

1. The University of Kelaniya

The University of Kelaniya, located in the historical domain of the Kelaniya city outside the municipal limits of Colombo has seven different Academic Faculties, fifty-six (56) academic departments and three institutes with 652 academic staff members and 832 non- academic staff members. Also, the University has three other affiliated Institutes namely, Gampaha Wickramarachchi Ayurvedic Institute, Postgraduate Institute of Archaeology, Postgraduate Institute of Pali and Buddhist Studies.

Students of the University get various services under following categories such as Student Counselling Service, Career Guidance Unit, Personal Counselling Unit (Kalana Mithuru Sevana), Medical Centre, Physical Education, Cultural Centre, Arts Council, Library (including Faculty Libraries), Information and Communication Technology Center and International Student Affairs Unit. Except for these centres and units, there are several others for different but specific services. For example, Quality Assurance Centre, University Statistics and Data Monitoring Unit (USDMU), Media Unit, Staff Development Center, Technology and Innovation Support Centre, Sustainable Development Centre, Centre for Distance and Continuing Education (CDCE), Centre of Excellence for Strategic Brand Identity Development (CESBID) and the Inter - Faculty Center for Coordinating the Modular System (ICCMS). Ensuring the research culture of the University, the University has a research council which coordinates with each faculty's research service center. Except for the Faculty of Medicine, which is located in Ragama premises, all the other faculties are located in Dalugama, twelve kilometers away from the capital city in a whole area of 55 acres. The main buildings on Dalugama premises are the Student Centre, Science Block, Humanities and Social Sciences Building Complex, Commerce and Management Studies Building Complex, Science Lecture Theatre Complex, Auditorium and Ancillary Building, Sri Dharmaloka Convocation Hall, Aquaculture and Microbiology Buildings, ICT Centre, the Library, and the

Administrative Block. Sri Dharmaloka Convocation Hall has a seating capacity of 1,000, while the Science Faculty Auditorium and Professor Sunil Shantha Memorial auditorium of the Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies can accommodate 250 & 300 persons respectively. Sri Dharmaloka Convocation hall and Social Sciences Auditorium were recently upgraded as state-of-art auditoriums with modern technology.

In terms of housing, the Bhikku Hostel and the Women's Hostel Complex are located within the Dalugama campus, while the Men's Hostels and some Women's Hostels are located nearby. Venerable Ratmalane Sri Dharmarama Girls' hostel complex was opened in December, providing accommodation facilities for 500 students. In providing IT facilities, in addition to the main ICT Centre, every Faculty possesses well-equipped ICT Centers which are managed either by the faculty or by the department. To facilitate teaching, learning and research Wi-Fi facility have been expanded to cover the entire University and the hostels. Three language laboratories are located in the Faculty of Humanities. All departments of the Faculty of Science and Faculty of Commerce & Management Studies consist of research laboratories in addition to classroom facilities.

At Ragama, the buildings include the Administration Block, Lecture Theatres and Laboratories Complex, Disabilities Studies Unit Building, Molecular Medicine Unit building, Preclinical Buildings Complex, Auditorium with a seating capacity of 200 and men's and women's hostels. Construction of two lecture theatres and a students' hostel was commenced at the faculty premises recently.

The human resource of the University comprises, concisely, academic staff members, administrative staff, academic support staff, executive staff and non- academic staff. The following figure illustrates the organizational structure descriptively




Figure 1-1: Organizational Structure of the University

1.1. The Year 2019 of the University

As per the academic calendar of the University, the academic year 2016/17 was ended on February 04, 2019, and the academic activities of the year 2017/18 was begun on February 05, 2019, and is scheduled to be completed on February 29, 2020. 3,377 local students were enrolled as new enrollment in the internal undergraduate degree programs in 2019 and 871 students were enrolled for postgraduate studies during 2019. The international recognition of the university was enhanced by the enrollment of 132 international students for both undergraduate and postgraduate studies to the university in 2019. Today, the University of Kelaniya has twelve thousand one hundred and seven (12,107) students following undergraduate degree programs and there are total of one thousand nine hundred and eighty-four (1,984) students for postgraduate studies. The University produced 1587 internal graduates and 984 postgraduates in 2019.

The University has taken several steps to build up the international image of the University and two international MoUs have been signed with several universities around the world with the purpose of research activities, staff and student exchange programmes. Centre of Excellence for Strategic Brand Identity Development (CESBID) has engaged in creating a strategic brand identity for the university. Afforcing the research culture of the University, the University has provided funds for the academic staff for research activities and for research conferences and symposia organized within the university.

1.2. Achievements of the Year

The University of Kelaniya secured the first place among Sri Lankan universities in green practices and 272nd position in world rankings according to the UI Green Metrics ranking in 2019. UI Green Metric ranking is based broadly on the conceptual framework of Environment, Economy, and Equity. This year 779 universities in 83 countries participated, compared to last year 679 universities in 76 countries. The rankings look at six indicators of each university: setting and infrastructure, energy and climate change, waste, water, transportation and education.

The University had been recognized as the bronze winner under the University and educational institute category at the Best Web awards 2019. Best web 2019 was organized by the LK Domain Registry for the 9th time to recognize the best websites in Sri Lanka and is a web-based competition, providing an exclusive opportunity to promote and popularize Sri Lankan websites and showcase Sri Lankan abilities online.

Academic staff members of the Faculty of Medicine have received President's Awards for scientific publications. Several academic symposia and research conferences were held to enhance the research culture of the University in 2019. The Annual Research Symposium, 20th International Postgraduate Research Conference 2019 organized by the Faculty of Graduate Studies was held on December 30, 2019, on the theme of "Sustaining Multidisciplinary Research through Digital Transformation/s". As a member of the Association of South-East Asian Institutions of Higher Learning International (ASAIHL) Community, University of Kelaniya organized the ASAIHL International Conference on 9th and 10th December, at Hotel Galadari, Colombo. In addition to this symposium, 37 international and national level research conferences and symposia were organized and conducted by the faculties and academic departments for the advancement of the research culture within the University.

Celebrating the 60th anniversary, several events were organized to exhibit the excellence of higher education of the University of Kelaniya. The inauguration ceremony was held on June 17, 2019 followed by a "Pahan Poojawa" which was held with the participation of all staff members and the students of the University. The "Vidulakara Punarawalokana" educational exhibition was organized and held on November 27th to 29th 2019 successfully. Other programmes such as a Research Relations Symposium, a musical programme, an alms-giving, Pirith chanting ceremony were organized parallel to the event.

The new indoor stadium of the University of Kelaniya was declared open in relation to the 60th anniversary celebrations in August 2019. The celebration of the 90th anniversary of the Gampaha Wickramarachchi Ayurveda Institute affiliated to the University of Kelaniya was also marked in the year 2019.

With the aim of enhancing the artistic and literary skills of the undergraduates of the University Performances, Media, Art and Literature Competition, Sprout (Kalana) 2019 was organized and conducted by the Arts Council for the third time. The awards were presented to the winners of the 1st place in each category, while valuable cash prizes and certificates were awarded to all the winners of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd places in each category.

Additional to these programs, Stylish Marketer Fashion Show, The Inter-University Best Speaker Contest, Art Exhibitions, University Stage Drama Festivals, Photography exhibitions, Media Festivals, Talent shows, Colors Awarding Ceremony, Tree Plantation Programmes, Career Fair 2019, Welfare Projects and several workshops were some of the extra-curricular programmes conducted in 2019.

Students from every Faculty participated in national and international games and competitions held during the year 2019 and the students of the University of Kelaniya won several national and

international awards, bringing honour to the University. The University was able to secure the 4th place in the Inter University Championship 2019.

The different events and activities organized by students and staff as departments, faculties or organizations within the university bestead for the advancement of the University's reputation as well as the talents and skills of students of the University.

2.1. Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies

Mission

The mission of the Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies of the University of Kelaniya is to "produce academically and professionally competent personnel to take up managerial positions in organizations, create an entrepreneurial culture, and broaden the horizon of knowledge pertaining to the discipline of Commerce & Management".

Introduction of the Faculty

The Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies is one of fast developing faculties of the University of Kelaniya with unique features of becoming one of the finest faculties in the country. The origin of the Faculty could be traced back to the point where the Department of Commerce was established under the Faculty of Social Sciences in 1976. With the commitment and untiring efforts of academic staff, students and other stakeholders, we achieved the Faculty status by converting the department into the Faculty in 1995.

Current Progress

Academic Programmes

Since then, the Faculty has been able to draw attention of the stakeholders and popularity within the university community in a rapid phase in terms of quality more than the quantity. Some of the best examples to prove the improvement of quality are, graduate employability rate of 85.5% of the Faculty which is the highest among the Management Faculties in the country, ISO certification to the Department of Marketing which is the only department to have obtained this recognition among the Management fraternities in the island that currently offering an ISO certified degree programme and the recognition granted by Chartered Financial Analysts (CFA) Institute-USA in 2014 for the BBMgt. (Finance) Special Degree programme offered by the Department of Finance.

In 2019, Faculty obtained the membership of AACSB (The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business) as another milestone of Quality Business Management education.

The Faculty currently consists of five (5) departments, with the strength of 126 academic staff members, 30 non-academic staff members and 2561 undergraduate students. The five (5) departments namely; Commerce & Financial Management, Human Resource Management, Accountancy, Marketing Management and Finance are offering eleven (11) Undergraduate Degree Programmes, five (05) Master Degree programmes, two (02) Postgraduate Diplomas, four (04) Diplomas and six (06) Higher Diplomas in addition to a Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) programme. In 2019 the Department of Finance has introduced a new degree programme - BBMgt. Honours in Financial Engineering. The Department of Accountancy is going to introduce two new degree programmes - BBMgt. Honours in Auditing & Forensic Accounting and BBMgt. Honours in Accounting Information System and the Faculty is going to introduce BBMgt. Honours in Business Information Systems.

The Faculty offers a semester based academic programmes and underwent a further revision of curriculum, the implementation of which was introduced from the academic year 2013/14 while catering to the latest trends of the subject field, interests of the academia and current demands of the dynamic job market. The Faculty is continuously in process of introducing new courses to be offered to the general public apart from main academic programme, as an additional service to the community.

