.

Several academic symposia helped to enhance the research culture of the university in 2015. The 16th Annual Research Symposium (International Postgraduate Research Conference 2015) organized by the Faculty of Graduate Studies was held on 10th and 11th December 2015, on the theme of "Emerging Concepts in Multidisciplinary Research". More than 400 abstracts were received for presentation on issues and emerging concepts in all disciplines and the role they play in scientific, economic, social and cultural development. In addition to that there were 14 Research Conferences and Symposia as well as 6 students' symposia organized by the faculties and academic departments to inculcate research culture within the university.

Senate Honors were presented to 58 academic staff members in the year 2015 for publishing research papers in peer reviewed indexed journals in order to further strengthen the research culture in the university.

The Intra-University Best Speaker Contest, Art Exhibitions, Fish Exhibition, Photography exhibitions, Media Festivals, Talent shows, Colors Awarding Ceremony, Tree Plantation Programmes, Career Fair 2015, Stylish Marketer fashion show, Pindapatha Dana Pinkama, Welfare Projects and workshops were some of the extra-curricular programs conducted in 2015. Students from every faculty participated in national and international games and competitions held during the year, and won several national and international awards, bringing honor to the University.

Film and drama festivals, musical shows, art exhibitions and international cultural shows are some of the cultural activities which were carried out in the University in 2015. These activities, which were organized by the students and academic departments, helped to enhance social harmony within the university, while improving the talents of the students.

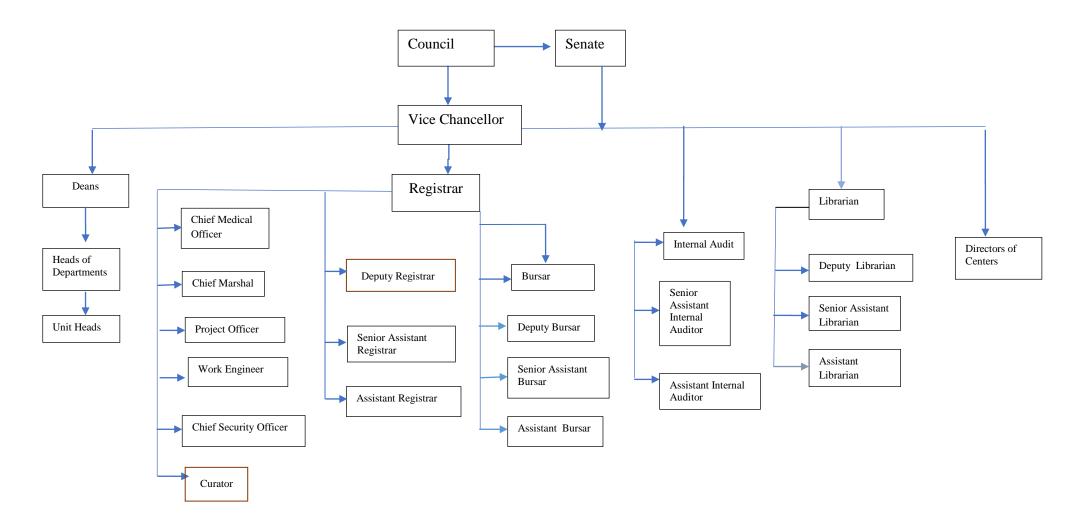
c. Future Plans

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Significant Accounting Policies

1.1 General Policies

1.1.1 Reporting Entity

University of Kelaniya was incorporated under the University Act No. 16 of 1978, and situated at Dalugama, Kelaniya.

1.1.2 Principal Activities and Nature of Operations

This is a national university mainly operates on government funds.

The university primarily caters to local students in the fields of Humanities, Social Sciences, Sciences, Medicine, and Commerce& Management.

The university is promoting higher studies and research.

1.1.3 Basis of Preparation

(a) Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statements of Changes in Net Assets / Equity, Cash Flow Statement and Notes to the Financial Statements. These statements have been prepared in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and adopted by the University Grants Commission by its Financial Circular Letter No. 3/2011 & 3/2014. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those used in the previous financial year

(b) Basis of Measurement

Financial statements have been prepared on historical costs basis and do not take into account changes in money values, except where it is stated. Cost is based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

(c) Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

(d) Going Concern

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

(d) Use of Estimates and Judgments

The preparation and presentation of financial statements in conformity with SLPSAS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates and judgmental decisions.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects on that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

1.2 Assets and the Bases of Their Valuation

1.2.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

(a) Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant & Equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of Property, Plant & Equipment is the cost of purchase or construction together with any incidental expenses thereon.

(b) Cos

The cost of property, plant & equipment comprises its purchase or construction cost and any directly contributable cost of bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use.

(c) Depreciation

Depreciation is charged to the income statement on the straight line basis at the following rates per annum in order to write off the cost of such assets over their estimated useful lives.

Depreciation is provided on pro rata basis on the assets purchased/constructed/disposed of during the year.

(d) Revaluation of the Property, Plant & Equipments

The Lands, Buildings and Motor Vehicles of the University have been revalued and recognized to the accounts with effect from 01st January 2008.

Revaluation Surplus may be transferred to the general reserve proportionately as the assets are used by the university. In such a case, the amount of the surplus transferred would be the difference between depreciation based on the revalued carrying amount of the assets and depreciation based on the assets' original cost.

1.2.2 Intangible Assets

(a) Computer Software

Basis of Recognition

An intangible asset is recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the University and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably.

ii. Subsequent Expenditure

Subsequent expenditure on software assets is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates. All other expenditure is expensed as incurred.

iil. Amortization

Amortization is recognized in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the software, from the date that it is available for use since this most closely reflects the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset.