Academic Staff

Faculty's academic staff are genuinely enhancing their research interests and bring out their researches substantially in research publications which in turn contribute to the academic programme. In fact, in 2019 itself the Faculty staff has made approximately 308 publications, obtained 10 awards consisting of 01 international and 09 national awards. 43 members of the

academic staff are having Doctoral Degrees (PhD) while 98 members are with Master Degrees,

out of whom, 27 are currently reading Doctorates.

Extra-Curricular Activities

All the departments of the Faculty have unique extracurricular activities conducted by the

undergraduates. Some of the significant events so conducted are, Young entrepreneurs' Day

organized by Department of Commerce and Financial Management, Investment week by

Department of Finance, 'Stylish Marketer'- A Fashion show organized by Department of

Marketing Management, '3D's' -Talent show by Department of HRM, and 'Idea Night'- an

Internship certificate awarding ceremony and ICARE by Department of Accountancy.

With this capacity and in line with the mission, the Faculty has been rendering its distinctive

services to prepare scholars and professionals with capability, skills and attitude, driving the

economy, supporting civil society and government and make essential decisions in the interest of

whole society. Accordingly, the Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies has so far

produced more than 8000 graduates and most of them are in the forefront of managerial ranks in

public and private sector organizations, both locally and internationally with some of our graduates

being prominent entrepreneurs in the country.

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2.2. Faculty of Computing and Technology

The Faculty of Computing and Technology (FCT) was established on the 30th of December 2015 by the Gazette notification 1947/24 of the Government of Sri Lanka with three departments, namely, Department of Applied Computing, Department of Computer Systems Engineering and Department of Software Engineering. The new Faculty commenced its operations on 18th January 2016.

Academic registration of students in the FCT commenced from the academic year 2015/2016. The FCT started to offer degree programmes from the academic year 2015/1016 for the technology stream students, namely, Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology (BICT) Honours and Bachelor of Engineering Technology (BET) Honours. From the academic year 2016/2017 the Faculty started offering the BSc Honours in Computer Science Degree programme.

In addition, the faculty will cater to unique computing needs of other faculties too. This will help to improve the computer literacy and the computer usage by undergraduates of other faculties, which is identified as a critical determinant of employability of the graduates.

The Faculty will offer the Postgraduate Programmes in the areas of Computer Science, Software Engineering, Information Technology and Engineering Technology. The Master of Information Technology in Education programme is developed for the Ministry of Education to train ICT teachers. This programme will commence from year 2019.

The faculty will conduct research in diverse fields of significant impact. The research enterprise at FCT will expand from fundamental Computer Science research to the development of new technologies with applications to the industry and society as a whole. The discovery and creation of new technology are the essence of the doctoral programs in Computing and Technology. The

Faculty is in the process of establishing several Research and Development Centres. The following two research centres are already established:

- Center for Nanotechnology and
- National e-Learning Resource Centre (NELRC)

The FCT is planning to establish the following Research and Development Centres in near future:

- Language Engineering Research Centre
- Centre for Geoinformatics
- Centre for Computational Mathematics
- Centre for Data Science
- Centre for Cyber Security

Faculty of Computing and Technology has established the Industry Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) with the following objectives:

- 1. To encourage computing and technology experts in the university to contribute their knowledge/ experience for the development of national economy.
- 2. To develop computer based systems necessary for the government sector and SMEs at an affordable cost.
- 3. To provide training opportunities for the students with real world jobs
- 4. Encourage external experts to collaborate with FCT for R & D activities.

The Faculty of Computing and Technology is currently located at No.407, Kandy Road, Kelaniya.

The proposed building complex for the Faculty will be constructed at Mudunele, Kelaniya by the financial support of the Asian Development Bank.

Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology Honours Degree

The Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology is a four-year degree programme. The regular intake is 75. Students who followed the Technology Stream in their A/L are eligible to register for this programme. This degree programme will help students to build necessary skills, knowledge and attitudes required to function as software developers, network administrators and ICT professionals in the industry. Strong fundamental knowledge in electronics and data communication with supporting hands-on laboratory sessions will provide the necessary skills and knowledge required to design, build and maintain industry standard software and computer networks. Incorporation of highly demanded application areas such as Virtualization and Cloud

Computing, Network Management, Wireless and Mobile Communications, Computer Security, Web Programming, Mobile Application Development, Computer Games and Animation, Virtual Reality into the curriculum provides ample flexibility for students to specialize in their own areas of interest. The first two years of the curriculum aims at developing the common competencies expected of an ICT professional while the final two years are devoted for developing specific competencies in chosen areas of specialization. The pathways that are currently on offer are:

- Computer Networking
- Software Systems
- Games and Animation

Students will get an opportunity to work in the industry for six months through the internship module in the 4th year. The medium of instructions and examinations is English.

Bachelor of Engineering Technology Honours Degree

The Bachelor of Engineering Technology is a four-year degree programme. The regular intake for this degree is 75. Students who followed the Technology Stream in their A/L are eligible to register for this programme. This Engineering Technology Honours degree programme will have a strong focus on practical applications of science and technology with the view of preparing the graduates for a wide variety of industry applications. The first two years of the curriculum aims at developing the common competencies expected of an engineering technologist while the final two years are devoted for developing specific competencies in chosen areas of specialization. The pathways that are currently on offer are:

- Material and Process Technology
- Industrial Automation and Robotics
- Sustainable Technologies

Students who follow Industrial Automation will be able to develop skills required to use control systems such as computer or robots and ICT for handling different process and machineries in an industry. The Material and Process teaching specialization focusses on design operation and control of all the activities required to convert raw materials and commodity materials into valuable

products, whereas sustainable technology focuses on developing sustainable solutions for the current global and local socio-economic issues.

Students will get an opportunity to work in the industry for six months through the internship module in the 4th year. The medium of instructions and examinations is strictly in English only.

BSc Honours in Computer Science Degree

This is a four-year degree programme leading to the Bachelor of Science Honours in Computer Science Degree offered by the University of Kelaniya. The regular intake for this degree programme is 50. Students who followed the Physical Science Stream in their A/L are eligible to register for this programme. The course structure of the B.Sc. Honours in Computer Science Degree is designed to align with the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Computing of the UGC, and the computing guidelines of the Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE).

This degree programme will help students to build necessary skills, knowledge and attitudes required to function in the software industry, conduct research and disseminate knowledge in Computer Science. Deep fundamental knowledge in theoretical Computer Science with supporting hands-on laboratory sessions will provide the necessary skills and tacit knowledge required to analyze, design, implement and maintain industry standard software. Knowledge on Database Systems, Machine Learning, Date Security, Theory of Compilers, Parallel Computing, High Performance Computing, Digital Forensics, Semantic Web and e-business technologies, Computer Games and Animation, Virtual Reality to the curriculum provides ample flexibility for students to specialize in their own areas of interest. The Students can choose the standard pathway in Computer Science or choose one of the following pathways:

- Data Science
- Artificial Intelligence
- Cyber Security
- Scientific Computing

Students will get an opportunity to work in the industry for six months through internship module in the 4th year. The medium of instructions and examinations is strictly in English. In the final year all students should carry out a research project relevant to their area of interest.

Industry Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT)

The Faculty of Computing and Technology (FCT) at the University of Kelaniya has established the Industry Interaction Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) to provide consultancy services for both engineering and computing industries, product development and acceleration to the market, and to establish the industry-faculty business linkage. Through the partnerships with the private and public partner industries, the IICfCT intends to provide reliable and cost-effective solutions to the industries while providing a learning experience to the university students, and collaborative research opportunities to the faculty members. IICfCT obtains human resources from FCT for most of its projects. As of today, the staff members attached to FCT has provided numerous computing and software solutions to private and public entities. The IICfCT also coordinates the professional activities and employability enhancement programs for the students to enhance their soft skills, knowledge, and understanding of the corporate sector. Dr PW Samarasekere is currently serving as the Director of this cell.

Learning Centred Education

The Faculty has adopted the learning centred education pedagogy for its programme design and delivery for the first time in Sri Lanka. A series of workshops were conducted both in Sri Lanka and at the University of Oxford, UK under the guidance of Prof. Lynn McAlpine, Professor Emerita of University Education Development, Oxford Learning Institute, University of Oxford to train the staff and adopt the curriculum to reflect learning-centeredness.

The learning centred education approach promotes active learning where the emphasis is placed on creating and managing tasks and activities which will empower student learning, both inside and outside the class. The pedagogical style required to enable active learning is different to traditional lecturing. A different set of instructional and assessment strategies are adopted in the learning centred approach to facilitate independent learning by the students. The lecturer will select appropriate interactive techniques from a host of such techniques available, in addition to minilectures, to achieve the intended learning outcomes. The lecturer will also use a set of different assessment strategies, both formative and summative, to assess the level of achievement of the intended learning outcomes by each student, based on pre-defined rubrics, during the entire course module. This places less importance on the traditional end of the semester exams, and a considerable percentage of marks will be earned by the students through continuous assessment throughout the module.

Industry Advisory Board

The Faculty of Computing and Technology has established an Industry Advisory Board composed of eminent professionals from the industry, representatives from industry associations as well as representatives from professional associations.

The role of the Industry Advisory Board (IAB) of the Faculty of Computing and Technology (FCT) is to serve as a liaison between the FCT and the industry as well as other institutional stakeholders in order to support the FCT in the formulation and attainment of its Mission and Strategic Objectives. It plays a key role in providing inputs and recommendations to the FCT from an industry perspective and guiding the strategic directions of the FCT in terms of academic programs, research and partnerships.

Mr. Anuradha Tennakoon, Former Country Head/ Engineering Director, Zebra Technologies Lanka (Pvt) Ltd serves as the current chairman of the IAB.

Outbound Training (OBT)

The FCT has introduced an outbound training program as an annual event for all its undergraduate students. Through the OBT programme, the faulty has taken another step towards changing the attitudes and mindset of students from the traditional class room environment, and providing a valuable learning experience for accomplishing the life challenges and making a positive impact on their work performance.