The estimated useful life of software is five years.

iv. De-recognition

An intangible asset is derecognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from it. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition of such intangible assets is included in profit or loss when the item is derecognized.

1.2.3 Inventories

Inventories are valued at cost based on FIFO basis.

1.2.4 Receivables

Receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize.

1.2.5 Short term investments

(a) Investment in Government Securities

Investments in treasury bills, treasury bonds and repurchase agreements are stated at cost.

(b) Investment in Fixed Deposits

Investments in fixed deposits are stated at cost.

1.2.6 Cash & Cash Equivalents

Cash & cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and deposits at Bank.

1.3 Liabilities & Provisions

All known liabilities as at the balance sheet date are included in the Financial Statements and adequate provisions are made for liabilities which are known to exist but the amount of which cannot be determined accurately.

Obligations payable on demand or within one year of the balance sheet date are treated as current liabilities in the balance sheet. Liabilities payable after one year from the balance sheet date are treated as non-current liabilities in the balance sheet.

1.3.1 Accounting for Grants

Grants that compensate the University for Expenses incurred are recognized as revenue in the income statement in the same period in which the expenses are recognized. Grants that compensate the University for the Cost of an asset are recognized in the income statement on a systematic basis over the useful life of the related asset.

1.3.2 Employee Benefit

(a) Provision for Retiring Gratuity

The university has adopted the benefit plan as required under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983 for all eligible employees.

Defined benefit plans define an amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement usually dependent on one or more factors such as age, years of service and compensation.

The liability recognized in the balance sheet in respect of defined benefit plans is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the balance sheet date together with adjustment for unrecognized past service cost.

As per provisions of the Employee Gratuity Payment Act, provisions for gratuity should be made and deposited annually in the relevant gratuity account and payment should be made promptly to employees when they become eligible which specified in the paragraph No. 3.5 of the Public Finance Circular No. 02/2013 (issued on 13.09.2013).

Establishment of Internal Fund equal to the amount of the Gratuity Provisions and invest the same.

(b) Defined Contribution Plan

Obligations for contribution to a defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the income statement as incurred

1.3.3 Taxation

The university is exempt from Income Tax under Section 7(b) of the Inland Revenue Act No. 10 of 2006.

1.3.4 Deferred Taxation

Provision has not been made for deferred tax as the university is exempted from Income Tax under Section 7(b) of the Inland Revenue Act No. 10 of 2006.

1.3.5 Capital Commitments and Contingent Liabilities

All material commitments and contingent liabilities are considered and where necessary adjustments or disclosures are made in these Financial Statements.

1.4 income Statement

1.4.1 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the university and that it can be reliably measured.

- (a) Enrolment fees from students are recognized as revenue on receipt.
- (b) Fees on examinations, seminars, courses and other educational and activities are recognized as revenue on completion of such activity.
- The fees on fee-levying courses recognized to the income statement based on the stage of completion of each course as at the year end. Lecture fees and payments that relate to future periods are shown in the balance sheet as Income Received in Advance under the Reserve & Restricted Funds.
- (d) Interest income is recognized on accrual basis.

- (e) Revenue from grants is recognized when control of the contribution or right to receive the contribution is confirmed.
- (f) Sponsorship related activities are recognized on receipt.
- (g) Other income is recognized on accrual basis.

1.4.2 Expenditure

- (a) Expenses are recognized in the income statement on the basis of direct association between cost incurred and the earning of specific items of the income. All expenditure incurred in the running of the university and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.
- (b) Expenses on examinations, seminars, courses and other educational activities are recognized in the income statement on completion of such activity.

1.5 Comparative Information

The Comparative figures have been re-arranged where necessary to conform to the current year's presentation.

1.6 Events After the Balance Sheet Date

The materiality of events occurring after the balance sheet date has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the accounts.

1.7 Cash Flow Statement

The Cash Flow Statement has been prepared using the indirect method.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ended 31 December 2015 in terms of Section 108 (1) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978.

The audit of financial statements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ended 31 December 2015 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2015 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in funds and cash flow statement and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Subsection 107(5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Subsection 108(1) of the Universities Act appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Subsection 108(2) of the Universities Act, was issued to the Vice Chancellor of the University on 24 May 2016.

1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Auditing Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000-1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Section 111 of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978 give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2:2 of this report.

2. Financial Statements

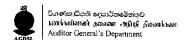
2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except of the matters described in paragraph 2:2 of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Kelaniya as at 31 December 2015 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements.

2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07

Although revaluation is required in case the fair value of Property, Plant and Equipment deviates from its carrying amount, action had not been taken after the year 2009 to revalue and account the fair value of the lands legally owned by the University shown a sum of Rs. 654,759,142 as cost as at 31 December 2015.



2.2.2 Non - Disclose of Transactions with related Parties

A Senior Lecturer of the Department of Industrial Management of the University officiated as a member of the Board of Directors of the "Lanka Education and Research Network (LEARN) Company" incorporated under the Companies Act, No. 07 of 2007, and the University had obtained internet facilities from that company. This had not been disclosed in the financial statements.

2.2.3 Accounting Deficiencies

A sum of Rs. 1,627,334 directly credited to 02 bank accounts during the year under review had been accounted as an amount payable without identifying the nature and the period of the transaction

2.2.4 Unexplained Differences

According to the financial statements, the balance of the employee loans and advances amounted to Rs. 4,822,092 as at 31 December of the year under review, whereas it amounted to Rs. 4,943,292 as per schedules. Hence, a net difference of Rs. 121,200 was observed.

2.3 Accounts Payable

The following observations are made.

- (a) Withholding tax amounting to Rs. 252,214 had been retained in the accounts over a period of more than 02 years without being remitted to the Commissioner General of Inland Revenue.
- (b) Action had not been taken to settle retention money of Rs. 3,327,691 in connection with contracts completed during the period from the year 2006 to 2010.