The program was successfully held in 2017 & 2018 for the young leaders of the University of Kelaniya, Faculty of Computing and Technology, at the Police Training College Kalutara. The two-day interactive program was organized by the faculty to improve the group dynamics and personality development of the undergraduates of the first-year students of the faculty. The event was geared towards enhancing the skills in competent leadership, building energetic and high-performing teams, trust-building, personality and self-confidence building, effectively working in diverse environments, facing and succeeding the challenges, creating an open-mind, effective and efficient decision making, and various other important skills that are necessary in improving the quality of student's academic and personal lives.

Annual Conference

The International Conference on Advances in Computing and Technology organized by the Faculty of Computing and Technology, University of Kelaniya was inaugurated in 2016 on 25th November 2016 at JAIC Hilton, Colombo. The second conference was held on 25th July 2017, at the University of Kelaniya. The third International conference on Advances in Computing and Technology (ICACT) was held on 26th July 2018, at Pegasus Reef Hotel Wattala.

This conference is expected to bring together researchers, educators, students, practitioners, technocrats and policymakers from across academia, government, industry and non-governmental organizations to discuss, share and promote current works and recent accomplishments across all

aspects of Computing, Nano Technology, Materials and Process Engineering, Robotics and Automation.

Department of Applied Computing

The Department of Applied Computing will be one of the main contributors for the undergraduate degree programmes in Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology and Bachelor of Engineering Technology. This department will be the collaboration hub for the other faculties to offer proposed joint-major computing degrees and to offer necessary course modules for existing degree programmes offered by other faculties. Applying computer technology in other specialized areas such as agriculture, education, healthcare, transportation, etc., is the main focus of the department. In addition to undergraduate degree programmes, the department contributes to the proposed postgraduate degree programmes of the Faculty of Computing and Technology The department will highly contribute towards the Industry Interaction Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) and support research centres proposed by the Faculty of Computing and Technology

Department of Computer Systems Engineering

Department of Computer Systems Engineering offers all the core course modules in Computing for Computing and Technology degree programmes conducted by the faculty. Computational Mathematics, Artificial Intelligence, Computer Systems, Computer Networks and Data Security are some of the core areas specialized by the department. In addition to undergraduate degree programmes, the department contributes to the proposed postgraduate degree programmes of the Faculty of Computing and Technology. Graduates with relevant qualifications can pursue higher studies leading to MPhil and PhD degrees at the department. Also, the department intends to contribute towards the Industry Interaction Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) and support research centres proposed by the Faculty of Computing and Technology.

Department of Software Engineering

The department of Software Engineering came into existence with the establishment of the Faculty of Computing and Technology on 30th of December 2015. The department jointly with the other two departments will offer all core and optional course modules for the degree programmes offered by the faculty. Software Engineering, Data Science and Human Computer Interaction are some of the core areas specialized by the department. In addition, the department will extend its services to the other faculties by teaching and support services in computing. The department will also contribute to the proposed postgraduate programmes actively. Prospective graduates will be able to pursue higher studies leading to MPhil and PhD degrees. The department will highly contribute towards the Industry Interaction Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) and support research centres proposed by the Faculty of Computing and Technology.

Chamil Ravindu Geekiyanage, a 3rd year undergraduate of the faculty, has developed a revolutionary product to improve the exhaust emission in vehicles that will significantly reduce the harmful exhaust gases. Chamil's business plan focused on commercializing this highly efficient and automated electrolytic cell that provides a greener, eco-friendly, CO₂-free fuel as an alternative and sustainable energy source.

Chamil's business plan is part of a program adopted by the Industry Interaction Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) at the faculty to have the students create business plans around the innovative technologies while providing the resources, mentoring support, and knowledge, on entrepreneurship, marketing, and financing.

BIZMINDS is an annual competition organized by Young Entrepreneurial Association of the Department of Commerce and Financial Management at the University of Kelaniya. The competition provides a platform to highlight young entrepreneurs whose seed ideas and business plans exemplify the ideals of entrepreneurial thinking.

2.3. Faculty of Graduate Studies

Vision

The vision of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) is based on the purpose of education from ancient times: Natthi vijjaa Sama.m pa~n~naa (Pali), 'there is no power comparable to knowledge' or ipsa scientia potestas est [Latin] 'knowledge is power.' Therefore, FGS envisages that its graduates will have the knowledge to wield power in different spheres and make the world a better place, through their dedication to research, openness to new ideas, and mastery of analytical skills.

Mission

The mission of the Faculty of Graduate Studies is to encourage research and dissemination of knowledge at postgraduate level. FGS works with academic staff, students and administrative staff in all the Faculties of the University of Kelaniya to promote excellence in postgraduate education. Hence, FGS works together with all academic departments across the university to provide graduate programs at postgraduate Diplomas, Master's, MPhil, and PhDs to create a dynamic intellectual climate for its students.

Programmes offered by the FGS

FGS offers a variety of programs, ranging from postgraduate diploma level to doctoral level. Currently, there are over fifty-two programs offered by the FGS in association with all faculties and affiliated institutions. Some of the courses are based only on course work, while others are based on research, and some others are a mix of course work and research. Master of Business (Accounting/Finance) programme conducts in online mode. Curriculum of all postgraduate programmes prepared in par with Sri Lanka Qualification Framework (SLFQ) and approved by the University Grants Commission (UGC). These courses are usually conducted during weekends or evenings, to enable people who are already employed to enhance their knowledge and skills. In

order to be more flexible, FGS hopes to be in a position to launch distance learning programmes in the near future.

Postgraduate study at MPhil (Master of Philosophy) and PhD (Doctor of Philosophy) levels are possible in all disciplines of the University of Kelaniya. Research students involve an applicant being assigned to a supervisor for guidance in conducting research. The applicant and supervisor/s work together to achieve the objectives of the research program.

Doctoral Programmes (PhD/DBA/DM)

Doctoral degree is the highest level of degree a student can obtain. The duration of study for a PhD/DBA/MD is three years, with extensions possible, on recommendations by the supervisor/s. PhD applicants should submit a research proposal to FGS. Purpose of this qualification is to develop a person with a capacity to generate substantive insights in a particular area of study through high quality original research. The qualification holder should be able to provide evidence for generating new knowledge by publications in peer reviewed indexed journals. For a doctoral degree, a candidate is required to carry out high level research under the guidance of a supervisor holding a qualification of this SLQF level or equivalent and make a significant and original academic contribution creating new knowledge. The candidate should submit a thesis incorporating research findings which are assessed and accepted.

The candidate may also be required to follow some course work as preparatory work or for value addition to research. However, this course work shall not contribute to the credits accumulated towards the qualification. The research may be purely discipline-based or multidisciplinary. The qualification holder should be able to design and carry out independent pure and/or applied research contributing significantly towards the development of new knowledge, supervise and evaluate original research carried out by others in the field of specialization. S/he should be able

to demonstrate critical awareness of current issues in the subject area and apply techniques relevant to professional practice.

Masters of Philosophy Degree (MPhil)

The duration of study for MPhil is two years, and the program consists mainly of research. Purpose of this qualification is to develop a person with a capacity of conducting high quality original research without supervision. For an MPhil degree, a candidate is required to carry out high level research under the guidance of a person holding equal or above qualification and make a significant contribution to a particular discipline or field. The research may be pure discipline-based or multidisciplinary. The candidate should submit a thesis incorporating research findings, which is assessed and accepted. The candidate may also be required to follow some course work as preparatory work or for value addition to research. However, this course work shall not contribute to the credit accumulated towards the qualification.

The qualification holder should be able to carry out independent pure and/or applied research contributing significantly towards the development of new knowledge, supervise and evaluate original research carried out by others in the field of specialization leading to qualifications of SLQF levels up to 10. S/he should also be able to make judgments on complex issues in the area of expertise and communicate her/his ideas and conclusions clearly to specialist and non-specialist audiences. S/he should demonstrate self-direction and originality in tackling and solving problems and be able to plan and implement tasks at a professional level. The qualification holder should also be able to demonstrate critical awareness of current issues in the subject area and be able to apply techniques relevant to professional practice.

2.5. Faculty of Medicine

Overview

The Faculty of Medicine is located in Ragama, in a spacious, campus of about 35 acres. It commenced activities in September 1991. In 2019, the 24th batch of medical students and the 7th batch of BSc (Speech & Hearing Sciences) students graduated from the Faculty. The 30th and 31st batches of students for the MBBS degree program, and the 12th batch of students for the BSc (SHS) degree program were enrolled in 2019.

Postgraduate programs include the Master of Public Health (Epidemiology) program, and research degrees leading to award of PhD, MD and MPhil in medical sciences. The Faculty also offers two external degree programs in conjunction with the Centre for Distance & Continuing Education: a BSc in Occupational Therapy, and a BSc in Physiotherapy.

As of December 2019, the Faculty had 1325 undergraduate students. They include 45 students from overseas, mainly from other South Asian countries. The Faculty has 130 academic staff on the permanent cadre, as well as about 40 on the temporary cadre, and over 60 visiting staff that include consultants who are attached to the affiliated teaching hospitals.

The Faculty prides itself on its research activities, and its output is amongst the highest in medical faculties in Sri Lanka. Twenty-one academic staff members received President's Awards for Scientific Publications in 2018, at the ceremony conducted in 2019.

Vision

The Faculty aspires to be an internationally recognized institution of higher education in a culture of excellence and integrity that helps to generate and impart knowledge in the medical sciences.

Mission

The Faculty of Medicine

- Educates medical students, postgraduate doctors, allied health care professionals and the public,

The MBBS study program is of 5-year duration with an organ system based, integrated curriculum.

It has 3 phases of study with a bar examination as listed below;

- First Examination for Medical Degrees
- Second Examination for Medical Degrees
- Final Examination for Medical Degrees.

The BSc Speech and Hearing Sciences degree program

This program offered by the Faculty of Medicine is the first approved professional training

program leading to a BSc Degree in Speech and Hearing Sciences (specializing in speech &

Language Therapy or in Audiology) in Sri Lanka. The BSc (SHS) is a four-year program of study.

The curriculum is based on the course unit system.

The Training Centre, Ayati ('Hope' in Sanskrit) centre was setup in 2019 to help clients with

various disabilities. The Centre is supported by the Ayati Trust with technical expertise being

provided by the Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya.

The Sri Lanka Army constructed this state-of-the-art building which was handed over to the

University of Kelaniya on the 18th of July 2019. Since then, the staff members and external faculty

such as Audiologists, Educational therapists, Occupational therapists, Paediatricians,

Physiotherapists, psychologists, speech and language therapists and supported employment

officers offer facilities

Future prospects:

Commencement of a new degree program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science Honours

in Occupational Therapy for 50 students is planned for the academic year 2019/2020.

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2.6. Faculty of Science

Mission

The mission of the Faculty of Science of the University of Kelaniya is to produce highly motivated graduates and postgraduates capable of making a significant contribution towards national development and the wellbeing of mankind, to conduct research and provide advice and consultancy services in various scientific disciplines to foster a better understanding of the environment for sustainable use and conservation of natural resources.

Introduction of the Faculty

The Faculty of Science, University of Kelaniya is one of the five Faculties of Vidyalankara University established at its inception in 1959. Currently, the Faculty of Science consists of eight academic departments, namely the Departments of Chemistry, Industrial Management, Mathematics, Microbiology, Physics & Electronics, Plant & Molecular Biology, Statistics & Computer Science, and Zoology & Environmental Management.

Brief Introduction on Degree Programmes of the Faculty

Currently, the Faculty of Science offers three Bachelors' Degree programmes of 3-year duration and four Honours Degree programmes of 4-year duration. The Bachelors' Degree programmes are Bachelor of Science [BSc], Bachelor of Science in Environmental Conservation & Management [BSc (ENCM)], and Bachelor of Science in Physics & Electronics [BSc (PHEL)]. The Honours Degree Programmes are Bachelor of Science Honours [BSc Hons], Bachelor of Science Honours in Environmental Conservation & Management [BSc Hons (ENCM)], Bachelor of Science Honours in Management & Information Technology [BSc Hons (MIT)], and Bachelor of Science Honours in Software Engineering [BSc Hons (SENG)].

The intake of students for 2017/2018 Academic year to the faculty was 660. Currently, the faculty is serving 2080 undergraduates. The faculty consists of 130 academic staff, 01 academic supportive staff and 98 non-academic staff.

Annually, the Faculty of Science admits 185 and 300 students to the Biological Sciences and the Physical Sciences streams respectively. The faculty also admits 100 students to the BSc Hons in MIT, 60 students to the BSc in ENCM, and 50 students each for the BSc Hons in SENG and BSc in PHEL Degree Programmes through separate windows.

Students from Physical Sciences and Biological Sciences are offered a range of Auxiliary courses from the Faculties of Commerce & Management Studies, Humanities, and Social Sciences. At present, the Faculty of Science conducts 4 MSc Degree Programmes and 1 Postgraduate Diploma Programme.

Academic programmes of the Faculty operate on a 'Course Unit System' i.e. a modularised, credit based system within a two-semester academic year with end-of-semester examinations and continuous assessments. It offers a variety of course unit combinations designed to provide maximum possible flexibility in the choice of subjects.

Current Progress

The Faculty of Science was able to secure the following grants under the AHEAD operation (one of the World Bank funded project) during the year 2019:

- 1. ELTA ELSE Faculty proposal LKR 100 million
- 2. Development Oriented Research LKR 40 million
- 3. ELTA ELSE Department vice proposals
 - a) Department of Industrial Management LKR 15 million
 - b) Department of Plant & Molecular Biology LKR 15 million
- 4. Results Area I to increase the intake Department of Industrial Management LKR 50 million
- 5. Research Innovation and Commercialization (RIC)
 - a) Department of Chemistry LKR 40 million
 - b) Department of Physics & Electronics LKR 40 million

Due to the diversification of subjects, two academic departments in the faculty were renamed in 2019 as follows:

- 1. Department of Botany renamed as Department of Plant & Molecular Biology
- 2. Department of Physics renamed as Department of Physics & Electronics

The Faculty of Science made a significant contribution to the 60th Anniversary celebration of the University of Kelaniya by hosting eleven exhibition stalls during the period from 27th to 29th November 2019.

The six storied building in the Faculty of Science is nearing completion and will be used by the Department of Industrial Management to conduct the BSc Hons in MIT Degree Programme. The construction of the new Lecture Theatre Complex is in progress, and it will facilitate Student Centred Learning activities in the Faculty of Science.

The following centres and units have also been established and functioning under the Faculty of Science;

- Repair and Instrumentation Unit is maintained by the Department of Physics & Electronics. This unit carries out repair and maintenance works of the electric and electronic items including laboratory equipment, instruments, devices etc.
- Glass Blowing Centre of the Faculty provides a unique service to government and private sector by undertaking manufacture and repair of a variety of glassware for their needs.
- Research and Services Centre (RSC) was set up under the HETC Window 4 project. It is meant for facilitating and promoting commercialization of research and related activities at the Faculty of Science.
- The Regional Centre for "Ant Research" was established at the Department Zoology & Environmental Management in 2016. Conducts international training programmes on sampling methods and identification of Ants, and contains information on their habitats, families and unique behaviors.
- Solar Solutions Centre (SSC) was established in February 2016 in order to strengthen the green concept of the University of Kelaniya. The centre has designed and manufactured a full featured solar powered wheel chair, and a solar power assisted boiler for the main canteen. At present the centre is focusing on manufacturing a low cost small-scale energy solution in order to make solar energy far more affordable for the communities.
- Central Equipment Laboratory provides facilities to conduct centralized research
 activities at the Faculty. It was established in June 2012 as an activity of the HETC
 QIG Window 3 Program. At present this Laboratory is equipped with equipment
 worth around LKR 20 Million.

Special Achievements of the year

For the first time in the history of the University of Kelaniya, Department of Physics & Electronics played an instrumental role in partnering with OREL Corporation (Pvt) Ltd to license an innovative product "Remotely Controllable Regulator Connected in Series with Resistive and Inductive Loads". This invention was made by a BSc Hons graduate in Physics through his final year undergraduate research project.

The Faculty of Science organized an International Research Symposium on Pure and Applied Sciences under the theme "Technovation: Inspiring the Next Generation of Technology Entrepreneurs" which was held on 25th October 2019.

Future Prospects

Faculty of Science is expecting to introduce the following degree programmes in future.

- 1. BSc Honours in Electronics and Computer Science
- 2. BSc Honours in Electronics and Computer Science in Computer Science
- 3. BSc Honours in Electronics and Computer Science in Electronics
- 4. BSc in Electronics and Computer Science
- 5. BSc in Electronics and Computer Science in Computer Science
- 6. BSc in Electronics and Computer science in Electronics
- 7. BSc in Data Science & Analytics
- 8. 3 plus 1 degree programme BSc Honours Degree
- 9. BSc in Software Engineering External Degree
- 10. Diploma in Astronomy
- 11. Diploma in Computer Science
- 12. Diploma in Information Technology

An environment has been created at the Faculty to promote freedom of thought, innovation and creativity. The Graduates who are endowed to the nation from the Faculty of Science will undoubtedly contribute significantly to the wellbeing of the mankind.

With this capacity and in line with the mission, the Faculty of Science has been rendering its distinctive services to prepare and produce scholars and professionals with capability, skills and attitude, to drive the economy, support civil society and government and to make essential decisions in the interest of mankind.

2.7. Faculty of Social Sciences

Introduction of the Faculty

The Faculty of Social Sciences consists of twelve Departments, namely Archaeology, Economics, Geography, History, International Studies, Library and Information Science, Communication, Philosophy, Political Science, Social Statistics, Sociology and Sport Science and Physical Education. The Faculty offers Bachelor of Arts (BA) and Bachelor of Arts (Honours) Degrees in eighteen subject areas. Well qualified academic staff members disseminate their knowledge pertaining to each subject area while the Faculty invites renowned scholars on each subject area as visiting lecturers. The students are always encouraged to engage in independent learning too. Each Department has designed its syllabi and teaching and learning processes with a view to enhance the theoretical and practical knowledge, skills and creativity of the students of the Faculty. The courses also promote interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approaches in studying and in conducting research pertaining to the Social Sciences. In the processes of learning and engaging in research, the students are given a myriad of opportunities and facilities within each department. In addition, in the Faculty in general separate institutes, units and venues such as the Palm Leaf Manuscript Study and Research Library, Computer and Information Technology Laboratories, the Research Center for Social Sciences (RCSS), the Faculty Research Library and auditoriums serve various levels of the learning processes to the students.

Vision of the Faculty

To maintain excellence by nurturing independent thought, critical analysis, a sense of social responsibility, respect for cultural diversity and ethical values through multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary collaboration with a commitment to the development of Sri Lanka in particular, and South Asia in general.

Mission of the Faculty

To advance and promote the socioeconomic, political, cultural and academic development of Sri Lankan society through teaching, research, innovation and intellectual leadership.

Brief Introduction on Degree Programmes of the Faculty

The Faculty conducts academic programmes at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels. While BA and BA (Honours) programmes are conducted at undergraduate level, Master of Arts (MA) (with coursework) and Master of Social Sciences (MSSc) (with both coursework and research) degrees are offered by each Department at postgraduate level. In addition, several Postgraduate Diplomas are offered by certain Departments of the Faculty. Further, most of the Departments handle the supervision and monitoring processes of MPhil and PhD degrees pertaining to the Social Sciences offered by the Faculty of Graduate Studies of the University.

Current Progress

The Faculty of Social Sciences both as a Faculty and in the form of individual Departments conduct seminars, research symposia, conferences and research projects alike at both national and international levels. Furthermore, activities such as book launches, commemorative and research publications, academic fora, workshops and guest lectures are being organized by the Departments of the Faculty. However, for the time being most of the activities of the Faculty have been suspended due to the closure of the University for the students as a result of measures taken by

the UGC for the prevention of the spread of the COVID 19 pandemic. In fact, almost all the departments successfully conduct online teaching programmes for most of the course units of undergraduate level.