Non-compliances with Laws, Rules, Regulations, and Management Decisions

However, advances totalling Rs. 727,844 granted to 06 officers for international conferences in the year 2007 and the year under review, capital advances amounting to Rs. 3,500,000 granted to 03 officers for PhD researches during the year under review had not been settled even by 31 May 2016.

Section 3(1) of Chapter A sum of Rs. 1,137,569,476 had been paid as salaries and XX and Section 1.6.1 of allowances during the year under review without verifying the attendance and leave of the academic staff.

- Contrary to the referenced Circular, 8 per cent to 20 per cent of the salaries of the staff officers totalling Rs. 1,841,209 had been paid during the year under review for entertainment based on the Circular letters of the University Grants Commission. Despite being paid in such a manner, a sum totalling Rs. 1,656,057 had also been paid from the University Fund for offices and common entertainment activities.
- (ii) Benefits, specifically approved by the Cabinet, Ministry of Public Administration, or the Treasury can be paid on the approval of the Council. However, on the approval of the Council, an incentive of Rs. 100,000 had been paid during the year under review to a probationary lecturer of the Department of Economics for completing the 02 year Post Graduate Degree within a period of 03 years since the date of appointment.

Although a survey on library books had last been conducted in the year 2012, the report had not been prepared and furnished even up to 31 May 2016 the date of audit.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the Financial Statements presented, the operating result of the University for the year ended 31 December 2015, had been a surplus of Rs. 474, 804,754 as compared with the corresponding surplus of Rs. 122,261,416 in the preceding year. The surplus of the year under review had increased by a sum of Rs. 352,543,338 as compared with the preceding year. The increase in the income from the external examinations, and the fee-levying courses by sums of Rs. 259,259,930, and Rs. 37,866,698 respectively, and the decrease in

other recurrent expenditures by a sum of Rs. 46,077,661 had specifically attributed to the improvement.

3.2 Contribution

The following observations are made.

- (a) Analysis of the financial results of the 04 preceding years with the year under review revealed a continuous surplus up to the year 2015. Considering the employee remuneration, Government taxes and the depreciation for non-current assets, the contribution of the University had shown a continuous improvement from the year 2012 to 2015. However, the contribution in the year 2014 had decreased by 70 per cent as compared with the year 2013. The contribution had again improved by 800 per cent in the year 2015.
- (b) Matters such as, increase in the income from the external examinations by 113 per cent, increase in the income from the fee-levying courses by 25 per cent during the year under review, and the increase in the fees charged for extension of time, had attributed to the improvement of the contribution during the year under review as compared with the preceding year. Increase of the course fees, and the increase of student enrolments by 10,000 in the year 2015 had attributed to the increase in the income from the external courses

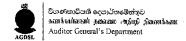
Operating Review

4.1 Performance

The following observations are made.

(a) Academic performance

The number of students enrolled for the Faculty of Medicine in the academic year 2005/2006 was 198, and after a gradual decrease, only 168 students had been enrolled for the academic year 2014/2015. Accordingly, the percentage of enrolments had dropped by around 15 per cent, and action had not been taken to enroll a maximum number of local students by utilizing the available resources.



(b) Progress of the Researches

- (i) It is an important task to implement the research projects carried out by the University lecturers. The Research Committee of the University had approved 26 research projects for the year 2015, and a sum of Rs. 6,685,000 had been allocated in that connection. Audit observations in this regard are given below.
 - Although 21 of the approved projects had been commenced, only Rs. 1,659,526 of the allocated sum amounting to Rs. 5,490,000 representing 30 per cent had been incurred.
 - Of the 21 projects in progress, progress reports relating only to 11 of them had been furnished.
- (ii) A sum of Rs. 105,000,000 had been allocated for research allowances in the year 2015. Without properly evaluating the progress of the researches, the University had paid a sum of Rs. 8,307,951 to 585 lecturers and officers in excess of the provision.
- (iii) The University of Kelaniya retained 3,087th position in the world ranking by December 2015, and it was observed that the ranking climbed up to 2,815th position by May 2016.

4.2 <u>Management Activities</u>

The following observations are made.

- (a) The University had failed to acquire the ownership of 11 plots of land being used by the University over a period of more than 20 years, even up to 30 April 2016.
- (b) Five plots of the land owned by the Government of 32 acres, 05 roods, and 64 perches in extent where the Faculty of Medicine, Ragama had been located and the possession had been held by the University on lease basis, had not been vested in the University properly.

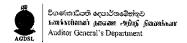
- (c) According to the criterion established by the University for the fee-levying Courses, 10 per cent of the income received from the courses should be credited to the Development Fund of the Faculty. However, a sum of Rs. 23,743,886 in excess of that limit had been credited to the Development Fund. Furthermore, 5 per cent of the income from the courses should be remitted to the Government income, but only 4 per cent had been remitted to the Government revenue during the year under review. Although it had not been approved, 1 per cent of the course income had been credited to the Vice-Chancellors' Fund.
- (d) Two lecturers officiating is Public institutions on sabbatical leave, had been paid the interim allowance of Rs. 10,000 and the 20 per cent additional allowance by both the University and the o2 institutions during the year under review. In addition to the said allowances, the cost of living allowance, and the special allowances of 15 per cent and 05 per cent had also been paid by both institutions to another lecturer. According to the audit examination conducted with respect to the month of December, 2015, sums of Rs. 71,770 and Rs. 71,890 had been paid by the University and the other Public institutions respectively to the 03 lecturers in addition to their salaries. The management had not queried the relevant institutions as to the same allowance being paid twice.