Special Achievements of the Year

During the academic year 2019/2020, the Department of Archaeology and the Shanghai Museum, China started a five-year excavation project (2019-2023) in the Jaffna Peninsula. The first phase of the project was completed in December 2019. Furthermore, the Department started archaeological excavations at the Mantai ancient sea port in collaboration with Sichuan University, China.

Moreover, a research team of the Faculty of Social Sciences won a prestigious research grant worth LKR 10 million under the DOR HEMS projects of the AHEAD (Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development) Operation. The research is entitled "The Impact of Social Protection on Sustainable Development Goals in Sri Lanka: An Empirical Analysis".

Future prospects

The overall aim of the Faculty is to be one of the top-ranking Faculties of Social Sciences or Arts from among the state universities in Sri Lanka. In order to achieve this goal, the need for the development and enhancement of human resources, research capacity and infrastructure facilities of the Faculty has been recognized. Further, it has been recognized that the design and formulation of curricular and extracurricular activities to develop academic activities and learning processes are of vital importance. The need to develop or enhance the ICT skills and English knowledge of students while developing their soft skills is a significant issue that needs to be addressed. Moreover, the Faculty is aiming at expanding research activities and initiating the origin of a broader and more pragmatic research culture which involves the academic staff as well as the students with a view to produce a more research-oriented graduate to serve the nation. Furthermore, several key initiatives, particularly curriculum development in undergraduate and

postgraduate programmes and staff development based on the national and international standards and norms aligned with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) have been planned. As for collaborative ventures, more emphasis would be given to working with industry and foreign universities and maintaining an ongoing discussion with the stakeholders.

3. Student Information

In 2019, the University has newly enrolled 3,381 students for undergraduate degree programmes, 4,602 students for external undergraduate degree programmes and 883 candidates for postgraduate degree programmes. By the end of 2019, the University has a total of 12,107 undergraduates and 1,984 postgraduate students whilst 101,705 students are following external undergraduate degree programs.

3.1. New Enrollment 2017/18 – Internal Undergraduate Degree Programmes

For the academic year 2017/18, total of 3,377 local students and 4 foreign students have been enrolled in undergraduate degree programmes. The majority of the students are females and they represent 68% out of 3,381. 


Figure 3-2: New enrollment by the gender




Figure 3-1: New enrollment by the Faculty

3.2. Total Enrollment 2019 – Internal Undergraduate Degree Programmes

As of December 31, 2019, the University has 12,107 undergraduates studying at the University. Among them, 88 students are enrolled under foreign category. 


Figure 3-3: Total enrollment 2019 by Faculty




Figure 3-4: Total enrollment 2019 by the level of study




Figure 3-5: Total enrollment 2019 by the gender

3.3. Students in External Undergraduate Degree Programmes – 2019

3.4. Students in Postgraduate Programmes – 2019

The Faculty of Graduate Studies has enrolled 883 students, including 12 foreign students in various postgraduate programmes in 2019. With this new enrollment, the University of Kelaniya has a total of 1,984 postgraduate students with 44 foreign students. Most of the students have enrolled in the Master's degree programmes while a few numbers have enrolled to the Postgraduate Diplomas. Most of the foreign postgraduate students follow the postgraduate programmes in which the board of study belongs to the Faculty of Humanities. 


Figure 3-6: Students by the postgraduate programme

a. Local Students in Postgraduate Studies

5. Human Resources of the University

The University has provided permanent employment to a total of 1,554 persons and as at December 31, 2019 and she has given the opportunity to temporary work with her to 349 persons. 


Figure 5-1: Workforce by the staff category




Figure 5-2: Highest academic qualifications of the Academic staff

9. Activities Carried out and Future Plans based on Sustainable Development Goals

The report produced based on sustainable development, 'to safeguard the environment and mitigate any negative impact on the environment' as per the directives given in No 17 (d), Part III of the National Audit act No 19 of 2018; this report is produced based on the sustainable development goals, specified in the website of Department of Census and Statistics, as applicable to University of Kelaniya.

9.1. Introduction

University of Kelaniya is ranked 1st according to UI (Universitas Indonesia) Green metric ranking from the inception of this ranking in 2014 in Sri Lanka. The University of Kelaniya has achieved this as a result of adhering to the Sustainable Development Concept and this is incorporated in its vision itself;

"To become a center of excellence in the creation and dissemination of knowledge for sustainable development".

The University has successfully completed a multitude of activities in keeping with the Sustainable Development goals and is constantly working as an institution with clearly defined future plans. In order to actualize these targets and for the convenience of close monitoring, the proposed activities mentioned herewith are incorporated in the Action Plan 2020 and Corporate Plan 2020-2024 of the University.

9.2. Good Health



The University has its own established Health Center complex and it was renovated during year 2019 with several extensions to maintain an efficient and friendly health service for the university community.

Further, following actions have been proposed in keeping with "Good Health and Well-being" under sustainable development goals and are expected to be carried out for the next 5 years.

- Establish a new ETU (Emergency Treatment Unit) and its maintenance
- Renovate and expand the Day treatment Unit
- Improve Dental Care Facilities and services
- Enhance Pharmacy and Laboratory facilities
- Enhance Ayurveda medical care facilities & Services
- Commence Counselling services and Awareness programs for students and staff.

9.3. Quality Education



One of the main goals of the University of Kelaniya in Keeping with its vision and mission, is "To create a high quality and flexible teaching and learning environment".

Almost all the academic programs and academic activities of the university are

aligned to meet this goal. Following Strategies are currently used to actualize these goals and these are incorporated to the 5-year corporate plan to ensure their smooth operation.

- 1. Introduce and conduct innovative, quality and attractive study programs
- 2. Revise the existing curricula to meet national and international needs
- Encourage lifelong learning in order to enable students and graduates to realize their full potential

- 4. Provide more opportunities for the development of students' soft skills
- 5. Provide opportunities for students to get practical experience in appropriate industry, where applicable
- 6. Conduct an annual, comprehensive assessment of the quality of teaching in each faculty and convey the results to staff
- 7. Provide students with more opportunities to participate in sports, clubs and societies, together with opportunities for leadership and formal recognition of their extra curricula activities
- 8. Develop a research culture in the University by increasing the number of research projects and allocate at least 10% from the University capital budget as research grants
- 9. Recognize and reward academic staff engaged in outstanding research of international standard.
- 10. Make the university's research findings available to the wider community

Further to the directive taken at the overall quality education, following activities are being carried out to develop knowledge and awareness on sustainable development concept among students and other stakeholders of the University.

- Environmental Sustainability extension project themed 'I go Green': To give the awareness and hands on experience on solid waste management, hydroponics (soilless culture of plants), and use of sunlight in agriculture, dengue mosquito control and disease prevention to the children of the academic and nonacademic staff, university of Kelaniya.
- Sustainability Leadership Program for Undergraduates conducted faculty wise.
- Introduction of courses on sustainability to undergraduate programs
- Training programs on sustainability to students
- Awareness programs for University staff
- Community programs as USR projects

9.4. Gender Equality



The University of Kelaniya has established Center for Gender Studies aimed to provide a focus for research, teaching and consciousness raising on gender within the university and in the community.

Following activities are being carried out to ensure 'Gender Equality'; these ongoing activities are incorporated into the 5-year Cooperate plan.

- Curriculum Development in Gender Studies

9.5. Clean Water and Sanitation



The Center for Sustainability Solutions (CSS) established in the University of Kelaniya and the landscape division of the university are in collaboration carrying out a multitude of activities aimed at providing clean water and also to preserve and utilize the existing water resources to the optimum capacity.

The following activities are initiated and are expected to be continued in the future. Introduction of a sprinkler system to irrigate lawns.

- Constructions of storm water retention areas
- Treated sewage water recycling program
- The use of water efficient appliances (Water tap, toilet flush etc.)

9.6. Affordable and Clean Energy



The CSS and the Works Division of the university have taken action to provide affordable and clean energy in the university community as follows.

- Propose energy target for each hostel E.g.- 5% reduction of energy consumption within year 2020
- Use of solar energy for boilers senior common room and student canteens
- Installation of solar power charger stations for laptops and mobiles within university premises.

9.7. Responsible Consumption and Production



University has taken several policy decisions and is carrying out a series of activities led by the Center for Sustainability Solutions (CSS) which could be listed as followers.

- Say "No" to Polythene: Banning polythene usage in the university and introducing a reusable bag as an alternative
- Training Session for foreign students on waste segregation, 3-R concept and compost production
- Streamlining paper waste management of University of Kelaniya
- Streamlining solid waste Management Program
- Paper recycling project
- Increasing use of IT and electronic communication

9.8. Climate Action



University of Kelaniya is taking several measures to address the 'Climate Action' defined in 'Sustainable Development Goals' and several activities are carried out led by the CSS. It is expected to continue these programs, listed below, for the next 5 years.

- Increase of total area on campus covered in planted vegetation by 10%, Green walls
- Extension to plant nursery
- Habitat enrichment for wildlife (Dalugama and Ragama premises)

9.9. Life on Land



CSS (Centre for Sustainability Solutions) has carried out "Distribution of saplings to the community to commemorate the World Environment Day, 05th June 2018" to improve the "Life on Land" and it is expected that their activities will in the long term have a positive effect on Climate action, goal 13 mentioned above. Further,


measures are taken to reduce soil erosion within the university premises in order to preserve the lively habitat.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNT POLICIES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 2019

1. Corporate Information

1.1 Reporting Entity

University of Kelaniya has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978, and situated at Dalugama, Kelaniya, Sir Lanka. The University is functioned under the Ministry of Higher Education, Technology and Innovations. Before 27th November 2019 the University was under the purview of the Ministry of City Planning, Water Supply and Higher Education.

1.2 Nature of Operations and Principal Activities of the University

This is a national University mainly operates on government's funds.

The University consists of Seven Faculties namely Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies, Faculty of Humanities, Faculty of Social Sciences, Faculty of Science, Faulty of Medicine, Faculty of Computing & Technology and Faculty of Graduate Studies.

The Vision of it's is to become a Centre of excellence in creation and dissemination of knowledge for sustainable development. Main activities of the University are teaching, learning and promoting the research.

The Goals of the University are as follows:

- To create a high quality and flexible teaching and learning environment.
- To develop the highest quality faculty and staff to attain the strategic goals of the University.
- (iii) To create a multi-displinary research culture of global standing.
- (iv) To improve the image of the university by widening the range of economic and social engagements.
- To develop an excellent system of governance through efficient and effective administration and financial management.

1.3 Date of authorization of Financial Statements

The Financial Statements were authorized to issue by the Council Members on 28.02.2020.

1.4 Responsibility for Financial Statements

The Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

Components of Financial Statements are as follows:

- (i) Statement of financial position
- (ii) Statement of financial performance
- (iii) Statement of changes in net assets/equity
- (iv) Cash flow statement
- (v) Statement of comparison of Budget and Actual amount
- (vi) Notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes

1.5 Reporting period

The financial period of the University represents a twelve month period from 1st January 2019 to 31st December 2019.

2. Basis of Preparation

2.1 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statements of Changes in Net Assets / Equity, Cash Flow Statement and Notes to the Financial Statements. These statements have been prepared in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) Volume I, II & III issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and adopted by the University Grants Commission by its Financial Circular Letter No. 2/2018. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those used in the previous financial year. However Sri Lanka Accounting Standards (LKAS) also have been used in the areas where no Public Sector Accounting Standards are available.

2.2 Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis and apply consistently. No adjustments have been made for inflationary factors affecting to the Financial Statements except for the property, plant and equipment measured at fair value and retirement benefit obligations measured based on actuarial valuation method. The specific policies are explained in the succeeding notes.

2.3 Going Concern

Financial Statements have been prepared on the assumption that University is a going concern. The Council has made an assessment of the University's ability to continue as a going concern in the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the Council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the University's ability to continue as a going concern and they do not intend either to liquidate or to cease operations of the University. Therefore, the financial statements continue to be prepared on the going concern basis.

2.4 Accrual basis of Accounting

The Financial Statements, except for information on Statement of Cash Flows have been prepared following the accrual basis of accounting.

2.5 Functional and Presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees (LKR), which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

2.6 Materiality and Aggregation

Each material class of similar items have been presented separately in the financial statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have presented separately unless they are immaterial.

2.7 Comparative Information

Comparative information including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information as relevant is disclosed in respect of previous Financial Statements. The presentation and classification of the Financial Statements of the previous year are amended, where relevant for better presentation and to be comparable with those of the current year.

2.8 Rounding

All financial information presented in Sri Lankan Rupees has been rounded to the nearest rupee except when otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.9 Offsetting

Assets and Liabilities or income and expenses, are not offset unless required or permitted by Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.10 Events after the reporting period

All material events after the reporting date has been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosures wherever necessary have been made in the Financial Statements.

2.11 Transaction of foreign currencies and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where item are re measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement.

3. Summary of significant Accounting Policies

3.1 Assets and Basis of their Valuation.

3.1.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

The University applies the requirement of SLPSAS 07 on 'Property, Plant & Equipment' in accounting for its owned assets which are held for and use in the provision of the services or for administration purpose and expected to be used for more than one year. Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE) includes Lands, Buildings & Improvements, Furniture & Equipment, Lab & Teaching Equipment, Motor Vehicles, Water & Electricity Supply Scheme, Library Books and Periodicals, Cloaks, Machinery and Other Assets.

3.1.1.1 Basis of recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment is recognized if it is probable that future economic benefit associated with the assets will flow to the University and cost of the asset can be reliably measured.

3.1.1.2 Initial recognition

Property, Plant & Equipment are initially recognized at cost including the cost of purchase with any incidental expenses incurred in bringing the assets to its working conditions, for its intend use, Subsequent to initial Recognition, and property plan and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss.

3.1.1.3 Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing component of an item of property, plant & equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the University and its cost can be measured reliable. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized in accordance with the derecognition policy given below.

The costs of the repair and maintenance of property, plant & equipment are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred.

3.1.1.4 Derecognition

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant & equipment is derecognized on disposal; or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use. Any gains and losses on derecognition are recognized (calculated as the difference between the net disposals proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets) in the Statement of Profit or Loss. Gains are not classified as revenue.

3.1.1.5 Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight line basis on each component of an item of property, Plant and Equipment other than freehold land. Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale and the date that the asset is de-recognized.

The estimated useful lives for the current and comparative periods are as follows:

The assets residual values and useful live are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period, as assets carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and gain/(Loss) is recognized in the statements of comprehensive income.

3.1.1.6 Measurement after recognition

Cost Model

After recognition all the Property Plant and equipment except the classes of Land are carried at it's cost less accumulated depreciation. Lands are carried at it's costs.

· Revaluation Model

After initial recognition below classes of Property Plant and equipment whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, which is fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Carrying value of property, plant & equipment and intangible assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment if any such indications exists, then the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds it recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the statement of financial performances.

Revaluation surplus may be transferred to the general reserve proportionately as the assets are used by the university. In such a case, the amount of the surplus transferred would be the difference between depreciation based on the assets' original cost.

3.1.2 Investments

Investments represent investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts. These investments have been accounted in compliance with SLFRS 09. The investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts have seen classified at amortized cost as per SLFTS 09. They are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at fair value less amortized cost by using effective interest rate as required by SLFRS 09.

3.1.3 Staff Loans

The staff loans includes distress loan, computer loan, publication loan, vehicle loan and other staff loans. The staff loans have been classified as financial assets at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. Impairment loss in any staff loan have been recognized on expected lost method as stipulated in SLFRS 09.

3.1.4 Capital work-in-progress

Capital expenses incurred on PPE which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work – in – Progress and cost incurred on Capital Work – in – progress is transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment when it is available for use.

3.1.5 Intangible assets

Computer software and online journals have been recognized as intangible assets when it is probable that future economic benefits that are attributable to the assets will flow the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets acquired are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. These cost are amortized over a period of 5 years.

3.1.6 Current assets

Current Assets classified in Statement of Financial Position are those which are expected to be realized in, or consumption in, in the University's normal operating cycle, expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date or cash or a cash equivalent.

3.1.7 Inventories

Inventories are stated at cost and determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis. Inventories mainly comprise of stationaries and spare parts. Inventories are for consumption and not for resale.

3.1.8 Cash & cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand, demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash & cash equivalent includes cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term maturity of six months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statement is prepared based on the indirect method.

3.2 Accounting for government grants for capital expenditure

3.2.1 Recurrent grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis. Cost of rehabilitation of PPE and capital grants for construction and new work are recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary.

3.2.2 Contribution to capital outlay from outside grants

The value of Property Plant & Equipment purchased out of generated funds & various project funds were shown as "Contribution to Capital Outlay from outside Grants".

3.2.3 Capital grants

Government Grants for the Capital expenditure has presented in the Financial Statements in accordance with the LKAS 20 due to the absence of SLPSAS. According to the LKAS 20 Capital Grants has been recognized as deferred income in the statement of financial position and amortized over the useful life of the asset.

3.2.4 Internally restricted funds

Internally restricted funds include funds committed for specific purpose. Faculty Development funds represent the cumulative position of Faculties/Departments Funds with net unspent balances at the year end.

3.2.5 Endowment Fund

Endowment funds include restricted donations received by the University and investment returns generated from endowment funds are used in accordance with the various purpose established by the donors.

3.3. Employee benefits

Defined contribution plans

Employees are eligible for University Provident Fund (UPF) Contributions, Employees' Trust Fund (ETF), University pension fund, Contributions is in line with the respective statues and regulations. The University of Kelaniya pays fixed contributions on basic emoluments plus cost of Living allowances, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of employees to the University Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund, University pension fund and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. This obligation fall within the scope of the defined contribution plan SLPSA 19 on employment benefit. Obligation for contribution to define contribution plan are recognized in profit or loss as the related service is provided.

Defined benefits plans

Defined benefit plans are post-employment plans other than defined contribution plans. The University of Kelaniya is liable to pay gratuity in terms of the Payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983.

3.4 Liabilities and provisions

Current Liabilities

Current Liabilities are stated at their book value.

Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the University has present obligations (legal and constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

3.4.1 Define benefit obligations

In accordance with the Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, a liability arises for a defined benefit obligation to employees. Such defined benefit obligation is a post-employment benefit obligation falling within the scope of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting SLPSA 19 Employee Benefit. The liability recognized in the Statement of Financial Position is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit method (PUC). Re-measurement of the defined benefit liability, which comprises actuarial gains and losses are recognized immediately in the statement of financial performances. The University recognizes the increase in defined benefit liability attribute to the services provided by employees during the year (current service cost) in profit or loss together with interest expenses. The discount rate has been derived considering the yield of government bonds.

Accounting Estimate

The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions about discount rates, expected rates of return on assets, future salary increase and mortality rates, due to the long term nature of the obligation, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainly.

3.4.2 Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the programme or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainly does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the financial statement.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University. The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses it existence where inflow of economic benefits are probable but not virtually certain.

3.4.3 Revenue recognition

3.4.3.1 Income from fee levying courses

Income from fee levying courses and other activities are recognized on accrual basis over the period of course and degrees.

3.4.3.2 Finance Income

Interest income is recognized on accruing basis using effective interest rate method according to SLFRS 09 due to the absence of SLPSAS.

3.4.4 Expenditure Recognition

Expenses incurred in carrying out all activities of the University are recognized on an accrual and charged to the statement of Financial Performance.