Furthermore, the University had paid sums of Rs. 2,084,656, and Rs. 602,353 as academic and research allowances respectively to the said lecturers who had been on sabbatical leave and not in the university service during the year under review.

4.3 Operating Inefficiencies

The following observations are made.

(a) According to Section 33 of Chapter 10 of the Establishments Code for the University Grants Commission and Institutions of Higher Education, it was observed that a sum of Rs.61,933,498 had remained recoverable as at 31 December 2015 from 19 Lecturers who had breached agreements, and 14 of them were probationary lecturers. It was observed that the University was taking legal actions in connection with a sum of Rs. 5,974,527 recoverable from 3 lecturers, and additional financial costs would be likely to incur in the future in that connection. Although the bond value could be recovered from 48 installments in terms of the Establishments Code for the University Grants Commission and Institutions of Higher Education, it was observed



that long delays of 10-15 years would occur for the recovery as the payment of instalments had been agreed upon in smaller amounts.

(b) The miscellaneous advances amounting to Rs. 250,000 given to a lecturer on 14 December 2012 for a MBA industry visit had not been settled over a period of more than 03 years up to 31 May 2016 the date of audit. Although a disciplinary inquiry had been conducted in that connection, no action had been taken up to 31 May 2016 to recover those advances.

4.4 Weaknesses in Contract Administration

Many defects, including cracks on the walls, and leakages in the sewage system, were observed in the physical verification conducted on 27 April 2016 in connection with the hostel building that had been handed over to the University on 23 February 2015 after completing the construction at a cost of Rs. 219,998,912 under the construction of 60 hostels project in the Ministry of Higher Education. However, action had not been taken to rectify those defects through the contractor within the period of warranty.

4.5 Personnel Administration

Ninety eight and 124 vacancies had existed in the academic staff and the non-academic staff respectively as at 31 December of the year under review. As such, a sum of Rs. 35,369,489 had been paid to the visiting lecturers during the year, and 37 trainees had been recruited on assignment basis and paying daily wages, for the posts in the clerical and allied services in the non-academic staff.

4.6 Underutilization of Funds

The following observations are made.

(a) Although the balance of the Research Grants Fund amounted to Rs. 12,202,459 as at 01 January of the year under review, 86 per cent of that remained idle without being utilized during the year as only a sum of Rs. 1,744,545 was utilized during the year.

Furthermore, a sum of Rs. 38,027,883 had been received from external institutions for 03 external projects carried out by the Faculty of Medicine, whereas the expenditure had totalled Rs. 24,381,516 as at 31 December 2015. As the Faculty of Medicine had not maintained progress reports in that connection, the progress of the projects could not be examined.

(b) Balances of income totalling Rs. 3,664,468 and Rs. 504,687 relating to 12 Reward Funds and 07 Scholarship Funds respectively as at 31 December 2015, had not been utilized for awarding scholarships since 2009.

5. Accountability and Good Governance

5.1 Action Plan

According to the Action Plan, it was expected to carry out 979 activities during the year under review. However, 365 activities had not been carried out, whereas 255 activities were in progress.

5.2 Internal Audit

The Internal Audit Division of the University consisted of 06 officers. In addition to the University of Kelaniya, audits of the affiliated institutions such as, Gampaha Wickramaarachchi Ayurveda Institute, Post-graduate Institute of Archaeology, and Postgraduate Institute of Pali and Buddhist Studies, together with pre - audits on the payment of provident funds, gratuity, pension, and contracts according to the internal audit program, had been assigned to this Division. The Internal Audit Division should be responsible for the Vice-Chancellor of the relevant University and the Director of the relevant institutions.

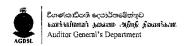
Sixty one per cent of the time of the personnel had been allocated for the pre - audits, whereas 39 per cent had been allocated for other audits. Furthermore, an adequate number of professionally qualified officers had also not been recruited.

5.3 Budgetary Control

As the budget for the year 2015 had been revised on 09 February 2016, it was not possible to satisfy in audit as to whether the budget had been made use of as an effective instrument of management control.

6. Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

21. Audit Committee Report

Composition of the Audit Committee

The Audit Committee of the University, established as a sub-committee responsible for the Council, consists of three non-executive members. The following officers were engaged in audit committee activities in the year 2015.

The members from the Auditor General's Department were also invited to participate as observers.

Meeting

As per Public Enterprises Circular No. P. E. D./31, committee meetings should be held at least four times a year. The Committee met four times in the year under review and the internal and external audit reports were discussed at these meetings. The Committee reports were submitted to the University Council for information and necessary action.

Main Responsibilities

The main objective of the Auditor Committee is to assist the Council for the efficient functions of the financial matters of the University.

The main responsibilities are;

- 1. Review and supervision of the financial statements, financial reporting and the continuation of the audit process.
- 2. Examine any matter related to the finance of the University and other related matters.
- 3. Supervision of the internal audit plan and programme.
- 4. Investigate the external and internal audit reports and take follow up action on recommendations.
- 5. Review and supervision of the effective performance of the internal system controls.
- 6. Approval of the annual internal audit plans and programmes.

Activities within the Year

The Committee was engaged in the following activities within the year under review.

1. Approval and supervision of the annual internal audit plans and programmes.

The Committee approved and supervised the internal audit plan and internal audit programme for the year 2015. The Committee reviewed and supervised the effectiveness of the internal audits, performance of the queries and the performance of the Internal Audit Division.

2. Compliance with the laws and regulations

The compliance with the relevant laws and regulations were reviewed with the reports submitted by the external and internal auditors. The Committee further followed up on the preparation and presentation of the annual accounts reports of the University and the settlement of statutory payments such as gratuity and Provident Funds.

3. Continuous review and supervision on the violation of contracts

The Committee continuously reviewed and supervised the recovery process from the staff members who violated bonds. This enabled the recovery of the complete bond amount from 4 persons and Rs. 5.7 million was recovered in the year under review. The Committee considered the long term re-payment of small amounts of bond values by those who violated bonds and a methodology including the number of installments and the minimum value of an installment was prepared based on the recommendations of the Audit Committee and submitted to the Council dated 12.05.2015 and implemented.

4. Review and strengthening of the internal control system

The recommendations such as acquiring assets, preparing and presentation of final accounts, lending library books, annual fixed asset survey, recovering the unsettled advances and recovering employee loans were proposed in the year under review for the strengthening of the internal control system. The actions taken to correct the weaknesses depicted in the Auditor's Report and Audit Inquiry for the year 2015 was continuously reviewed.

5. Audit Committee Meetings

The Audit Committee meetings were held at four occasions within the year ended as at 31st December 2015. After the tenancy of the Audit Committee members representing the Council at the commencement of the year 2015, three new Council members were appointed for the Audit Committee. A representative from the Auditor General's Department participated at every meeting of the Audit Committee as a supervisor. Other staff members from the University were also invited when required. Senior Assistant Internal Auditor acts as the Secretary of the Committee.

Conclusion

The Committee was satisfied with the success of the follow up activities based on the recommendations on the matters considered by the Committee in the year 2015.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ending 31st December 2015 in terms of the sub-section 108 (1) of the University Act No 16 of 1978.

The following observations as considered by the 443rd Council held on 16th November 2016 in terms of section 108 (1) of the University Act on the report on accounts pertaining to the year ending 31.12.2015 which was forwarded with your above even numbered letter dated 31st August 2016 are submitted herewith.

2. Financial Statements

2.1. Qualified Opinion

Agreed.

2.2 Comments on financial statements

2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Policies

The legal ownership of several lands used by the university has not been transferred to the university yet. As per Sri Lanka Accounting Standards, when an asset is revalued the whole class of that asset has to be revalued and action will be taken in future to revalue after the legal ownership of all the property has been acquired.

2.2.2 Non-Disclosure of Transactions with Related Parties

The said lecturer who was the Director of the Information and Communication Centre of the University in the year 2015, has not held any directorship at the LEARN institute. However, though another lecturer was a member of the Board of Directors of the said institute, such details were not disclosed in the accounts, as he could not influence the administrative matters of the University. However, action will be taken to disclose transactions with related parties from the year 2016.

2.2.3 Accounting Deficiencies

This situation has occurred due to the failure to identify the direct credits to the bank as information on direct credits to the bank are not received. Further, Rs. 92,706.29 out of the unrecognized Rs. 1,627,334 has been recognized and the relevant adjustments have been made by 2016 – E 211 and R 397 journals.

2.2.4 Unexplained Differences

The amount of Rs. 120,000/- out of Rs. 121,200/- as at 31st December 2015 on employee loans and advances were related to vehicle loan and it had been computerized twice in the year 2015. That said fault, Rs. 800/- being the difference of special advances and Rs. 400/- being the special advance deducted from the Provident Fund of Mr. M. R. N. Aberathna, have been settled in the schedules for 2016.

2.3 Accounts Payable

- 2.3 (a) Action is being taken to settle the balance of the withholding tax.
- 2.3 (b) All the other deposits except that should be retained in the 2016 have been adjusted to income by the journal No. 2016 E 190.

a. Non-compliance to Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions

(a) Section 70 of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978.

The certificates courses conducted within the year 2015 have been conducted to add value to create a qualified student generation from the University. These short-term certificate courses are conducted, as students do not get the opportunity to study all these subjects in their degree courses and in order to provide an opportunity for the students to improve their quality of degrees.

By studying these certificate courses, Sinhala medium students are given the opportunity to study Tamil language and Tamil medium students are given the opportunity to study Sinhala language, which is a requirement of the Government, and enhancing their knowledge on computer studies that would increase their employability.

Further, it is shown that these courses are mostly conducted in the weekends without any disturbance to the academic programmes of the undergraduates, and without any deviation from the main objectives of the University, and these courses are conducted as an additional service while fulfilling the responsibilities of the graduate degree courses. At the same time, the UGC Circular 04/2016 has provided guidelines for the implementation of self-financed courses such as these and it has encouraged all the Universities for the maintenance of such courses.

(b) Financial Regulations of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka Financial Regulation 371 (2) (c)

Rs. 200,000/- of the International conferences advances have been settled by the journal E-282 and the relevant sections have been informed to settle other advances and the lecturers who had received PhD advances have gone abroad. Action will be taken to settle them after the bills are produced.

(c) Establishment Code of the University Grants Commission and Institute of Higher Education

As it is with the other universities the arrival, and departure attendance registries and finger-markings of machines are not maintained for the academic staff of this University. However, each Department with respect of the lectures and practical conducted by the academic staff in order to certify the period of such activities, maintain registries signed by lecturers with student participation. The attendance of the academic staff can be verified by such documents. Further salaries and allowances are paid based on the confirmation submitted by Section Heads as to the attendance of the respective staff on the Pay Abstracts of the Staff that are forwarded by Department Heads before salary is paid in each month.

(d) Public Enterprises Circular No. 95 dated 14 June 1994

i. Action had been taken as per the UGC Circular No. 06/2014 dated 26th March 2016 and UGC Circular No. 06/2014 (I) dated 24th July 2014. At the same time, expenses for the entertainment activities will have to be borne as common meetings with the Council, Senate, Department Heads, unions, students and the staff has to be conducted.

ii. This incentive has been paid as per the approval of the Council No. 414 held on May 2014 as an incentive to obtain the post-graduate qualification of the academic and administrative staff of the

University so that a more qualified and efficient service can be obtained from them.

(e) Public Enterprises Circular No. 12 dated 02 June 2003

Survey on library books was commenced in June 2012 which had been a long-term requirement. The final report was submitted on 10th November 2016 even with a slight delay, due to the conduct of an investigation to collect information on the existing books of the library, as a formal survey of this kind had not been conducted since the inception of the library.

24,467 students were registered for the academic year 2011 and 27,705 students were registered for the combined academic year 2012/2013 and accordingly, the excess number of students registered for the academic year 2012/2013 as compared to the academic year 2011 was only 3,238. Therefore, the phrase "the increase of student enrolment by 10,000" in paragraph 3.2 (b) has to be corrected as "student enrolment by 3,238".

4. Operating Review

4.1 <u>Performance</u>

4.1 (a) Academic Performances

Though 198 medical students were enrolled in the academic year 2005/2006 and only 168 medical students were enrolled in the academic year 2014/2015, this is not a gradual decrease in the number of students and it is the average and optimum number of students for one batch of students.

The enrolment of students for the Faculty of Medicine depends on the existing facilities at Northern Colombo Teaching Hospital in Ragama (which is maintained by the Ministry of Health) and such facilities are not provided by the Kelaniya University. The maximum number of students that can be enrolled to the Faculty due to the limited space available at the medical and surgery sections of this hospital (such as the number of beds) is around 170-175.

Accordingly, 160 local students and several foreign students had been enrolled in the said academic period as suggested by the UGC. Moreover, action is taken to enroll a limited number of eligible foreign students based on merits and 5-15 students from Bhutan as per the MOU between the Government of Bhutan.

The number of students enrolled to the Faculty of Medicine for the academic year 2005/06 had to be increased by the UGC due to an examination paper marking fault of the Chemistry paper of (GCE) A/L examination conducted by the Department of Examinations. At the same time, the UGC had to increase the student enrolment for the academic year 2011/12 due to a conflicting situation on the Z score regarding the old and new syllabuses of the said academic year. Though students more than 190 had to be enrolled in these two academic years, it is noted that it was not the expected optimum situation.

(b) **Progress of the Research**

(i) Rs. 6,685,000/- has been received for the 26 research projects approved in 2015. However, one research project is completed by now and four projects are not commenced yet. Therefore, Rs. 5,490,000/- is approved for the commenced 21 projects and the utilized amount is Rs. 1,871,423.29 i.e. 34.14%.

It is expected to utilize the said amounts in future as the timeline for these projects ranges from year 1 and 2 and some projects have extended the period.

- (ii) These allowances have been provided to the said lecturers, other officers after their research proposals are evaluated by a Board appointed in this regard as per the Management Services Circular No. 45 dated 07.04.2011, and No. 09/2011 dated 19.04.2011. The research allowance is continued to be paid on the basis that the researcher has endorsed that activities pertainting to the research proposal are in progress or else on the basis that a new proposal is submitted. Assessments to this effect are done as and when required.
- (iii) A Research Council was established at the University of Kelaniya with the objective of developing the research activities of the University and creating a research culture and it has performed a number of activities targeted at the said objectives and such activities are as follows:
- 1. Conducting international research symposiums at all the academic departments of the faculties, providing financial facilities for same and assessing the Faculty that conducts the most number of seminars.
- 2. Encouraging all the lecturers to publish research in indexed journals and assessing the lecturer who has published highest no. of articles in indexed journals, Best Researcher, Best Young Researcher, Most Outstanding Researcher in order to encourage such research activity.
- 3. Encouraging all the lecturers to create Google Scholar and Research Gate accounts and publish their research articles in those accounts and considering the number of papers uploaded into such accounts, when research allowances are granted.

- 4. All the research papers published by lecturers at Faculty levels are evaluated at the Progress review Meeting and discussion of its development and drawbacks.
- 5. In addition to Activities of the Research Council, Web Masters have been appointed by the University Web Master at the department level and special tasks are conducted by creating departmentwise web pages and updating them as required.

The University has been able to achieve a higher place in the global ranking due to the progress cited above.

4.2 Management Activities

- (a) The lands used by the University are acquired by the State for the purpose of the University. The University has all the relevant Gazette notifications in this regard and only ownership certificates are to be issued now. A request has been made in this regard to the Divisional Secretariat. However, the Divisional Secretary has stated that the Survey Plan on the relevant land was made in 1964 and ownership certificates need to be issued after a new survey is conducted. Accordingly, a direction has been issued to the Gampaha Survey Authority for re-surveying the said lands and the University has made necessary payments for it. It will be able to obtain ownership certificates after the Gampaha Survey Authority has conducted the land survey.
- (b) The Ministry of Higher Education has been requested to transfer the State land in which the faculty of Medicine, Ragama is situated and action is being taken in this regard. However, an outside party has filed litigation against the University claiming ownership of the land and therefore there is a delay in the transfer of the land.
- (c) As per the decision of the Council No. 391 dated 15.05.2012 the balance amount after the all the expenditure for the fee-levying courses is incurred can be utilized for the development of the department. Accordingly, Rs. 23,734,886/- from the Master of Arts/Master of Social Sciences has been transferred to the Faculty Development Fund.

When money is transferred to the State income and the Vice-Chancellor Fund action has been taken as per the decisions of the Council No. 387 dated 10.01.2012.

(d) The sabbatical leave with salary has been provided to the University lecturers who have completed the requirements for sabbatical leave and the recommendation of the Leave and Main Committee and the approval of the Council as per the UGC Circular No. 408 and other Circulars.

As per the provisions of the said Circular, the said lecturers are not restricted from working in a different place in order to engage in research activity or obtain professional experience.

Such institutes decide on the conditions of service of such lecturers, the allowances paid to them, and the University cannot influence in that regard.

At the same time, as per the UGC Circulars there is no hindrance to make payments for the academic allowance for the lecturers who receive paid sabbatical leave.

4.3 Operational Inefficiencies

- (a) According to the Establishment Code on the recovery of installments from the lecturers who had violated contracts the maximum period for such recovery is 48 installments and they have been informed about the minimum installment and the recommendations of the Audit Committee have been submitted to the Council after referring to the Audit Committee. This recommendation has also been sent to the lectures that have violated contracts and action will be taken against those who violate them.
- (b) Action has been taken to recover Rs. 176,941.80 the value of the invoice that cannot be accepted by the University from the lecturer who received this advance amount and from the Course Coordinator after the inquiry on this matter is completed.

4.4 Weaknesses in Contract Administration

The relevant contractor has repaired the defects of Rs. 219,998,912/- mentioned about the hostel building which was handed over to the University on 23rd February 2015 and it has been handed over on 30th May 2015.

4.5 Personnel Administration

Action has been taken to call for applications from both internal and external advertisements for the other vacancies and written/ practical/ professional/ fitness examinations and interviews are to be conducted for the recruitments for the applied vacancies.

4.5 Under-utilization of funds

- (a) These funds are allocated for the research activities. From the three projects that are externally funded, the progress report on Influenza has been sent to the St. Jude Children's Hospital and the progress reports of the Biomass Smoke Project and Solid Fuel Smoke have been sent to the Alabama University. The said institutes conduct performance analysis in every three month.
- (b) The criteria for the selection of eligible scholars for each Scholarship Fund and Reward Fund have been established under each fund. Scholarships cannot be granted to those who do not comply with the criteria. Accordingly, scholarships and rewards were not granted as there were no students who had fulfilled eligible performance levels and as there were no adequate funds.

5. Accountability and Good Governance

5.1 Action Plan

The review on the progress of the Action Plan 2015 was conducted and the report was submitted on 17.05.2016.

5.2 Internal Audit

As per the UGC Circulars, pre-audit actions have to be taken on the payment of Employee Provident Fund, pensions and gratuity to the staff of the University and the ancillary institutions and at their retirements or resignations. At the same time, pre-audit actions have to be taken on the final bills for the contract payments based on audit committee recommendations and the approval of the Council. Auditing is conducted based on the available human and other physical resources of the Division. One professionally qualified Audit Assistant is attached to the Division and the proposal for the creation of 8 Audit Assistant posts based on the recommendations of the Staff Review Board has been submitted for approval.

5.3 Budgetary Control

The approved provisions for the year 2015 of the University of Kelaniya were altered by the Treasury from time to time. The final provision document was presented on 29.12.2015. The amended budget document was presented to the Finance Committee in January and its recommendations were presented to the next Council. Accordingly, there was no delay.

6. Systems and Controls

(a) Control of Fixed Assets

The legal ownership of several lands used by the university has not been transferred to the university as yet. As per Sri Lanka Accounting Standards when an asset is revalued the whole class of that asset has to be revalued and action will be taken in future to revalue after the legal ownership of all the property has been acquired.

(b) Administration of Libraries

A formal book survey will be conducted soon after the activities of the book survey for the year 2012 is completed.

The following methodologies are implemented to verify the return of books from the readers:

- Obtaining a certificate to the effect that the student is free from library liabilities before examination certificates are issued.
- Take action to recover the deposit of Rs. 5,000/- which is refunded to the temporary lecturers and post-graduate students.

(c) Contract Administration

Action has been taken to finalize the constructions for the year ended 31st December 2015 within the stipulated time period and most of the constructions have been completed before the said period. At the same time, action has been taken to charge fines for the constructions that are not completed before the stipulated period.

(d) Control of Advances

The balance amount is returned as soon as the advances are received and there are delays due to voucher errors and approval matters. Action will be taken in future to avoid such delays.

Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies

Mission

The mission of the Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies of the University of Kelaniya is to "produce academically and professionally competent personnel to take up managerial positions in organizations, create an entrepreneurial culture, and broaden the horizon of knowledge pertaining to the discipline of Commerce & Management".

Introduction to the Faculty

The Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies can be identified as the youngest faculty of University of Kelaniya with the uniqueness of becoming one of the finest and fast growing faculties in the country. The origin of the Faculty could be traced back to the point when the Department of Commerce was established under the faculty of Social Sciences in 1976. With the commitment and untiring efforts of academic staff, students and other stakeholders, we achieved the faculty status in 1995.

Current Progress

Academic Programmes

Since then, the Faculty has been able to draw attention of the stakeholders and popularity within the university community in a rapid phase in terms of quality more than the quantity. Some of the best examples to prove this improvement of quality are as follows. The graduate employability of the faculty is 85.5% which is the highest among the management Faculties in the country. The Department of Marketing Management obtained the ISO certification which is the only department to have obtained this among the Management fraternity in the island. It is also the only department currently offering an ISO certified degree programme. Apart from that the BB.Mgt. (Finance) Special Degree programme offered by Department of Finance was accepted into the University Recognition Programme of Chartered Financial Analysts (CFA) Institute-USA in 2014.

The Faculty currently consists of 5 departments, and a strength of 103 academic staff members, 2209 undergraduate students and 27 nonacademic staff members. The 5 departments namely Commerce & Financial Management, Human Resource Management, Marketing Management, Finance and Accountancy offer 10 undergraduate (special degree) courses, 05 Master Degree programmes, 2 postgraduate diplomas and 3 diplomas and 4 higher diplomas in addition to the PhD programmes.

The Faculty offers a semester based academic programmes and underwent a further revision of curriculum which is implemented for 2013/14 academic year while catering to the latest trends of the subject field, interests of the academia and current demands of the dynamic job market. The Faculty is continuously in process of introducing new courses to be offered to the general public apart from main academic programme as an additional service to the community. Accordingly in 2015, the Faculty introduced 07 diplomas and 02 postgraduate diploma programmes.

Faculty of Graduate Studies

FGS offers a variety of programs, ranging from postgraduate diploma level to doctoral level. Currently, there are over thirty five programmes offered by the various Faculties and institutions, leading to a Master's degree. Some of the courses are based only on course work, while others are based on research, and some others are a mix of course work and research. Course work at FGS means face-to-face teaching as in a traditional university. These courses are usually conducted during weekends or evenings, to enable people who are already employed to enhance their knowledge and skills. In order to be more accessible, FGS hopes to be in a position to launch distance learning modules in the near future.

Postgraduate study at MPhil (Master of Philosophy) and PhD (Doctor of Philosophy) levels are possible in each Faculty of the University of Kelaniya. These programmes tend to build on the skills acquired at undergraduate and Master's levels. They involve an applicant being assigned to a supervisor for guidance in conducting research. The applicant and supervisor/s work together to achieve the objectives of the research program. If you have no previous experience in conducting research, it would be best to register for a Master's level program before attempting an MPhil or PhD. This is because most Master's level programs include modules on research methodology.

Faculty of Humanities

The academic tradition and the history of the Faculty of Humanities dates back to the inception of the Vidyalankara Pirivena. Today, the former Faculties of the Pirivena, the faculty of Languages, the Faculty of Buddhism and the Faculty of Arts come under the aegis of the Faculty of Humanities.

Maintaining the highest standards of the disciplines of Languages, Arts, Buddhist studies was the main objective of the faculties those days. Currently, the Faculty of Humanities continues to maintain those objectives within a greatly enhanced discipline.

Department of Sinhala, Department of English, Department of Pali & Buddhist Studies, Department of Sanskrit, Department of Hindi, Department of Modern Languages, Department of Linguistics, Western Classical Culture & Christian Culture, Visual Arts, Design & Performing Arts Unit, Drama & Theatre and Image Arts Unit and ELTU are the Departments attached to the Faculty of Humanities.

In addition, Language labs and computer labs have been established for the use of the undergraduates of the Faculty. The Faculty Research center is also located in the faculty premises for the use of researchers of the Faculty.

Overview

The Faculty of Medicine is situated in a spacious, 35-acre campus at Ragama. It commenced activities with the admission of 120 medical students in September 1991. Twenty one batches of medical students have since graduated from the Faculty, and the next intake in January 2016 will be the 27th batch. The faculty introduced a four-year BSc in Speech and Hearing Sciences in 2008. Three batches of these students have now graduated, and the next intake will be the 8th.

Today, the Faculty has about 1100 undergraduate students: approximately 900 medical students and about 200 BSc (SHS) students. The medical students include 70 students from overseas, mainly from other South Asian countries, who have been admitted on a fee-levying basis. The Faculty has 125 academic staff on the permanent cadre, as well as about 20 on the temporary cadre, and over 60 visiting staff that include consultants who are attached to the affiliated teaching hospitals. The Faculty prides itself on its research activities, and its output is perhaps the highest among medical institutions in Sri Lanka. A total of 23 academic staff members received President's Awards for Scientific Publication in 2013, at the ceremony conducted in November 2015.

Faculty of Science

Mission

The mission of the Faculty of Science of the University of Kelaniya is to produce highly motivated graduates and postgraduates capable of making a significant contribution towards national development and the wellbeing of mankind, to conduct research and provide advice and consultancy services in various scientific disciplines to foster a better understanding of the environment for sustainable use and conservation of natural resources.

Overview

The Faculty of Science of the University of Kelaniya consists of eight academic departments, namely the Departments of Botany, Chemistry, Industrial Management, Mathematics, Microbiology, Physics, Statistics& Computer Science and Zoology and Environmental Management. The Faculty of Science now offers six BSc Degree Programmes viz, Two BSc Degree Programmes of 3 year duration and four Honors Degree Programmes of 4 year duration. The BSc Degree Programmes are BSc Degree and BSc Degree in Environmental Conservation and Management (ENCM). The Honors Degree Programmes are BSc Honors Degree, BSc Honors Degree in Environmental Conservation and Management (ENCM), BSc Honors Degree in Management and Information Technology (MIT) and BSc Honors Degree in Software Engineering (SENG).

The Faculty also spearheads the EDCON project, which links the University with industry through consultancies with client organizations. In 2013, the Faculty of Science had the distinction of winning the highest grant allocation from all windows of HETC project, funded by the World Bank.

Faculty of Social Sciences

Overview

Faculty of Social Sciences consists of 09 Departments. The Faculty offers 18 subjects for the Bachelor's degree. Students are able to follow Bachelor of Arts (General) and Bachelor of Arts (Special) degree in these subjects. Lectures, seminars and workshops are held with the participation of specialists in various fields for the improvement of knowledge of the students, in addition to lectures and other tutorial classes relevant to degree courses by various departments of the Faculty.

Also, certificates and Diploma courses, Postgraduate Diploma courses, M.A. (one year) and M.S.Sc (two year) courses from selected subject streams in the Faculty of Social Sciences are conducted. Facilities to follow M.Phil. and Ph.D. degrees based on research are available, including a research laboratory, information technology facilities and other resources of the Faculty.

In 2012, the Palm Leaf Manuscript Library was opened at the Faculty premises, heralding a new era blending the old and the new in research methodology and archiving.