3.4.5 Statement of cash flows

The cash flow statement has been prepared by the using the indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD), a World Bank funded Project

Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) Operation is another World Bank funded project aimed at supporting higher education sector of Sri Lanka from 2018 to 2023. The scope of this operation focuses on higher education activities under the Ministry of Higher Education, the UGC, and the 15 universities, SLIATE, ATIs and non-state HEIs approved by the Ministry of Higher Education and the University Grants Commission. The AHEAD will support three strategic result areas; (1) Increasing students' enrolment in Higher Education in priority disciplines for economic development, (2) Improving the quality of Higher Education and (3) Promoting Research, Development and Innovation. The project's support to expand students' enrollment in state universities, is focused on Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, (STEM) Humanities, Education, Management and Social Science (HEMS) programs through a combination of demand and supply initiatives. The project further assists Enriching Learning, Teaching and Assessment (ELTA), English Language Skills Enhancement (ELSE), Professional Development and Quality assurance activities while promoting a culture of research, development, innovation and commercialization (RDIC) in Universities. The project also extend supports for University business linkage aimed at increasing collaboration with professional expertise in technology transfer, business model development, establishing business incubators, and enabling academics and students to obtain professional business advice and training.

Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS) has exclusively been established in the University of Kelaniya headed by a Director and other staff to handle Finance, Procurement and other administrative work of the project. It is the responsibility of the project staff at OTS, to coordinate, monitor and facilitate the implementation of project activities at various faculties, and departments throughout the span of project cycle. The Operations and Monitoring Support Team (OMST) at national level integrated with UGC, is also coordinating and monitoring the project implementation while extending technical, and operational expertise.

In University of Kelaniya, the AHEAD Operation has approved grants totaling to LKR 667 million excluding the salary and allowances of OTS staff, until end of December 2019 under 14 various grants which have already commenced implementing their respective development proposals. Out of this grant, OTS of the Kalaniya University was able to disburse a sum of Rs 84.67 million as of December 2029. The details of the grants are attached herewith.

34. Science and Technology Human Resources Development Project.

The Science and Technology Human Resource Development Project funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) supports the government to develop technology faculties in three universities viz. University of Kelaniya, Rajarata University of Sri Lanka and Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, and the Faculty of Engineering at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura to nurture a new breed of technology-oriented graduates equipped with market-relevant skills and entrepreneurial spirit. It will address lack of financing for technology degree programs, which are high in demand from students and industry. The project will provide innovative technology and industry-relevant education and research facilities, help quality curriculum design and academic staffing aligned with industry demand and international standards, and provide competitive industry and foreign university grant scheme and capacity development opportunities.

The project has five key outputs planned: (1). Innovative technology learning and research environment established, (2). Quality and industry-relevant higher technology education programs implemented, (3). Industry linkages and international collaborations strengthened, (4). Faculty management capacity strengthened, and (5). New higher education project preparation supported.

The total contribution for the project from the Asian Development Bank is USD 145 Million while the government contribution is USD 20 Million. The ADB funding is composed of two loan categories: Ordinary capital resources (USD 83.02 Million) and Concessional ordinary capital resources lending (USD 61.98 Million).

The Faculty of Computing and Technology of the University of Kelaniya has been allocated a total sum of USD 29.2 Million under this project and a further sum of USD 10 Million is available for the four universities to be utilised under competitive proposal basis.

The Faculty of Computing and Technology will utilise the above funding to construct a building complex at the proposed Mudun Ela premises, procure books, software & equipment, train the staff, establish partnership programmes with reputed international universities and develop collaborative programmes with the industry.

The overall project will be managed by the Project Management Unit (PMU) established under the Ministry of City Planning, Water Supply and Higher Education while the project coordination at the university level will be handled by the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) headed by a Deputy Project Director. The responsibilities of the PIU includes monitoring and supervising construction of the faculty buildings and designing and implementing project activities, including procurement of goods and services, within the scope of the project to develop the faculty with assistance of the University Council/Senate and university academic staff.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ended 31 December 2019 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Disclaimer of Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ended 31 December 2019 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2019 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with provisions of the sub section 108 (1) of the University Act No. 16 of 1978 and provision of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. This report sets out my views and observations that I intend to publish with the Annual Report of the University under Subsection 108 (1) of the Universities Act. My report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(6) of the Constitution will be tabled in due course.

I do not express an opinion on the accompanying financial statements of the University of Kelaniya. Because of the significance of the matters discussed in the Basis for Disclaimer of Opinion section of my report, I have not been able to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion on these financial statements.

1.2 Basis for Disclaimer of Opinion

- a. In terms of section 49 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 7, if an item of property, plant and equipment is revalued, the entire class of property, plant and equipment to which that asset belongs should be revalued, but land and buildings valued at Rs. 127,033,367 had not been revalued. Also, the value of these un-revalued lands and buildings was not included in the financial statements.
- b. Even though land and buildings had not been disposed during the year under review, a sum of Rs.135,602,989 from the revaluation surplus account had been incorrectly adjusted to the financial performance statement as per paragraph 55 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 07. As a result, the surplus and revaluation reserve in the year under review were over stated and under stated respectively by that amount.
- c. The value of the lands assessed for Rs. 159,970,745 which had been given to an external entity had not been removed from the accounts, thus the total value of the lands stated in the financial statements was over stated by the above value.
- d. The amortization amount of Rs. 22,988,000 relevant to the vehicles in the year 2018 had been erroneously deducted from the revaluation account, thus the revaluation profit of the financial statements had been under stated by that amount.
- e. Rent income for the year under review amounted to Rs. 2,900,000, received in 2018, for People's Bank building located at the University of Kelaniya was adjusted to the income of the previous year, thus the surplus for the year under review was under stated by the that amount.
- f. In accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 7, fixed assets of an entity should be categorized according to the nature of those assets and the manner in which they are used for operations and should be depreciated over the effective lifetime of each asset class. However, furniture, equipment and electrical appliance of the university had been categorized under the same asset class as furniture and equipment, regardless of their nature and effective lifetime. Also, without disclosing the percentage

of depreciation of electronic appliance of 20 percent per annum in the financial statements, those assets costed for Rs. 1,477 million had been depreciated at 20 percent

- g. 419 Journal vouchers worth of Rs. 5,642 million, adjustment made in the earned revenue and government grants accounts, had not been furnished for audit.
- h. The unidentified direct credit valued for Rs. 525,000 coming from 2016 and 2017 in a bank current account had not been recognised and adjusted in the accounts. Also, 60 unrecognized direct debts amounting to Rs. 4,356,795 relevant to two current accounts had been accounted under sundry income without recognising.

1.3 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the University's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the University or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the University's financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the University.

1.4 Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also,

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether
 due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and
 obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.
 The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for
 one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions,
 misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of
 expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However,

future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.

 Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 includes specific provisions for following requirements.

- I have not obtained all the information and explanation that considered necessary for the
 purpose of audit and I was unable to determine whether proper accounting records have
 been kept by the University as per the requirement of section 12 (a) of the National
 Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- The financial statements presented is consistent with the preceding year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- The financial statements presented includes all the recommendations made by me in the
 previous year as per the requirement of section 6(1)(d)(iv) of the National Audit Act, No.
 19 of 2018.

Based on the procedures performed and evidence obtained were limited to matters that are material, nothing has come to my attention;

- to state that any member of the governing body of the University has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the University which are out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12(d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- to state that University has not complied with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the University as per the requirement of section 12(f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 except for the observations given below.

Reference to Laws, Rules/

Description

(a) Financial Regulation of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka

(i) Financial Regulation 371

Even though advance should be settled soon after the relevant work was completed, advances amounting to Rs. 1,238,950 given in 14 instances had not been settled over more than 01 year.

(ii) Financial Regulation 396

Action had not been taken in terms of Financial Regulations regarding 287 cheques cancelled during the period 03 November 2016 to 28 June 2019 valued for Rs. 1,636,179 and had been shown under current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(iii) Financial Regulation 571

Action had not been taken in terms of Financial Regulations regarding the deposits in the University for various purposes over 02 years amounted to Rs. 64,179,618 and liabrary deposits amounted to Rs. 11,312,500 deposited more than 05 years ago.

- to state that the University has not performed according to its powers, functions and duties as per the requirement of section 12(g) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- to state that the resources of the University not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12(h) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

3. Other Audit Observations

- (a) A total sum of Rs. 1,628,462 had in 04 funds had not been utilized for the intended purpose over a period of 02 years. Also, total grant of Rs. 6,450,752 received in 2011 and 2013 for the construction of a hostel for foreign students in Pali and Buddhist Studies remained underutilized without being utilized for the relevant purposes. The balance of grant received for One Asia Foundation program amounted to Rs. 205,589 remained over more than 02 years, Rs. 4,149,700 received from the University Grants Commission and the balance of money received for international conferences and workshops amounted to Rs. 6,907,764 were underutilized during the year under review.
- (b) A total sum of Rs. 7,730,800 received as interest income as at 31 December 2019 on 10 Scholarship Funds and 11 Gift Funds amounting to Rs. 6,720,965 shown in the financial statements of the University was underutilized without being utilized for the relevant purposes.
- (c) A sum of Rs.694,603 (US \$ 3,840) paid to University lecturers as casual allowances without approval of the relevant Ministry had not been recovered even until the date of audit on 22 June 2020.
- (d) Cameras, televisions and computers procured on 27 January 2017 for the Studio of the Drama and Reflective Arts Unit at a cost of Rs. 9,929,568 and, 5 cameras and 7 computers received in 2016 cost at Rs. 4,124,830 remained idle from those years until the date of the audit of 26 June 2020.
- (e) Staff loan balance outstanding from 01 year to more than 04 years amounting to Rs. 82,561,766 and loan outstanding for more than 5 years amounting to Rs. 652,784 was shown in financial assets in the financial statement for the year under review. Only a provision of Rs. 43,652 was made available for bad debtors.
- (f) A sum of Rs. 24,849,209 had been paid without properly confirming the arrival and departure of external lecturers at the University during the year under review.
- (g) The approved and actual cadre in 06 faculties in the University were 728 and 636 respectively as at 31 December in the year under review. As such, while there were 142

vacancies, 148 lecturers had taken sabbatical leave and annual leave and only 494 lecturers were employed for providing education for 12028 students. Accordingly, it was observed during the audit that there was not enough academic staff in the service to provide a quality education to the students.

- (h) The primary objective of the Code of Ethics for university lecturers is to develop and teach students and, accordingly, all lecturers are required to conduct regular research. But the total amount received for the implementation of such research in 29 funds amounted to Rs. 8,096,327 had not been utilized for more than a year.
- (i) 22 lecturers who had gone abroad for postgraduate and doctoral degrees since 2011 had not reported for duty and due to breach of bond agreements Rs. 97,259,926 had to be recovered as at 31st December of the year under review. Also, due to the non-return of experienced and qualified lecturers from overseas, the opportunity of obtaining that knowledge was lost to the university.
- (j) No action has been taken to update the fixed asset register after 2007 to strengthen the security and control of assets.
- (k) It was observed in the audit that, study leave with capital grants had been granted for 5 lecturers with full salaries and allowances to complete the postgraduate qualifications but had not been returned and, as such, the basic objectives of improving the quality of education through the knowledge of the lecturers could not be fulfilled.

Meeting

As per Public Enterprises Circular No. P.E.D./31, Committee meeting should be held at least four times a year. The Committee met four times in the year under review and the internal and external audit reports were discussed at these meetings. The committee reports were submitted to the University Council for information and necessary actions.

Main responsibilities

The main objective of the Audit Committee is to assist the Council for the efficient functions of the financial matters of the University

The main responsibilities are,

- Review and Supervision of the financial statements, financial reporting and Continuation of the Audit Process.
- 2. Examine any matters related to the finance of the University and other related matters.
- 3. Approving the annual internal Audit Plans and Programmes.
- 4. Supervision of the Internal Audit Plan and Programme.
- 5. Investigate the external and internal audit reports and take follow up action on recommendations.
- 6. Review and Supervision of the effective performance of the system controls.

- Review performance at regular intervals for cost effectiveness and to eliminate wasteful expenditure Etc.
- 8. Ascertain whether statutes, regulations, rules and circulars are complied with.

Activities within the year.

The Committee was engaged in the following activities within the year under review:

1. Approval and Supervision of the annual internal audit plans and programmes.

The Committee approved and supervised the internal audit plan and programme for the year 2019. The committee reviewed and supervised the effectiveness of the internal audits, performance of the queries and the performance of the Internal Audit Division.

2. Compliance with Laws and Regulations

The compliance with the relevant laws and regulations were reviewed with the reports submitted by the external and internal auditors. The Committee further followed up on the preparation and presentation of the annual accounts reports of the University and the settlement of statutory payments such as Gratuity, Pensions and the Provident Funds.

3. Continuous review and Supervision on the violation of Contracts.

The committee continuously reviewed and supervised the recovery process from the staff members who violated bonds. As a result, it was able to recover the complete bond amount from 01 person and Approximately Rs. 20.4 million was recovered in the year under review. There were 17 bond violators at the beginning of the year 2019. It was able to recover the whole bond value from one person within the year. Eight persons are paying the installments in cash and legal actions had already been taken to recover the relevant amounts from three persons. The bond value of one person was being audited for the accuracy and reminders had been sent for eight persons who had dues, informing them to pay the installments on time.

4. Review and strengthening of the internal control system.

Necessary recommendations on the control of Fixed Assets, regulating the expenditure for contractual activities, lending library books, annual board of survey of stores/survey of fixed assets, recovering the unsettled advances, settling the unrecognized and settled loan balances and strengthening the internal controls. Further committee continuously reviewed the action taken to correct the weaknesses pointed out by the Auditor General's Report and the Audit Queries issued during the year 2019.

5. Audit Committee Meetings

The Audit Committee meetings were held at four occasions within the year ended as at 31st December 2019. All the Audit Committee members actively participated in all the committees. A representative from the Auditor General's Department participated at every meeting of the Audit Committee as an observer. Other staff members from the University were also invited when required. Senior Assistant Internal Auditor act as the Secretary of the Committee.

Conclusion

The committee was satisfied with the success of the follow up activities based on the recommendations on the matters considered by the committee in the year 2019.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and the Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements of the University of Kelaniya for the Year ending 31st December 2019 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.

The clarifications with reference to your equal numbered report of the Auditor-General dated 18th August 2020 as per Section 12 of the Audit Act No. 18 of 2018 on the financial statements for the year ended on 31st December 2019 are presented as follows:

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Disclaimer of Opinion

1.2 Basis for Disclaimer of Opinion

Steps have been taken to reevaluate lands and buildings that were not revalued and include them in the financial statements for the year 2020.

- (a) Steps have been taken to correct it in the year 2020.
- (b) Steps will be taken to correct it in the year 2020.
- (c) Has been corrected in the year 2020 by the Journal No. R-0111.
- (d) Necessary instructions have been given to minimize these defects in future.
- (e) It is the policy of the University to depreciate furniture by 10%, office and electric equipment by 20% annually under the straight-line method. Steps have been taken to mention this under the depreciation policy of the financial statements and account the

- furniture and office equipment as two separate categories in the Financial Statements of the year 2020.
- (f) Though at the time of the audit, there was an issue regarding binding the journal vouchers in stack, there was no disturbance to audit such vouchers. The journals in stack had been produced for the Government audit Division.

The matters such as the book-binder post which is responsible for binding the vouchers had been vacant, a new recruitment had not been done due to the absence of a stable government and the effects of the COVID-19 had caused the delay in producing the journal vouchers to the Government audit Division.

According to the letter on requesting journal voucher, numbered HED/E/UOK/ 10/2019/1 and dated 04th March 2020, the following journal vouchers had been produced to the Government audit Division.

- .1dated 2020.03.045 journal vouchers on recurrent expenditure
- .2dated -2020.03.1113 stacks of journal vouchers on the expenses incurred from the earned income
- .3dated 2020.03.1210 stacks of journal vouchers for the recurrent expenditure

In addition, the sub-sheet books of all the journal vouchers were submitted to the Government Audit Section.

As the Government Audit Section was established within the University, any matter could be resolved. As it is observed that this matter had not been settled due to the COVID-19 effects and necessary approval for the relevant payments had been obtained, it is clear that the transaction of those vouchers do not have any significant impact on the financial outcome.

(h) The Peoples' Bank – Kelaniya branch is contacted daily to obtain information on the direct credits that cannot be daily identified with respect of the Bank accounts.

With regard to the direct credits, though copies of the money depositing slips are obtained from the Bank, it has been unable to identify the direct credits as relevant information for the income credits are not indicated on those copies.

All the sections of the university have been informed about the direct credits that cannot be identified and these direct credits are accounted as mixed income under the covering approval of the Finance Committee due to the absence of information.

Cheques valuing Rs. 607,634.11 that had not been deposited as at 31.12.2017, have been transferred to the income under the approval of the Council as no response had been received after informing the drawers. Steps are being taken during these days to inform the relevant drawers about the cheques for the period from 01.01.2018 to 28.06.2019 and action has been taken to transfer the cheques for which no response is received, to the income in the due manner.

Library deposits are released after the relevant student has submitted a request for it. Therefore, the University is unable to release the said amounts until requests from students are received.

During this year, a part of the library deposits of the students for the years 2013 and 2014, has been released. Such money would be released as per the requests of the students.

3. Other Audit Observations

(a) As the relevant international seminars and workshops have been concluded, action will be taken to submit the balance amount to the Finance Committee and make the corrections during the year 2020 as per the recommendations of the said Committee.

The balance regarding the One Asia Foundation programme has been transferred by the journal No. 143 to the Development fund of the Sinhala Department. (has been recommended by the Finance Committee no. 2020-05.)

- (c) This amount has been paid as the casual allowance to 16 academic staff members for the study tour in the year 2019 of the MBA course of the Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies. Action had been taken to obtain the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers for this purpose and steps will be taken to recover the said amount from the said staff members if the said approval is not received.
- (d) Five cameras, seven computers purchased in the year 2016 and cameras, televisions and computers purchased on 27th January 2017 are included in the stock inventory of the Department and instructions have been issued by way of a letter signed by the Vice-Chancellor had been issued to the Heads of Units to utilize them for the academic purposes of the undergraduates.
- (e) All the employee loans approved by the University Grants Commission, including the distress loans and transport loans are recovered in 60 installments. Accordingly, loans are recovered in a period of 6 year and a monthly interest of 4.2% is incurred. Therefore, an amount of Rs. 82,561,766/- is remained as the balance from the year one to year four.

The loan balances exceeding five years should be as Rs. -/676,096 and an amount of Rs. 335,039/- is in active status and an amount of Rs. -/173,407 had been paid as at July 2020.

An amount of Rs. 341, -/057has been identified for a long time as an unrecoverable loan and action has been taken to release most of the loans with the release of the Provident Funds.

Information on two loan balances in which the years 1994 and 2000 are mentioned as the final years for the loans, cannot be found and these two loans are identified as doubtful debts.

- (f) The Faculty of Humanities is maintaining a Registry for marking the attendance of the visiting lecturers and each Department is monthly analyzing the accuracy of the attendance records and the number of hours of the visiting lecturers when their payments are made.
- (g) Allocation of lecture hours for the visiting lecturers is done by the relevant Department. At present, there are 637 vacancies in the academic staff and paper advertisements have been published to fill some of the vacancies in that staff while interviews have been scheduled for the vacancies for which applications were called.
- (h) Steps will be taken to return the balance provisions of the completed researches and balance of some research have already returned. The balance money of the research projects that have been stalled, have been transferred to other research under the approval of the Council.

Some of the research projects have not been implemented in the previous year due to the absence of research factors, but they are to be implemented further.

With regard to the non-functioning projects, action will be taken to inform the researchers and recover the amounts after obtaining the approval of the Finance Committee.

- (i) There are 23 lecturers who have violated the contract and bond due to not reporting to duty after going abroad for the post-graduate and doctorate studies and the amount due from is Rs. 111,394,575.30. For the academic staff, foreign study leave is recommended to fulfill their post-graduate degree qualifications. It is not possible to limit these leaves.
- (j) The steps to update the fixed assets registry have already been initiated and the revaluation of the assets has been almost completed. As there were no clear details on the purchasing value and dates of the disposed assets, it was unable to adjust to the accounts. However, the preparation work of the 2020 fixed assets registry has been implemented.
- (k) Details of the lecturers who had gone abroad for completing the post-graduate qualifications but had returned without completing the said qualifications are as follows:
