












Qualifications of Non-academic Staff








Number of Funds for Promoting Research

Trends in Publications by University Academic Staff, by CiteScore Quartile



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






New Entrants Across Years







Total Enrollment Across Years




Total Academic Staff Across Years





Trend in Scholarly Outputs Indexed in Scopus





Scholarly Output on SDGs







UNIVERSITY OF RELATIVE, STILLING

The University of Kelaniya has its origin in the historic Vidyalankara Pirivena, founded in 1875 by Ratmalane Sri Dharmaloka Thero as a center of learning for Buddhist monks. With the establishment of modern universities in Sri Lanka in the 1940s and 1950s, the Vidyalankara Pirivena became the Vidyalankara University in 1959, later the Vidyalankara Campus of the University of Ceylon in 1972, and, ultimately, the University of Kelaniya in 1978.

The University has seven faculties including 56 academic departments, three other academic units and two affiliated institutes, namely the Postgraduate Institute of Pali and Buddhist Studies and the Postgraduate Institute of Archaeology. At present, the Gampaha Wickramarachchi Ayurvedic Institute, which was also an affiliated institute of the UoK, has become a separate university.


All the faculties except the Medical Faculty at Ragama Premises and the Faculty of Computer and Technology at Peliyagoda Premises are located at the Dalugama Premises. The University of Kelaniya is the first university to start teaching science in Sinhala. It also took the lead in establishing academic departments in relevant study streams: the Department of Industrial Management and Department of Microbiology were the first of their kind, established in the Faculty of Science; the Department of Linguistics, the Department of Fine Arts, the Department of Modern Languages and the Department of Hindi of the Faculty of Humanities were established at UoK first; the Faculty of Social Sciences pioneered the establishment of the Department of Mass Communication and the Department of Library and Information Sciences for the first time in Sri Lanka.

The University provides a range of vital services to its students via a specialized set of university centers and units. Key among them are the Student Counselling Service, Career Guidance Unit, Personal Counselling Unit (Kalana Mithuru Sevana), Medical Center, Physical Education Center, Cultural Center, Arts Council, the Library (including Faculty Libraries), the Information and Communication Technology Center and the International Student Affairs Unit. In addition, several other units and centers have been established to offer other services related to the effective administration of the university: among these are the Internal Quality Assurance Centre, University Statistics and Data Monitoring Unit (USDMU), Media Unit, Staff Development Center, Technology and Innovation Support Centre, Sustainable Development Centre, Centre for Distance and Continuing Education (CDCE), Centre of Excellence for Strategic Brand Identity Development (CEBID) and the Inter-Faculty Center for Coordinating the Modular System (ICCMS).

The University of Kelaniya has introduced a free insurance scheme for students and staff as it is concerned not only with the quality of the graduates but also with the well-being of the students and the staff. It is the first-ever university in the country to offer up to five million rupees for the doctoral studies of the staff members. In addition, a large amount of money has been allocated for aesthetic and sports activities of the university.

The bhikku hostel and the women's hostel complex are located within the university premises, while the men's hostels and some of the women's hostels are located in the surrounding area outside the university premises. Mahapola and Bursary scholarships are given every year to students with financial difficulties. Apart from these two main scholarship schemes, the Alumni Association of the University also supports students with financial difficulties who are not eligible to receive Mahapola or Bursary scholarships.

The human resources of the university include the academic staff members, the administrative staff, the academic support staff, and the non-academic staff. The following diagram illustrates the organizational structure of the University.

YEAR IN REVIEW - 2021

INTRODUCTION

Kelaniya rose to the challenge of delivering online education for all its students, and expedited transition to digitalized systems and processes in the management of its affairs. Throughout 2021, the University continued to strengthen its digital infrastructure to support the enhanced need for online delivery of learning activities and materials, the conduct of various forms of assessment, the use of video conferencing platforms for meetings and conferences, and recruitment procedures. At the same time, the University used the opportunity provided by the physical absence of students to renovate and refurbish hostels and other common amenities.

Several significant transitions took place in the year under review. In March, the Gampaha Wickramaarachchi Ayurveda Institute, which had been affiliated to the University of Kelaniya since 1995, became an independent university known as the Gampaha Wickramaarachchi University of Indigenous Medicine. Senior Professor Janitha Liyanage of the Department of Chemistry in the Faculty of Science of the University of Kelaniya was appointed as the first Vice-Chancellor of the new University.

At the end of June, Mr. W.M. Karunaratne, who had served as the Registrar of the University of Kelaniya for 17 years, retired from service. He was succeeded by Mr. K.K.K. Dharmathilake, who is an alumnus of the Universities of Colombo and Kelaniya.

In October, our much venerated and beloved Chancellor, the Most Venerable Welamitiyawe Kusaladhamma Thero, who had served in this capacity for nearly 25 years, passed away. The University was pleased to welcome Aggamahapanditha Ven. Kollupitiye Mahinda Sangharakkitha Thero, the Chief Incumbent of the Kelaniya Rajamaha Viharaya, appointed by His Excellency the President, as the new Chancellor of the University of Kelaniya.

STUDENT INTAKE AND GRADUATION

A total of 3,959 new internal undergraduate students were enrolled in the first half of 2021 for the academic year 2019/20, and the total enrollment of internal undergraduates in the University of Kelaniya in 2021 rose to 13,673. The total number of students enrolled in external undergraduate programs was 95,692, while 2,970 students enrolled in postgraduate programs offered by the University of Kelaniya.

Because of delays caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, only 2,655 students graduated from internal undergraduate degree programs. However, 5,596 students graduated from external undergraduate degree programs and 1,408 students graduated from postgraduate degree programs. Four convocations were held during the year, and students were encouraged to obtain their degree certificates in absentia due to the difficulty of holding convocations physically in the earlier months of 2021.

STAFF

During the year 2021, 25 academic staff members of the Faculty of Medicine and 2 academic staff members of the Faculty of Science received President's Awards for Scientific Publications in the year 2018. To motivate academics and appreciate their research efforts, 270 Senate awards and cash prizes were awarded, and 77 academic staff members received Vice-Chancellor's Awards. Several faculties and academic departments had organized 14 research conferences including 10 international conferences to promote the research culture in the University of Kelaniya.

Moreover, five researchers of the University of Kelaniya, Senior Professor Nilanthi de Silva, Senior Professor Janaka de Silva, Professor K.T.A.A. Kasturirathna, Senior Professor Asita de Silva and Professor Sachith Mettananda were ranked among the top 2% of scientists in the list of outstanding researchers prepared by Elsevier BV and Stanford University, USA.

The University of Kelaniya was ranked 2nd place among the local universities and 754th place among the global universities by the SCIMAGO Institutions Rankings in 2021. SCImago is an interactive open-access platform that analyses research performance, innovation outputs and societal impact and the university has shown good progress in Scopus Indexed publications during the past five years.

In addition, the university was ranked in 6th place in Sri Lanka, in 137th place in the South Asian region and 2,557th place globally in Webometrics ranking (July edition). Moreover, the University of Kelaniya has ranked 2nd locally and 124th in the Asian region and 247th globally in UI Green Metrics ranking 2021.

Apart from the research activities, the film, Viyasiduru, produced by the University of Kelaniya has won awards in Paris International Film Awards 2021, Calcutta International Cult Film Festival 2021, World Film Carnival - Singapore 2021, Golden Sparrow International Film Festival 2021, and in Halicarnassus film Festival Turkey 2021. Apart from that, the movie has been officially selected in Port Blair International Film Festival 2021, Indo French International Film Festival, Vanilla Palm Film Festival & Art Competition California 2021, Druk International film Festival 2021, Tagore International Film Festival 2021.

The official website of the University of Kelaniya, www.kln.ac.lk won the gold award for the Best University and Education Institute website and the silver award overall at the BestWeb.lk competition in 2021.

The University of Kelaniya has seven Faculties, 56 Departments of study, and several units and centers. Table 2-1 illustrates the student capacity, number of degree programs, number of academic staff, graduate output, and staff to student ratio of each Faculty.



OUTLOOK FOR THE FUTURE

he University of Kelaniya is striving to look beyond 2030 despite the extraordinary circumstances created by the Covid-19 pandemic. Key among its many initiatives the most prioritized is the goal to qualify to be ranked in the Times Higher Education World Ranking. The University of Kelaniya has already entered the QS Asia University Rankings 2022.

Most future programmes and activities shall be developed to look beyond 2030 and align with the university ranking expectations. An information and communications technology (ICT) roadmap will pave the way for; introducing and embedding ed-tech to improve the student learning experience; and improve administrative efficiency. The University of Kelaniya recognizes the importance of



Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and will be working closely with various stakeholders to increase its contribution to achieving Sri Lanka's SDG footprint. The University recognizes that it's imperative to increase student intake and graduate employability as we approach the next decade. Limited building facilities remains a major obstacle to introduce new programs and increase student intake. Moreover, macroeconomic condition in Sri Lanka may also affect graduate employability.

UNIVERSITY GOVERNANCE

The University of Kelaniya follows the organizational structure and line of responsibilities laid down in the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and is bound to comply with the regulations and guidance provided by the UGC from time to time through its Circulars.

The Council, the Senate, and the Faculty Boards are statutory bodies that formulate policies at different levels of operation. The organogram of UoK illustrates the position of all the officers with their duties, responsibilities and the line of reporting.

The Chancellor and Officers of the University

The Chancellor is the Head of the University who presides over convocations, while the Vice-Chancellor is the principal executive officer, the principal academic officer, and the chief accounting officer of the University. The Vice-Chancellor is an ex-officio member and Chairperson of both the Council and the Senate of the University and bears responsibility for implementation of the decisions of the Council and the Senate. The Deans are the academic and administrative heads of each Faculty and the ex-officio Chairperson of the respective Faculty Board. They are ex-officio members of the Council and Senate. The Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies is responsible for coordinating and regulating postgraduate studies as well as specialized or multidisciplinary research carried out within the university, subject to the direction and control of the Senate.

The Registrar is responsible for the disciplinary control of its non-academic staff and has the custody of the records and property of the University. He is the ex-officio Secretary to the Council and the Senate. The Librarian is responsible for the administration of the libraries of the University and is also an ex-officio member of the Senate. The Bursar is responsible for the management of the University's finances and the maintenance of its accounts.



THE UNIVERSITY COUNCIL

The Council is the executive body and governing authority of the University. The Council of the University of Kelaniya consists of the Vice-Chancellor, the seven Deans of the Faculties, two members elected by the Senate from among its members and eleven members appointed by the UGC. The Vice-Chancellor chairs the Council, while the Registrar is the Secretary to the Council. Council members serve on all Selection Committees for recruitment and promotion of academic staff, and on the following statutory committees:

- Finance Committee
- Audit Committee
- Management Committee of the Centre for Distance & Continuing Education

THE SENATE

The Senate is the academic authority of the University and comprises of the Vice-Chancellor who is the ex-officio Chairperson, the Directors of the PGIAR and PGIPBS, Deans of Faculties, Heads of Departments, Senior Professors and Professors, the Librarian, and two academic members from each faculty who are elected from the permanent academics of the respective faculty. The Senate, in the exercise of its duties, has appointed several Standing Committees in the following areas.

- Quality Assurance
- Curriculum, Learning, Teaching and Evaluation
- Library
- Leave and Awards

- Research and Publications
- Admissions
- Honorary Degrees

FACULTY BOARDS

The Faculty Boards regulate matters connected with teaching, examinations and research in the respective faculties, subject to the control of the Senate. All academic departments come under the purview of the respective Faculty Board. The departments of study are responsible for the development of curricula, teaching, assessments, research, and other relevant academic matters of each department.

GOVERNANCE DOCUMENT : STRATEGIC PLANE & ANNUAL ACTION PLANE

In 2021, the University of Kelaniya decided to change from its previous practice of working with a 5-year rolling Corporate Plan and adopted a 3-year Strategic Plan. The Strategic Plan for 2022-2024 is designed to be pragmatic, real, and relevant, influencing the university's vital institutional decisions and addressing the prioritized requirements of both staff and students while sharing the overall vision of the university with its partners for the next three years. This also sets the platform for articulating a set of values guiding the University's work over the next three years. The Action Plan is the proposed activity plan for a specific year and is based on the Strategic Plan.



STATUTORY COMMITTEES

Finance Committee

The Council of the University of Kelaniya has appointed a Finance Committee (FC) to make recommendations with respect to finance-related matters to support the Council. The composition of the FC is as follows.

- Vice-Chancellor-Chairperson
- Deans of Faculties
- Two members of the Council
- Registrar
- Bursar-Convener

FC meets once a month and takes decisions on all matters related to the finances of the University. All financial matters, including program budgets, are properly evaluated in line with governing regulations and as per the university development plan. Recommendations of the FC are submitted for approval of the Council. FC receives matters referred by the Vice-Chancellor, Deans of Faculties, Registrar, Bursar, Heads of Departments, Heads of Divisions or Senate. FC is one of the subcommittees of the Council.

Procurement Committee

The University of Kelaniya has its Department Procurement Committee (DPC) which is appointed by the Secretary of the Ministry of Education in line with Procurement Guidelines of 2006 and its subsequent amendments. Thus, the University has two types of PCs: the DPC (Major) and the DPC (Minor). DPC (Minor) takes up the procurements below Rs. 5 million while DPC (Major) takes up procurement up to 200 million as per current guidelines. The composition of the DPC (Major) is the Vice-Chancellor as chairperson, a member appointed by the Secretary of the Ministry of Education and the Bursar as member. The composition of the DPC (Minor) is the Vice-Chancellor as Chairperson, Registrar—as member and Bursar as member. Meanwhile, a Supplies Committee (SC) is also appointed by the governing body to assist the procurement of the University. SC supports the DPC, and it takes up procurement up to Rs. 500,000/-. In addition, the University has its Project Procurement Committee (PPC) appointed by the Secretary of the Ministry of Education.

Audit Committee

As per the Public Enterprises Circular No.P.E.D./31, the Audit Committee meeting should be held at least four times a year. The main objective of the Audit Committee is to assist the Council to carry out efficient financial functions an related management activities of the University.

The main responsibilities of the Audit Committee are the review and supervision of financial statements, financial reporting, and the continuation of the audit process, the examination of any matters related to the finance of the University, the approval of the annual internal audit plans and programs, the supervision of the Internal Audit Plan and Program, the investigation of the external and internal audit reports and the follow up on recommendations. Their review, supervision, and examination of compliance with system controls to ensure effective performance, the review of performance at regular intervals for cost-effectiveness and elimination of wasteful expenditure etc., ascertaining whether statutes, regulations, rules, and circulars are complied with are all responsibilities of the Audit Committee.

ETHICAL AND SAFETY STANDARDS

The University has two Ethics Review Committees (ERC). The Ethics Review Committee of the Faculty of Medicine was established in 1995 to promote research ethics among undergraduates, postgraduate students, academics, and the wider community of researchers. Its primary objective is the protection of humans participating in biomedical research. This is achieved through review and monitoring processes carried out in accordance with the guidelines of the Forum of Ethics Review Committees in Sri Lanka (FERCSL guidelines) and other relevant national and international legislation and guidelines.

The Ethics Review Committee of the University of Kelaniya was established in 2016, with the aim of promoting high quality research and is dedicated to maintaining the highest ethical standards as enshrined in its vision and mission. The ERC of the University of Kelaniya covers several aspects of research ethics pertaining to the research conducted by the Faculties of Commerce and Management, Computing and Technology, Graduate Studies, Humanities, Science and Social Sciences.

HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELL - BEING

The University has a Health Centre (UHC) to help the students and staff of the University to lead an active life free from disease. It contributes towards the wellbeing of students and provides a comprehensive, preventive health service. All registered students and staff are entitled to free consultations, free basic medicinal drugs, laboratory service and other services. The UHC functions as an outpatients' department (OPD), attending to the health needs of all internal students and around 2000 academic and non-academic staff, as well as their close relatives. The UHC provides OPD consultation, day treatment and emergency treatment for the university community. Patients are referred to relevant clinics or transferred to tertiary care hospitals as relevant. The UHC has qualified staff, a well-equipped laboratory, a pharmacy, and other required facilities to provide these services effectively. A Dental Clinic & Ayurvedic medical facilities are also available at the UHC.

The University Medical Officers are well trained in student counselling and student health, especially in areas of sexual & reproductive health and psychological problems of youth. In addition, UHC conducts medical examinations, certifying the fitness of students involved in sports activities and of academic staff and/or students who go abroad for study purposes or international conferences or tournaments. The Chief Medical Officer of the UHC is responsible for the medical confirmation for service and granting extensions of service to the staff based on the findings of medical examination. All the medical certificates of students and staff are evaluated and certified by CMO.


GRIEVANCE HANDLING

Introduction Of The Faculty

he Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies, University of Kelaniya is one of the fast-developing faculties in Sri Lanka. It was established in 1976, branching out from the Faculty of Social Sciences. Subsequently, it became a prestigious faculty in the University of Kelaniya. With hard work, perseverance, and the dedication of the academic staff, students, and other bodies the FCMS was able to achieve faculty status in 1995. It conducts a multitude of programs under five (5) departments: Department of Commerce & Financial Management (DCFM), Department of Human Resource Management (HRM), Department of Accountancy (DoA), Department of Marketing Management (DMM), and Department of Finance (DFin). The faculty offers twelve (12) Undergraduate Degree Programs, one Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) program, six (06) master's degree programs, five (05) Diploma and six (06) Higher Diploma programs. The Faculty includes 147 academic staff members, 32 non-academic staff members and 3152 undergraduate students. The faculty has a multi-cultural, multiethnic student body, and it fosters social harmony and cultural diversity. Quality of Academic Activities




The faculty is appreciated by university community for successfully aligning with and maintaining academic quality over quantity. The Faculty's graduate employability rate of 81% is one of the highest rates among the management faculties in the country, which indicates the quality of the graduates produced by the Faculty. Further, obtaining the ISO certification for the Department of Marketing Management and the recognition granted by the Chartered Financial Analysts (CFA) Institute-USA for the Bachelor of Business Management Honors in Finance and Bachelor of Business Management Honors in Financial Engineering indicates the quality of the degree programs offered by the faculty. Moreover, renewing the membership of AACSB (The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business) for 2021 and introducing the Bachelor of Business

Management Honors in Digital Marketing are the key milestones that indicates the Faculty's emphasis on quality over quantity during the year 2021.

At present, the Faculty has converted all the Special Degree programs into Honors Degree programs. Additionally, two new Centers were established to carry out activities related to student internships and to develop entrepreneurship among students. In celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of the faculty, The Centre for Management Research (CMR) was renamed as W.M. Jayarathne Centre for Management Research, which provides vital assistance for research in the Faculty. The Faculty conducts rigorous and quality research in the field of management.

Academic Staff Profile




Inspired by the Faculty's tradition of holding to high academic standards, the staff members are self-motivated to carry out research that contributes to the development of academic programs. Consequently, in 2021, the staff members of the Faculty obtained a Vice Chancellor's Award and 3 Senate Awards for high quality research publications. In addition, with the collaboration of the University of Central Lancashire, UK a research project was completed by the Center for Advanced Marketing by the Department of Marketing Management on COVID-19 and disaster under the supervision of Prof. D.M.R. Dissanayake. Further, 49 members of the academic staff hold Doctoral Degrees (PhD) while 114 members are with master's degrees, and the remaining, 27 members of the staff are currently reading for Doctoral degrees.

Innovation

The Faculty has taken steps to create an enriched learning environment to provide opportunities for undergraduates- to complete their education successfully. Online teaching and learning are being upgraded through various infrastructural developments such as the construction of smart classrooms to promote blended classrooms among lecturers and students, the construction of an innovation lab to promote new product development in undergraduate and postgraduate programs and Studio A1 to help students and other stakeholders in digital content development. Further, among the significant innovations organized by students is the introduction of "Goraka Secret," a drink targeting diabetic patients, as part of a community development project.

In addition, launching a free financial literacy course for the public, introducing a short course in Banking and launching the magazine Finance Outlook are some other exceptional activities conducted during the year. Further, the Faculty also incorporated a proctoring system for online examinations and implemented it in -all postgraduate degree programs.

Further, all physical examinations that took place at the university premises were conducted through the online platform to curb the COVID-19 pandemic. To ensure the safety of the invigilators who had on-premises duty, bio-bubbles were created adhering to all the COVID-19 health guidelines. The majority of the academic and non-academic staff members are fully vaccinated for COVID-19, and all the staff members and students were continuously encouraged to get the vaccine via the vaccination programs organized by the university.

Further, the faculty conducted academic events such as the Conference for Accounting Researchers and Educators (ICARE) and launched the 8th volume of the case study of accounting and some social events such as, 'Great Minds Talk series, Vesak with ASAK 2021, Virtual Poson Thorana' and Dfin Beats via online-platforms to provide opportunities for undergraduates to relief the stress of the COVID-19 pandemic. The academic coordinators were responsible for reaching out to support students who were affected by COVID-19. Continuing its regular activities online whilst adhering to all necessary health precautions, the Faculty has risen to the challenges of the new normal.

Infrastructure Developments

Despite the great challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the renovation of the the faculty office and the renovation of common amenities in the Ananda Patabendige building were successfully completed. Moreover, Digital Smart Interactive Boards, Web Cams and desktops were purchased to facilitate the online education activities of the Faculty.



Annual Conference



This year's International Conference on Advances in Technology and Computing was held virtually from December 18th to

20th, 2021. The program was organized as an annual event that supported scholars from all around the world to gather and share their technological, scientific, and socioeconomic findings while initiating collaborations. This year's motto for the conference was on the topic" Defining the role of technology for the economic development of a country". Four events were conducted over three days, 1st FCT- Faculty Research Symposium, 6th International Conference, four workshops, and Pitch Tech 90, an outreach program focused on A/L school students in the Technological Stream. This event became a platform for a dialogue with key stakeholders of the technology field in Sri Lanka and scholars from around the world.

Industry Cell for Computing and Technology (IICFCT)

The Faculty of Computing and Technology (FCT) at the University of Kelaniya has established the Industry Interaction Cell for Computing and Technology (IICfCT) to provide consultancy services for both engineering and computing industries, product development and acceleration to the market, and to establish the industry-faculty business linkage. Through partnerships with private and public industries, the IICfCT intends to provide reliable and cost-effective solutions to the industries while providing a learning experience to university students, and collaborative research opportunities to the faculty members. IICfCT obtains human resources from FCT for most of its projects. As of today, the staff members attached to FCT have provided numerous computing and software solutions to private and public entities. The IICfCT also coordinates the professional activities and employability enhancement programs for the students to enhance their soft skills, knowledge, and understanding of the corporate sector. ICCfCT received funding worth over Rs. 17 million from the Science and Technology Human Resource Project for its operations in the next 3 years.

Actions on COVID-19 Pandemic (Staff/Student)

Adhering to guidelines given by the government and the university administration, the Faculty of Computing and Technology also took many precautionary actions to prevent the spread of COVID-19 on the campus. The health status of the staff and the students was continuously monitored to identify any possible cases. Cleaning and disinfection processes were conducted regularly. Students and staff were encouraged to get vaccinated and arrangements were made to facilitate the vaccinations process. During the last year, all the lectures were conducted online, and students were only admitted to the university for examinations. Only fully vaccinated staff members performed -exam duties, while students were separated into several categories according to their vaccination status. This arrangement helped immensely to contain the virus during the examination period when a large number of students were admitted to the university. Regular meetings were conducted to review the COVID-19 status in the faculty, and faculty guidelines were updated under the guidance of the Chief Medical Officer.

Infrastructure Development

The proposed infrastructure facilities for the Faculty of Computing and Technology are under construction at Dippitigoda, Kelaniya at a total cost of LKR 4.3 billion under the Asian Science and Technology Human Resource Development Project funded by the Asian Development Bank. This building complex has a floor area of more than 30,000 m² spread in 6 buildings comprising of all modern facilities including more than 25 science and engineering laboratories and a 1000-seat auditorium.

The proposed building complex has been designed as green buildings with an energy-efficiency focus and will enhance the recognition of the University of Kelaniya as a green university with a relatively small carbon footprint. This building complex is expected to receive the platinum green rating under both the Urban Development Authority Green Building Certification Scheme as well as the Green Building Council of Sri Lanka Certification Scheme. This building complex will generate renewable energy through a

large solar panel installation and two windmills. A sophisticated Building Management System will monitor the functionality of all these systems.

The laboratory in this building complex will be ready for occupation in mid-2022, while the rest of the buildings have been planned to be completed by September 2023.

Faculty Level Research

The main functions of the RC-FCT are to.

- Provide guidance and support in the career development activities of young faculty members who have an interest in research.
- Represent the faculty and report the development of research activities of the Faculty at the Research Council Meetings.

Programs Offered By The FGS

FGS offers a variety of programs, ranging from postgraduate diploma level to doctoral level. Currently, there are over fifty programs offered by the FGS in association with all Boards of Study. Some of the courses are based only on coursework, while others are based on research, and some others are a mix of coursework and research. Master of Business (Accounting/Finance) program is conducted online fully. The curriculum of all postgraduate programs are aligned with the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework (SLFQ) and approved by the University Grants Commission (UGC). These courses are usually conducted during weekends or evenings, to enable people who are already employed to enhance their knowledge and skills.

Postgraduate study at MPhil (Master of Philosophy) and PhD (Doctor of Philosophy) levels are possible in all disciplines available at the University of Kelaniya. Research students assigned to a supervisor for guidance in conducting research. The applicant and supervisor/s work together to achieve the objectives of the research program.

Doctoral Programs (PhD/DBA)

The Doctoral degree is the highest level of degree a student can obtain. The duration of study for a PhD/DBA is three years, with extensions possible, on recommendations by the supervisor/s. PhD applicants should submit a research proposal to FGS. The purpose of this qualification is to develop a person with a capacity to generate substantive insights in a particular area of study through high quality original research. The qualification holder should be able to provide evidence of generating new knowledge and disseminating them through publications in peer reviewed indexed journals. For a doctoral degree, a candidate is required to carry out a high-level research under the guidance of a supervisor holding a qualification of the same SLQF level or equivalent and make a significant and original academic contribution to creating new knowledge. The candidate should submit a thesis incorporating research findings which are assessed and accepted.

The candidate may also be required to follow some course- work as preparatory work or for value addition to research. However, this course-work shall not contribute to the credits accumulated towards the qualification. The research may be purely discipline-based or multidisciplinary. The qualification holder should be able to design and carry out independent pure and/or applied research, zsupervise and evaluate original research carried out by others in the field of specialization. S/he should be able to demonstrate critical awareness of current issues in the subject area and apply techniques relevant to professional practice.

Doctoral Programs (PhD/DBA)

The duration of study for MPhil is two years, and the program consists mainly of research. The purpose of this qualification is to develop a person with a capacity of conducting high quality original research without supervision. For an MPhil degree, a candidate is required to carry out high level research under the guidance of a person holding a qualification equal or above the relevant qualification and make a significant contribution to a particular discipline or field. The research may be discipline-based or multidisciplinary. The candidate should submit a thesis incorporating research findings, which is assessed and accepted. The candidate may also be required to follow some course work as preparatory work or for value addition to research. However, this course work shall not contribute to the credit accumulated towards the qualification.

The qualification holder should be able to carry out independent pure and/or applied research contributing significantly towards the development of new knowledge, supervise and evaluate original research carried out by others in the field of specialization leading to qualifications of SLQF levels up to 10. S/he should also be able to make judgments on complex issues in the area of expertise and communicate her/his ideas and conclusions clearly to specialist and non-specialist audiences. S/he should demonstrate self-direction and originality in tackling and solving problems and be able to plan and implement tasks at a professional level. The qualification holder should also be able to demonstrate critical awareness of current issues in the subject area and be able to apply techniques relevant to professional practice.

FGS provides MBA program of the University of Kelaniya in Bangladesh through an exclusive corporate partner, Cambrian International Study Centre (CISC) in Dakha. The CISC is a part of the BSB-Cambrian Education Group, one of the leading private education providers in Bangladesh. CISC and UoK agreed to conduct Master of Business Administration (MBA) in for Bangladeshi students commencing from Academic year 2018. Fourteen students were enrolled in 2018 and 20 students were enrolled in 2019. The program has continued during 2020 and 2021.

Deakin University, Australia and University of Kelaniya

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), between Deakin University, Australia and the University of Kelaniya was signed on 26th of April 2018. The MoU signifies the joint aspirations of Deakin University and University of Kelaniya to develop a strategic alliance in international education between Australia, and Sri Lanka. Deakin University hopes to deliver offshore PhDs in collaboration with Kelaniya University in Sri Lanka and exchange of staff, students, educational resources and publications, joint research, teaching and learning, and collaborative projects are envisaged through the new partnership.



CQ University, Australia and University of Kelaniya



A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), between Central Queensland University (CQ University), Australia and University of Kelaniya was signed on 4th of June 2018. The MoU signifies the joint aspirations of CQ University and University of Kelaniya to develop a strategic alliance in international education between Australia, and Sri Lanka. The University of Kelaniya and CQ university jointly offers an accounting degree program. Accordingly, the University commenced a Master of Professional Accounting (MPA) Program in Collaboration with CQ University, Australia in 2019.

Kyoto College of Graduate School for Informatics, Japan and University of Kelaniya.



The Improvement of Research Skills of Postgraduate Students



Information Management System

COVID 19 and Regulatory Activities of FGS in 2021


CORONAVIRUS

The COVID- 19 pandemic control measures imposed by the health authorities led to challenges in the normal academic and administrative activities of FGS. The impact was also felt in the areas of conducting in-person- lectures and conducting in-person exams. Further, contacting the students and staff when seeking additional information due to work from home arrangements of the staff of FGS became difficult. Therefore, FGS revisited the existing mechanisms and changed the practices hitherto adopted, in order to maximize the use of the available existing IT infrastructure. As a result, these new opportunities were maximized with the staff accessing exam reports, generating letters, conducting technical discussions, updating records and conducting exams and meetings digitally via online platforms. Finally, FGS managed to conduct lectures and exams of all postgraduate programs on schedule in the virtual environment.

Document Management System

In 2021, the FGS introduced a document management system to implement a zero-contact document handling policy and to efficiently manage the inflow of documents received by the FGS office. Further, as an extension to the same system, SMS and email notifications were also integrated to empower the stakeholders when submitting documents to the office.

Actions on COVID-19 pandemic (Staff/ Students)

- The Faculty of Humanities shifted to the online mode to adapt to the new realities of the pandemic. The teaching and learning procedures of the faculty with respect to internal, external, and post graduate students were conducted online to ensure the smooth continuation of the academic workload without disruptions.
- The Computer Assisted Learning & Web Unit of the Faculty (CAL) facilitated the process of shifting academic staff towards online teaching and assessment procedure while the students were provided with a convenient virtual learning platform with access to e-learning materials that accelerated their learning.
- A series of workshops were held under the AHEAD project on the use of digital tools for teaching and assessment in virtual education to build the capacity of the academic staff of the faculty.
- All the departmental and faculty level meetings were held virtually in order to minimize the number of physical gatherings as a preventive measure for Covid-19.
- All academic and non-academic staff members were encouraged to work from home, and only a limited number of staff members were called for duties to attend to compulsory activities through a duty roaster while the operational guidelines for Covid-19 prevention in the workplace were implemented and were strictly followed.





- Examinations for the academic year 2018/2019 were conducted both physically and virtually according to the circumstances. The first phase of exams was done on-site, and the students were provided with hostel accommodation and transportation facilities under the bio bubble method. The students who have shown Covid-19 symptoms were quarantined in separate hostels with essentials provided and arrangements were made for them to sit for the examinations at the hostels.
- During the in-person examinations, the staff members on examination duty were provided with personal protective equipment, and transportation to examination halls and hostel premises where examinations were carried out.
- Examination halls were prepared according to the Covid prevention guidelines and proper disinfection stations were set up, and proper sanitization procedures were practiced at the main gates and entrances to examination halls.
- With the rapid increase of the pandemic, examinations were shifted online and were conducted through CAL. The lecturers who were assigned to each subject had to report to the ICT center to supervise the ongoing examination on the CAL platform.
- The inauguration program and orientation program of the first-year students, and the intensive English course provided by the Department of English Language Teaching were held virtually.
- All the lectures of fee levying certificate and diploma courses were adapted to the online mode to ensure that the teaching and learning procedure was not disrupted.

Infrastructure Developments


Under the AHEAD project, the following infrastructure development activities were carried out.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES

Faculty of Medicine clinical appointments commenced academic activities for 201 students of Batch 32 under the MBBS degree program in February 2021 and 81 students of Batch 13 under the Speech and Hearing Sciences (SHS) degree program in June 2021. The 26th Batch of MBBS students (2014/2015) completed their final examinations in May and the 9th Batch of SHS students completed their examinations in June.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, the Faculty continued all scheduled academic activities including examinations without major interruptions. The lectures were conducted online whilst the clinical training continued at the North Colombo Teaching Hospital. All students attending

were provided hostel accommodation under strict health guidelines. Similarly, the activities in the faculty were conducted observing all health precautions mandated by the COVID committee of the Faculty and the University.

Seven new academic staff members were recruited to the Departments of Paediatrics, Family Medicine, Forensic Medicine, Biochemistry, Disability studies and Anatomy. Two eminent and longstanding members of the Faculty, Professors, Prashantha Wijeysinghe (former Dean and Chair in Gynaecology and Obstetrics) Prof Ashwini and Fernando (Department of Paediatrics) retired during the year. Professor Sachith

Mettananda was appointed the Chair Professor Paediatrics and nine members of the academic staff were promoted as Professors. There were 13 staff non-academic appointments made during the year.

A student affairs division

headed by Prof Parenitharan was set up to facilitate, monitor and coordinate the extra-curricular, counselling, welfare, and career guidance activities of students. Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, the students organized several virtual activities such as online debates, discussions about ethics, and webinars, some of which were organized in parallel with the 30th-anniversary celebrations. The students actively participated in several events organized by the Green



The building of the liver transplant center commenced in July 2021 delayed by increment weather and the COVID pandemic. A proposal for upgrading student facilities was formulated and the initial phase of this project was completed with the setting up of a unisex salon and

> washing facilities. The second phase to upgrade the student canteen in the boys' hostel. has commenced. Several other infrastructure development projects including the installation of an incinerator, toilets for visitors, renovation of the





record room and the stores, refurbishment of the Ethical Review Committee office, renovation of the A14 building for the Department of Public Health, the erection of the boundary wall at the rear side of the B4 building and water-proofing of the canteen floor are ongoing.

The Faculty continued to have a successful year in the sphere of research with five of its members namely Professors Nilanthi De Silva, Janaka De Silva, Anuradhani Kasturirathna, H.A. De Silva and Sachith Mettananda being listed among the top 2% of scientists in the world by Elsevier BV and Standford University. Nineteen academics received the President's Awards for Scientific Publications and more than ten research



awards were obtained by academics at scientific conferences throughout the year. There were 172 research articles published in peer-reviewed journals and 54 abstracts published as conference proceedings during the year. For the first time, the Faculty awarded research grants to staff members. Realizing the significance and implications of COVID-related research, nine research grants were awarded using generated funds from the clinical trials unit, amounting to approximately 3.8



INTRODUCTION OF THE FACULTY

he Faculty of Science, established in 1967, is one of the seven faculties of the University of Kelaniya. At present, the Faculty of Science consists of 8 academic departments namely the Departments of Chemistry, Industrial Management, Mathematics, Microbiology, Physics and Electronics, Plant and Molecular Biology, Statistics & Computer Science, and Zoology and Environmental Management, and two units, namely the Software Engineering Teaching Unit and the Sports & Exercise Science Unit.

The Faculty of Science offered 3 Bachelor of Science Degree Programs of 3-year duration and 15 Bachelor of Science Honours Degree Programs of 4-year duration. From the Academic Year 2020/2021, the Faculty of Science successfully increased the number of Honors Degree Programs to 18 by introducing the following Honors Degree Programs, which led to an increase in the student intake by 190.

- Bachelor of Science Honors in Applied Chemistry,
- Bachelor of Science Honors in Electronics and Computer Science, and
- Bachelor of Science Honors in Sports Science

Further, the Faculty of Science has increased the student intake by 212 from the Academic Year 2019/2020 for all its Degree Programmes, which led to an increase in the annual student intake to 957. Hence the student intake from the Academic Year 2020/2021 has

been increased up to 1147.

The annual student intake for the Biological Sciences and Physical Sciences are 221 and 362 respectively from the Academic Year 2019/2020. The Faculty also admitted 119 students to the BSc Honors Degree Program in Management and Information Technology, 109 students to the BSc in Environmental Conservation and Management, 59 students for the BSc Honors in Software Engineering, and 76 students for BSc in Physics and Electronics Degree Programs through separate windows. Furthermore, the Physical Sciences and Biological Sciences students are offered a range of auxiliary course units from the Faculties of Commerce & Management Studies, Humanities, and Social Sciences. At present, the Faculty of Science conducts 12 MSc Degree Programmes and 3 Postgraduate Diploma Programmes. Currently, the Faculty serves 2358 undergraduates, 138 academic staff, one academic support staff and 94 non-academic staff members. The construction of the new lecture theatre complex is in progress, and it will further facilitate student-centred learning activities in the Faculty of Science.

The Faculty provides services to students, the academic community and the public through the Repair and Instrumentation Unit, National Glass Blowing Centre, The Regional Centre for Asian Ant Research, Solar Solutions Centre, Central Equipment Laboratory, Floriculture Research Center, Research and Consultation Centre for Coconut oil, University-Industry Community Interaction Cell (Environment and Development Consultants (EDCON), and the Research and Services Centre.

The International Conference on Applied and Pure Sciences – ICAPS 2021 of the Faculty of Science was held as a hybrid event on 29 October 2021 under the theme of Green Technology towards a knowledge-based economy.

The Covid-19 pandemic prevented students from attending the Faculty of Science physically for academic activities. However, facing these challenges and following the health guidelines, academic activities were carried out online, and the Faculty managed to complete all the End-Semester examinations relevant to the Academic Year 2018/2019 physically by November 2021. Examinations for the Academic Year 2019/2020 have already been commenced and academic activities for the final year students will be completed by April 2022.

The Faculty is also planning to introduce the BSc in Data Science & Analytics Degree program, the 3 plus 1 BSc Honors Degree program, BSc in Software Engineering (External) Degree program, Diploma Program in Astronomy, Computer Science, and Information Technology shortly.

Due to staff and student dedication and hard work, the Faculty of Science of the University of Kelaniya has now become a Centre of Excellence in Tertiary Education in Sri Lanka. The Faculty of Science has created a conducive environment to promote freedom of thought, innovation and creativity. The graduates who are endowed to the nation from the Faculty of Science will undoubtedly contribute significantly to the progress and wellbeing of mankind globally.

Course and Action in response to the COVID-19 pandemic (Staff/ Students)

By 2021, the academic staff of the Faculty of Social Sciences (FSS), were well acclimated to conducting lectures online and the lectures of all levels of the Bachelor of Arts Degree Programs, MA/MSSc and Diploma Programs were carried out successfully.

The Covid-19 Response Committee of the Faculty along with a team of able and enthusiastic lecturers worked towards conducting BA examinations in the FSS with students being physically present at the University premises amidst Covid-19 pandemic conditions. Separate exam halls were allocated for students to sit for the exams. The four categories of exam halls thus allocated were A-hostellers; B-non hostellers; C-isolated candidates; D-differently abled candidates. The FSS managed to complete a larger part of the exam without facing drastic medical issues and the Chief Medical Officer of the University as well as the MoH, Kelaniya who visited Examination Halls approved the exam plan.

However, since health authorities in the country took decisions to tighten the regulations on social gatherings and since the country was facing another wave of Covid-19, the FSS decided to hold the rest of the exams online. Those exams were also successfully completed, and a separate Computer Centre was converted into a central examination center for online examinations. A set of young lecturers was trained to handle the examination activities and the students were given the opportunity to face mock examinations to make them familiar with this new process.

A re-sit exam was also held in December for those who could not sit for the exams due to Covid-19 conditions.

MA/MSSc examinations were held successfully. The candidates were physically present. They were divided into three categories as A-fully vaccinated, B-partially vaccinated and C-those who were not vaccinated.

Apart from the lectures and examinations, each department of the Faculty conducted various academic and cultural activities using the zoom platform.

Faculty -level research/ awards/ activities on SDGs

The Department of Library and Information Sciences held its Annual International Research Conference (4th International Conference on Library and Information Management - ICLIM) in collaboration with the Research Centre for Social Sciences using the virtual space. Similarly, the Department of Geography held a virtual Internal Conference in collaboration with the assistance of two universities in India and with the Research Centre for Social Sciences.

The Research Centre for Social Sciences held a Research Forum commemorating Women's Day, where researchers of the Faculty who were engaged in gender studies in various disciplines of Social Sciences shared their research experiences.

The FSS continued the research project titled 'The Impact of Social Protection on Sustainable Development Goals in Sri Lanka: an Empirical Analysis' under an AHEAD (Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development) Grant.

The Research Centre for Social Sciences published the first volume of the research journal, 'Samajeeya Vidya' in Sinhala medium.

Several members of the FSS won Vice-Chancellor's Awards for their outstanding contribution to research in Social Sciences. They are as follows:

Highlights of the year, 2021

The FSS has been given the opportunity by the UGC to establish a Department of Information and Communication Technology (DICT) for Bachelor of Arts undergraduates and the FSS has initiated planning and training/recruiting staff for this new department.

The FSS has created a Quality Assurance Cell for the Faculty and has also established a Grievances Committee and a Finance Committee. A Building and Maintenance Committee was also established for monitoring the works, constructions and maintenance activities pertaining to the physical infra-structure development of the FSS.

The major community service undertaken by the FSS was to raise funds for the Kiribathgoda Base Hospital to be used in its Covid-19 treatment activities. An amount exceeding eight hundred thousand rupees was collected.

THE LIBRARY



n 2020, the UoK Library pioneered the the digital infrastructure needed to enable development of digital information 2021, it was particularly explored how digital services could add more value than physical collections, not only by enabling remote access but also by enhancing access with expert knowledge of searching, synthesizing, and using information competently. Overall, the response to the pandemic has vastly accelerated this "digital shift." During the COVID-19 pandemic, one of the university's primary goals was to provide the UoK Library with

students and scholars to study and work resources over a long period of time. In from home. The library continued to operate remotely via the Shibboleth gateway to provide digital resources and digital library services such as widening the access to research and publications in Research Repository, Past Exam Paper Repository, Electronic Reading Room etc. Other highlights include LibChat Virtual Assistance Service, Library and research skills workshops, and Online Document Delivery Service.

Online inquiries received by the library

were more than 2,451 via email, website, and LibChat, and 16,563 visits took place 24/7 without interruption. Librarians worked from home, and all staff members were initially given intense training on how to address the informational requirements of students and staff remotely. It was observed that LibChat became more popular as the lockdown continued, with a significant increase over the previous year. Since 2020, in response to the national lockdown and the global COVID-19 pandemic, the UoK Library has been primarily developed as a virtual library service, purchasing more than 320 e-books for recommended readings in 2021, the UoK community, especially during the

bringing the library's total e

- book collection to 100,914. The Electronic Reading Room of the library was strengthened uploading recommended information resources in parallel with the undergraduate lectures delivered at different faculties. Informational and instructional support for teaching programs, support for teaching and learning with e-versions of information sources, open access books, and multiple-licensed textbooks whenever possible, providing access to additional limited information and knowledge resources were made available at this point to enhance the teaching and learning function of the university by uploading more than 420 recommended readings, 1,926 past question papers, 2,287 research publications and supplying 172 documents via online

document delivery service during the year 2021. The library has partnered with the National Digital Library of India to provide UOK students and staff access to over 40 million items of lecture videos in different subject disciplines, information sources, and other educational materials. The library has adapted its services in line with national lockdown guidelines and institutional requirements. In addition, a digital wallboard was set up in the library with the assistance of the British Council of Sri Lanka, enabling readers to access the Council's digital collection via QR codes. Copyright was a significant challenge for

pandemic. The UoK Library helped raise students who research throughout the awareness about copyright issues and the year. This support was aimed not only at publishing process. The webinars helped clarify the legal and ethical aspects of documents that can be uploaded to CAL and which formats to be used. Librarians also actively participated in sharing experiences with the international community, such as the Clarivate South Asia's South Asian Librarians Forum 2021 in communicating the role of librarians in promoting academic integrity and overall corporate profile. They also participated in

troubleshooting but also at presenting support for dissertation and thesis preparation. In 2021, three interactive digital media salons were established in the library to facilitate group teaching and learning work with national and international collaborations. These digital salons also allow students, faculty, and staff to build and exhibit artistic or research-based projects that heavily rely on digital formats. When the university was



many scholarly conferences, partnering closed, the library was open to students with the 4th International Conference on Library and Information Management (ICLIM). Various awareness campaigns were conducted on topics such as publication process, predatory journals, hijacked journals, journal indexing, Impact factor etc to create an integrity and sustainable scholarly ecosystem.

During the year 2021, the library's primary focus was to continue to support final year students who sit for exams and complete dissertations, as well as postgraduate webinars. Accordingly, the UoK Library

during the pandemic due to the high demand for essential study materials that were not available in digital formats but were necessary for their research work. Opening to membership was made under the strict health guidelines imposed by the COVID-19 Responses Committee of the university.

When the lockdown began, the library quickly transformed face-to-face workshops into online synchronized

offered online workshops and drop-ins to students and staff to assist with distance learning and teaching. Many training programs on information competency development were started and implemented. All students could participate in more than 60 webinars in online dropouts to help with research and referrals with librarians via Zoom. New and continuing students could join the "Library Orientation" sessions through Zoom for an online library tour and build their skills by participating in online workshops on information literacy. Recordings from the Library webinars were also available on the library website, which enabled many other students who were unable to attend these sessions to benefit from them.

The UoK Library funded university-wide access to Urkund: Ouriginal. It examined the similarity of student papers, theses/dissertations, research papers, and assignments to other sources in order to detect plagiarism. It also took the initiative to explore the originality of student activities by integrating Urkund into the LMS of the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Management and Finance. In 2021, these faculties tested this system for different courses, and it is expected to be extended the facility to all faculties by 2022. In 2021, 11,976 papers were submitted to Urkund and conducted similarity analysis to detect possible plagiarized content.

National Library and Documentation Services Board, the ISN Agency of Sri Lanka, has authorized the UOK library to act as a facilitator to provide ISBN and ISSN to individuals, centers, and departments of the university that require these. This facility has allowed the UoK Library

individuals/departments in the university as a closer destination for providing international standard numbers for their literary and scholarly works. This section also assisted the required parties for daily inquiries regarding publishing, copyright, legal deposits, barcoding, etc. A total of 26 ISBNs and 11 ISSNs were provided during the year under review.

In order to achieve the goal of the UK's vision, the UoK Library serves to nurture a culture that actively promotes innovation and creativity. This is evidenced by the conceptual leadership role played by the library in developing a set of new policies and service provisions implemented throughout the institution. An example of the policies developed during 2021 is the OER Policy. The Library's Interactive Media Unit started developing the university's collection of audiobooks, and by the end of 2021, it comprises of 19 full audiobooks. The main objective of this project was to facilitate library use with a remote library service by providing access to a collection of audiobooks that are needed on time during the COVID 19 pandemic and for the readers with disabilities who rely on voice-only media. The library also developed an easy-access system for its Braille Collection, focusing on visually impaired undergraduates, intending to provide reading support so that students could locate the required books in the Braille Collection anywhere and reserve them before arriving at the library.

Introduction to the CDCE

The CDCE operates under circular provisions laid down by the UGC circular no. 932 and the by-laws of the University. Accordingly, it functions under a Director who reports directly to the Vice-Chancellor. There are three Deputy Directors manning the three divisions of, Registrations and Examinations, Learning Resources and Training. The academic and administrative decisions are taken by the Boards of Study and the Management Committee of the CDCE with the approval of the Senate and the Council of the university as applicable.

Our Mission

Our mission is to achieve excellence in providing learners with opportunities to develop knowledge, attitudes, and skills to serve the world with respect for the dignity of life.

Online Learning -

In 2021, the CDCE developed significantly by teaching via the Learning Management System (LMS) and by modifying Zoom lectures and seminars videos on LMS pages as solution for the COVID -19 pandemic situation. Nevertheless, the CDCE has decided to use this method continuously since it provides the best progress for our center.

E-Library -

The CDCE has decided to build a new E-library for the center to provide and efficient service to the students to fulfill the current requirements. Students from across the country are registered at CDCE and they are unable to visit the CDCE frequently for academic purposes. By using the E-Library they can read recommended readings online.

Degrees Awarded by the CDCE ——

The CDCE has a 20-year history and the Bachelor of Arts (General) Degree program has been offered through CDCE from the beginning. It is also the most in-demand external degree program (EDP) at the CDCE. A new syllabus for the Bachelor of Arts degree was introduced by the UGC in 2021.

Currently, external degree programs are offered by four faculties:

Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences

Bachelor of Arts - BA (External) – 3 years

Faculty of Science

Bachelor of Science - BSc (External) – 3 years

Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies

- Bachelor of Commerce BCom (External) 4 years
- Bachelor of Business Management BBMgt (external)] 3 years

All the external degree programs offered by the CDCE, except the BCom degree, are 3-years general degree programs (90 Credits) and these degrees comply with SLQF standards (90 credits).




Figure 6 - 1: Students of the University

STUDENTS IN UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE PROGRAMS

The University of Kelaniya offers a wide range of bachelor's degree programs for full-time students. The University also has a Center for Distance & Continuing Education which offers six programs of study for part-time students reading for external degrees.

With the enrollment of 3,959 students for undergraduate degree programs for the 2019/20 academic year, the total number of students for internal undergraduate degree programs has increased to 13,673 students. The highest number of undergraduates belong to the Faculty of Commerce & Management Studies which represents 23% of the total internal undergraduate population. The Faculty of Computing & Technology has the lowest number of students (7%). The highest number of students registered for external degree programs is for the Bachelor of Arts (General) degree program, which is 83,416 in total (Table 6-1).



STUDENTS IN UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE PROGRAMS

The internal undergraduate student population is distributed among 20 different programs of study in six faculties. The number of female students is higher than the number of male students in each year of study in all faculties except the Faculty of Computing & Technology. Table 6-2 illustrates the data descriptively.

EXAMINATION DATA

The University of Kelaniya holds examinations under three type of programs each year: internal undergraduate degree programs, external undergraduate degree programs and postgraduate programs. Out of the exams held during the year 2021, 2,603 students have passed out from internal undergraduate degree programs and 5,596 students have passed out from external undergraduate degree programs. 1,408 students have passed out from postgraduate programs.

UNDERGRADUATE OUTPUT – INTERNAL DEGREE PROGRAMS 2021

Out of the total graduates passed out in 2021, 888 (33%) graduates belong to the Faculty of Social Sciences which represents the highest number of graduates from all the faculties. And the least number is from the Faculty of Computing & Technology which is 110 (4%). Moreover, 264 (10%) of students have obtained first class awards, 1,501 (56%) have obtained second class upper divisions, 425 (16%) have obtained second class lower divisions and 465 (18%) have obtained general passes. Table 7-2 indicates the graduate output of the internal undergraduate degree programs as of December 31, 2021.

UNDERGRADUATE OUTPUT – EXTERNAL DEGREE PROGRAMS

The undergraduate output of the external degree programs in 2021 was 5,596 where the highest output was from the BA (General) degree program.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

The Quality Assurance activities of the University are facilitated by the Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA) established under UGC Circular 2019/09. The CQA is headed by a director, who is guided by the Senate Standing Committee on Quality Assurance (SSC-QA). Faculty Quality Assurance Cells (FQACs) are established in all six faculties. In 2021, in addition to the six FQACs two Internal Quality Assurance Cells (IQACs) were established in the administrative divisions and Center for Distance and Continuing Education.

The Senate Standing Committee on Quality Assurance meets regularly and monitors the progress of the six FAQCs, and the two IQACs report to the SSC-QA and share best practices, which facilitate enhancing the internalization of practice.



- The Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies and the Faculty of Science obtained the approval to introduce fallback awards.
- The IQAC of Administrative Divisions have initiated developing a 'Manual of Procedures' for the Administrative Divisions of the University.





Risk Management - COVID 19

The COVID-19 pandemic imposed enormous challenges on the higher education system in Sri Lanka. By adopting national guidelines issued by the Ministry of Health and the University Grants Commission, the University of Kelaniya faced the pandemic successfully, and continued with educational programs for its students, inclusive of online or physical teaching-learning activities, examinations, and research throughout the year 2021.

Specific measures adopted at the University of Kelaniya

The University of Kelaniya initiated a covid-specific control program within its premises aligned with the national program.

Establishing a high-powered Covid response committee for the reduction of risk

This committee is chaired by Professor Rajitha Wickramasinghe, Professor of Public Health, Faculty of Medicine, and coordinated by Dr. Chinthaka Rathnayake, Chief Medical Officer (CMO). The Vice-Chancellor, Senior Professor Nilanthi de Silva, regularly participated in the meetings of this committee.

The committee comprises of 65 members including seven Deans of the Faculties, Registrar, Bursar, Librarian, Public Health Inspector, 2 members (academic and non-academic) from each faculty, Directors, Union leaders, Head of the Dept of Medical Microbiology, Faculty of Medicine, Professor of Medical Microbiology, and the Medical Officer of Health (MOH) at Kelaniya.

Committee meetings are conducted fortnightly.

The mandate of the committee is to plan, prepare guidelines, implement, monitor, evaluate and review the situation and take timely action.

Educational activities

Educational activities were conducted online for most students in order to minimize the risk of spreading Covid. However, examinations and practical classes were conducted physically onsite where necessary, adhering to health requirements to ensure the minimum gathering and adopting the "bio-bubble" approach following proper risk assessment.

Medical Centre

All categories of health staff were trained on procedures to be followed in their relevant fields, in the Microbiology and Family Medicine Departments of the Faculty of Medicine, the Colombo North Teaching Hospital and the Office of the MOH/Kelaniya.



Funds

Additional funds were made available for the following control measures:

- Purchase of personal protective equipment (PPE), including face masks
- b) Sanitizers, disinfectants for lecture halls, hostels, classrooms, vehicles (ambulance transporting positive cases, contacts)
- c) Posters (displayed in all units)
- d) Adequate foot operated hand washing areas
- Infrared thermometers for all the entrance points e)
- f) Improved facilities at the University Medical Centre

Rapid Antigen Test

Rapid Antigen Tests for SARS CoV-2 were conducted free of charge for students and staff, at the University Medical Centre and in the laboratories of the Medical Microbiology Department of the Faculty of Medicine.



RT-PCR

RT-PCR for SARS CoV-2 tests were conducted free of charge in the laboratories of the Medical Microbiology Department of the Faculty of Medicine for the university community as well as members of the public who were tested as required by the Ministry of Health.

Covitriage SL App

Covitriage SL App for covid positive patients was developed by a team of academics from the Faculties of Medicine and Science, along with officials from the Ministry of Health, for assessment of risk and identification of a medical management plan.

Integrated Home-Based Care Centre

Integrated Home-Based Care Centre (IHBCC) at UOK – the University guest house was converted to a well-equipped home quarantine center for covid positive patients among the university staff.

Mass Vaccination

Several vaccination programs were conducted on-site in Dalugama and Kelaniya for staff and students:

- Sinopharm 1st & 2nd dose 664 staff members were vaccinated on 14 May and 11 June 2021 1164 students were vaccinated in October and November 2021
- Pfizer Booster dose:

930 members of staff/students/community were vaccinated in December 2021

Welfare facilities

The following welfare facilities were provided for all covid-positive staff members: interest-free loan scheme, traveling allowance (up to Rs 15,000), special quarantine leave.

Educational programs

Educational programs to create awareness among the community were telecast on a number of TV channels, radio channels, social media, and newspapers, with the participation of the Vice-Chancellor, Chief Medical Officer, Media Director and Professors/senior lecturers at Medical Faculty/other faculties and students.

COVID-19 Statistics

Over the period August - December 2021, the Medical Centre has maintained records of covid testing and the number of positive cases among staff and students. A weekly PHI inspection report on the maintenance of hand washing facilities and sanitizers was also compiled. The report is presented weekly (supplemented by a monthly summary) to the Vice-Chancellor, the Chairperson of the covid response committee and copied to the Registrar, Deans, Bursar, Librarian & other covid committee members.

GREEN PRACTICES

he Centre for Sustainability Solutions demonstrates the principle of sustainability both in theory and in practice through understanding non-sustainable practices of the University and taking action to reduce the impact of such practices by coordinating and organizing various activities. As the first step, the university adopted a policy on the environment; this policy binds all individuals in the university to exercise due care to avoid negative environmental impacts of their own activities. The University Environmental Policy emphasizes that caring for the environment is the bounded duty of any individual in the university premises that uses, or otherwise carries out an activity that has an impact on the resources of the environment. There are numerous actions and activities carried out by the CSS annually under different aspects of sustainability, energy management, water management, biodiversity management, waste management, sustainability leadership and education, social wellbeing etc., to make the university move forward towards sustainability.

CSS is involved in issuing a university circular on energy management which includes a set of guidelines in setting temperatures of A/C limiting to 020C lower than the room temperature, limiting A/C on-off time to 10.30 am to 3.30 pm, pre-assessment of office conditions before installing A/Cs. Apart from that, the implementation of the energy audit recommendations such as the following have been carried out: installation of energy sub-meters, proper arrangement of lighting to avoid use of extra bulbs, making a decision on purchasing inverter type airconditioners, LED bulbs/lights to phase

out tube lights and incandescent bulbs to increase energy efficiency.

The CSS has proposed to implement green the building concept in upcoming buildings to be more energy-efficient; solar roofs, using only LED lights and enhance natural lighting where possible to illuminate the interior, uses natural/passive cooling/ventilation, energy efficient glasses, green walls and shading for cooling purposes, green cover, natural lighting, and natural/passive cooling. Energy management systems are to be introduced in new and renovated buildings. CSS encourages the University to use more renewable energy sources to reduce the burden on grid energy and has taken several initiatives to promote the use of solar energy such as installing solar mobile phone/laptop charging stations for students, solar water heaters in canteen boilers, solar streetlights and solar roofing in certain buildings. The CSS has implemented strategies to reduce the greenhouse gas emissions within the university by planting a medicinal plant cloister, signing an MoU with the Department of Forest Conservation to develop and manage 150 ha of forest reserve in Puttalam, developing a wastepaper management program, implementing an e-waste collection and disposal program. CSS recommends avoiding purchasing of equipment that carry CFC and other ozone depleting gases. In 2021, CSS organized several awareness programs on climate change for the university community and the general public.

CSS has successfully implemented a waste segregation and recycling program in the University. More than 75% of biodegradable waste generated within the University is turned into

compost in a facility that was constructed ICT Faculty. A developed by the CSS with the assistance of the CEA. CSS issued a university circular banning polythene usage in University of Kelaniya. As a result, no lunch sheets are permitted in canteens and fruitful discussions were held with the Student Union to make them aware of the negative environmental impact of the use of polythene in their activities/decorations. Further, CSS introduced dark blue colored bins for every department in the University to collect waste papers for recycling. All collected papers are handed over to a registered recycler. CSS encourages using soft copies where possible and print double sided wherever possible, reusing single side printed papers. CSS promotes using biogas as an alternative for LPG and two biogas facilities in two canteens in the university produce more than 4kg of biogas per day.

Staff who are trained on composting technology give advise and knowledge to small-scale enterprisers who are willing to operate compost yards. CSS coordinated a chemical waste management program with the assistance of Holcim Cement Pvt. Ltd. The CSS has paid attention to the conservation of water within University. CSS has introduced a rainwater harvesting system at the premises of the Faculty of Commerce and Management. It was able to collect 58000L of water in 2021. Wastewater released from the university hostels, are being treated and reused for gardening purposes. The CSS introduced a sprinkler irrigation system in 2018 for the plant nursery and lawns. The CSS is involved in transferring technical know-how in formulating a waste management system for the newly


Sedimentation Management Plan for Managing Land and Water Pollution Risks has been developed. In addition to these wastewater treatments, It plans to implement (Under construction) a sewage water treatment unit and use that water for recycling water for toilet flushing purposes. This can minimize the portable water usage within the ICT faculty.

Further, the CSS is into two other important sustainability initiatives: (I) Online Transport Management System for optimization of energy usage of campus vehicles. This system will assist in online reservation of university vehicles, opportunities for pooling, tracking distances travelled by each vehicle thereby automatically calculating the carbon footprint, engine efficiency calculation etc. (II) Waste face mask management system within the university. CSS is taking a proactive initiation of face mask disposal identifying it as an emerging waste category as surgical and N-95 face masks contain nylon and is considered a clinical waste. The separate handling of such waste is needed. The CSS will introduce light blue bins for the collection of face masks and build awareness among the university community to dispose masks as recommended by the WHO and incinerate the collected waste.

The CSS is widely involved in education, awareness, extension and outreach activities locally and globally. A Sustainability Leadership Certificate program is offered for undergraduates of all the faculties of the University. More than 500 students from different faculties participated in this program during 2021. This program consisted of 10 modules: Human Society,

Environmental Issues and Sustainable Development, Sustainable Living and Green Fashion: Role of the Youth, Nonconventional Energy vs Conventional Energy, Energy Management, Waste as a Resource: Solid Waste Management, Environmental Pollution and Human Health, Water Management, Green Buildings, Sustainable Production and Consumption, Environmental Sustainability Leadership and a group project. The CSS is currently working on obtaining SLQF standards for the program in order to open it for students who have finished their A/Ls island wide. In addition to these activities, the

FCT organized a webinar on promoting zero waste practices in universities to educate university students. CSS commemorated the World Biodiversity Day, and contributed to delivering an invited speech on Green Initiatives, plantated trees to combat climate change and to reduce CO2 Emissions, commemorated the World Environmental Day, contributed to delivering an invited speech on ecosystem restoration in the global south. CSS also organized an invited speech on the impact of Covid-19 on the environment of Sri Lanka Green Dialogue organized by CIR.


































ACTIVITIES ON SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

Title: A parental education program and a hearing screening for children with Down's Syndrome

Contribution Level: Local

Description: A parental education program and a hearing screening for children with Down's Syndrome were organized by the Department of Disability Studies and the Ayati National Centre for Children with Disabilities of the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Kelaniya to celebrate the World Hearing Day 2021. This program was organized with the World Health Organization (WHO) along with the WHO objectives for the World Hearing Day 2021. This project was held on the 3rd of March 2021.

Benefactors in the form of generous business giants and philanthropists such as Hemas Holdings, MAS Holdings contributed towards the cause and Sri Lankan Cricket legends Kumar Sangakkara and Roshan Mahanama joined hands to raise funds for this national level cause. The Sri Lankan Army also contributed by providing the labor required for the construction of the center. The AYATI Centre, which is designed to serve children with disabilities, was estimated to cost approximately 450 million rupees. The ongoing management of the center is overseen by the Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya.

Services at this center are provided free of charge for Sri Lankan nationals.

SDG 04: QUALITY EDUCATION

As a state University, the University of Kelaniya offers free education to its students up to the undergraduate degree and additional financial aid is provided for those who are in need. In addition, the University offers several first-degree programs (part time/ external degree programs) at affordable costs and certificate level programs and diploma programs are offered for those who are not attending a university.



Glass Blowing Center

The glass blowing center at the University of Kelaniya provides an excellent service in the manufacture and repair of scientific glassware for laboratory use. This includes the fabrication of totally new special purpose scientific glassware as required for research and the repair of expensive broken laboratory glassware.

The center possesses highly skilled personnel who can handle any complex task pertaining to glass blowing. The fabrication of specially designed scientific glassware is a special service offered by the center. This is the only scientific glass blowing center currently established in the country.

In addition, training programs are conducted by the center to disseminate scientific glass blowing skills to interested personnel from other universities, institutes, schools and entrepreneurs. The center also manufactures ornamental glassware such as gifts and souvenirs. However, priority is given for manufacturing scientific glassware due to the lack of human resources.

Title: School hearing screening program

Name: Ms. N D Dantanarayana, Lecturer (Probationary), Department of Disability Studies, Faculty of Medicine

Contribution Level: Local

Description: A School hearing screening program was organized by the audiology students of the Department of Disability Studies, and it was held in February 2020 at a preschool in Ragama. The objectives of the program were to increase awareness among teachers on childhood hearing loss due to middle ear pathologies and detect any hearing loss within the selected community.

Technology premises. This building will be built at a cost of Rs. 4.3 billion under the project Science & Technology Human Resource Development Project, Asian Development Bank.

SDG 13: CLIMATE ACTION

The University of Kelaniya is the first Sri Lankan national university that adopted an environmental policy, and as such it expects to demonstrate the theory and practice of sustainability through taking action to understand and reduce the unsustainable impact of its own activities. In this context, the University of Kelaniya has planned to reduce its energy consumption and hence to reduce its carbon footprint by adopting energy conserving strategies. The Green Society of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya has taken several initiatives



towards energy conservation and as part of this effort, a webinar was held under the theme "Energy Conservation: opportunities and challenges" on the 4th of August 2021.

He has conducted much research for and compiled several reports of UNDP projects, especially the final report to GCF of the midterm evaluation of GCF-funded Climate Resilient Integrated Water Management Project (CRIWMP).

SDG 15: LIFE ON LAND

Solid Waste Separation and Storage

The Green Practices committee initiated a solid waste management program in 2014. The solid waste management program includes waste separation, waste collection, and the direction of recyclable waste for approved waste recyclers. More than 250 bins with standard color codes (Green for organic wastes, blue for paper, orange for polythene, red for glass) for different waste types are placed in the university premises for waste collection.

Rainwater Harvesting

The University of Kelaniya has a rainwater harvesting system with a total capacity of 60,000 L which was implemented on July 28th, 2015. The water collected is used for the Compost Yard, Plant Nursery, Gardening, and cleaning of equipment used by the Landscape Division.

Biogas Production

There are two biogas units in the University. The biogas unit I is at the Faculty of Medicine (Volume – 5000 L) which is used in the faculty canteen for preparing food. The biogas unit II is at the Base canteen (Volume – 500 L) which was established and managed by the Departments of Zoology and Environmental Management as a pilot project.

Solid Waste Management Project

The University of Kelaniya has initiated composting projects to make the university environment a beautiful and better place. There are two compost yards in the University. Unit I is at the Faculty of Medicine and Unit II is at the landscape division.

The compost production at the Faculty of Medicine: The building was donated by the Central Environmental Authority and was operational since December 11th, 2013. The composting in Compost Yard II, commenced on September 14th, 2015. Compost is produced using garden wastes received from the daily accumulation from the university premises.

Gliricidia maculate, Tithonia diversifolia (Mexican Sunflower), Crotalaria juncea (Sunn Hemp) has been planted within the area as a Nitrogen source, in order to maintain C:N ratio of the compost. These composts are now being used for the fruit and vegetable garden.

Title: naerobic Soil Disinfestation (ASD) to control soil borne plant pathogens for the first time in Sri Lanka

Name: Prof. R N Attanayake, Professor, Department of Plant & Molecular Biology, Faculty of Science

Type of Work: Research

Contribution Level: Global

Description: Prof. R. N. Attanayake who is attached to the Department of Plant and Molecular Biology of the Faculty of Science is involved in the project on Anaerobic Soil Disinfestation (ASD) to control soil borne plant pathogens for the first time in Sri Lanka. The project was funded by NSF, Sri Lanka. The project is directly related to the SDG goal 15- Life on land.

1. Corporate Information

1.1. Reporting Entity

The University of Kelaniya, situated at Dalugama, Kelaniya, Sri Lanka, is a fully government-owned higher educational Institute established under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and subsequent amendments to it. The University is functioning under the Ministry of Education.

1.2. Nature of Operations and Principal Activities of the University

The University consists of Seven Faculties: Faculty of Commerce and Management Studies, Faculty of Humanities, Faculty of Social Sciences, Faculty of Science, Faulty of Medicine, Faculty of Computing & Technology, and Faculty of Graduate Studies.

Its Vision is to become a Centre of excellence in creation and dissemination of knowledge for sustainable development. The main activities of the University are teaching, learning and promoting the research. The objectives of the University are as follows:

- To create high quality and flexible teaching and learning environment
- To develop the highest quality faculties and staff to attain the strategic goals of the University
- To create a multi-disciplinary research culture of global standing
- To improve the image of the University by widening the range of economic and social engagements
- To develop an excellent system of governance through the efficient and effective administration and financial management

1.3. Date of authorization of Financial Statements

The Financial Statements were authorized to issue by the Council of the University at its special council meeting, which were held on 23rd February 2022.

1.4. Responsibility for Financial Statements

The Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error. Components of Financial Statements are as follows:

- Statement of Financial Performance
- Statement of Financial Position
- · Statement of Changes in Net Assets/Equity
- · Cash Flow Statement
- · Statement of Comparison of Budget and Actual Amount
- Notes, Comprising a Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Other Explanatory Notes

1.5. Reporting period

The financial period of the University represents twelve months from 1st January 2021 to 31st December 2021.

2. Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

2.1. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statements of Changes in Net Assets / Equity, Cash Flow Statement, Statement of Comparison of Budget and Actual amount as well as Notes, Comprising A Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Other Explanatory Notes. These statements have been prepared in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) Volume I, II & III issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and adopted by the University Grants Commission by its Financial Circular Letter No. 2/2018. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those used in the previous financial year. However, Sri Lanka Accounting

Standards (LKAS) also have been used in the areas where no Public Sector Accounting Standards are available.

2.2. Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis and applied consistently. No adjustments have been made for inflationary factors affecting the Financial Statements except for the property, plant and equipment measured at fair value and retirement benefit obligations measured based on the actuarial valuation method. The specific policies are explained in the succeeding notes.

2.3. Going Concern

Financial Statements have been prepared on the assumption that University is a going concern. The Council has made an assessment of the University's ability to continue as a going concern in the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the Council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the University's ability to continue as a going concern. They do not intend either to liquidate or cease operations of the University. Therefore, the financial statements continue to be prepared on the going concern basis.

2.4. Accrual basis of Accounting

The Financial Statements, except for information on the Statement of Cash Flows, have been prepared following the accrual basis of accounting.

2.5. Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements have been presented in Sri Lankan Rupees (LKR), which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

2.6. Materiality and Aggregation

Each material class of similar items have been presented separately in the financial statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have been presented separately unless they are immaterial.

2.7. Comparative Information

Comparative information, including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information as relevant, is disclosed in respect of previous Financial Statements. The presentation and classification of the previous year's Financial Statements are amended, where relevant for better presentation and to be comparable with those of the current year.

2.8. Rounding

All financial information presented in Sri Lankan Rupees has been rounded to the nearest rupee except when otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.9. Offsetting

Assets and Liabilities or income and expenses are not offset unless required or permitted by Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.10. Transaction of foreign currencies and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where items are re-measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement.

3. Summary of significant Accounting Policies

3.1. Application of SLPSAS

The University has followed the SLPSAS when preparing and presenting financial statements of the University for the year 2021.

3.2. Changes in Accounting Policies

No significant changes in accounting policies taken place during the year under review.



3.3. Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

Preparation of the financial statements of the University requires the management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions, which may affect the income, expenditure, assets, liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets & contingent liabilities as at the end of the financial year.

3.4. Assets and Basis of their Valuation

3.4.1. Property, Plant & Equipment

The University applies the requirement of SLPSAS 07 on 'Property, Plant & Equipment' in accounting for its owned assets which are held for and used in the provision of the services or for administration purpose and expected to be used for more than one year. Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE) includes Lands, Buildings & Improvements, Office Furniture, Office Equipment, Lab & Teaching Equipment, Motor Vehicles, Water & Electricity Supply Scheme, Library Books and Periodicals, Cloaks, Machinery and Other Assets.

3.4.2. Basis of recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment is recognized if it is probable that future economic benefit associated with the assets will flow to the University and cost of the asset can be reliably measured.

3.4.3. Initial recognition

Property, Plant & Equipment are initially recognized at cost including the cost of purchase with any incidental expenses incurred in bringing the assets to its working conditions for its intended use, subsequent to initial recognition, property plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss.

3.4.4. Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing component of an item of property, plant & equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the University and its cost can be measured reliable. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized in accordance with the derecognition policy given below.

The costs of the repair and maintenance of property, plant & equipment are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred.

3.4.5. Derecognition

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant & equipment is derecognized on disposal; or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use. Any gains and losses on derecognition are recognized (calculated as the difference between the net disposals proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets) in the Statement of Profit or Loss. Gains are not classified as revenue.

3.4.6. Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight-line basis on each component of an item of property, Plant and Equipment other than freehold land. Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale and the date that the asset is de-recognized.

The assets residual values and useful life are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period, as assets carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and gain/(Loss) is recognized in the statements of comprehensive income.

3.4.8. Heritage Assets

The University of Kelaniya processes several Heritage Assets such as Historical Artefacts found during archeological excavation carried out by the Department of Archology, the Faculty of Social Sciences. A collection of old coins and books in the Main Library and a collection of ancient ola leaf manuscripts maintained by the Department of Library and Information Sciences.

3.4.9. Cost Model

After recognition all the Property Plant and equipment except the classes of Land are carried at its cost less accumulated depreciation. Lands are carried at its costs.

3.4.10. Revaluation Model

After initial recognition below classes of Property Plant and equipment (Lands, Buildings, Cloaks, Motor vehicles) whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, which is fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and

subsequent accumulated impairment losses. These classes of assets are revalued at a frequency of once in every five years.

Carrying value of property, plant & equipment and intangible assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment if any such indications exist, then the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds it recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the statement of financial performances.

3.4.11. Investments

Investments represent investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts. These investments have been accounted in compliance with SLFRS 09. The investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts have seen classified at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. They are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at fair value less amortized cost by using effective interest rate as required by SLFRS 09.

3.4.12. Staff Loans

The staff loans include Distress loan, Computer loan, Special Distress loan, Vehicle loan, Staff loan and Vice-Chancellor Fund loans. The staff loans have been classified as financial assets at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. Impairment loss in any staff loan have been recognized on expected cost method as stipulated in SLFRS 09.

3.4.13. Capital work-in-progress

Capital expenses incurred on PPE which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work – in – Progress and cost incurred on Capital Work – in – progress is transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment when it is available for use.

3.4.14. Intangible assets

Computer software and online journals have been recognized as intangible assets when it is probable that future economic benefits that are attributable to the assets will flow into the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets acquired are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. These costs are amortized over a period of 5 years.

3.4.15. Current assets

Current Assets classified in Statement of Financial Position are those which are expected to be realized in, or consumed in the University's normal operating cycle, expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date or cash or a cash equivalent.

3.4.16. Inventories

Inventories are stated at cost and determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis. Inventories mainly comprise of stationary and spare parts. Inventories are for consumption and not for resale.

3.4.17. Cash & cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand, demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash & cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term maturity of six months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statement is prepared based on the indirect method.

3.5. Accounting for government grants for capital expenditure

3.5.1. Recurrent grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis. Cost of rehabilitation of PPE and capital grants for construction and new work are recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary.

3.5.2. Contribution to capital outlay from outside grants

The value of Property Plant & Equipment purchased out of generated funds & various project funds were shown as "Contribution to Capital Outlay from outside Grants".

3.5.3. Capital grants

Government Grants for the Capital expenditure has presented in the Financial Statements in accordance with the LKAS 20 due to the absence of SLPSAS. According to the LKAS 20 Capital Grants has been recognized as deferred income in the statement of financial position and amortized over the useful life of the asset.

3.6. Internally restricted funds

Internally restricted funds include funds committed for specific purpose. Faculty Development funds represent the cumulative position of Faculties/Departments Funds with net unspent balances at the year end.

3.7. Endowment Fund

Endowment funds include restricted donations received by the University and investment returns generated from endowment funds which are used in accordance with the various purpose established by the donors.

3.8. Taxes

3.8.1. Income Tax

University is not liable to pay income tax on its income of the ordinary course of the business according to the prevailing tax regulations.

3.8.2. Value-Added Tax

University is exempted from paying Value Added Taxes according to the prevailing tax regulations.

3.8.3. Advanced Personal Income Tax (APIT)

The University currently remits APIT Tax deducted from monthly salaries of the employees who are liable for payment of income tax which is not a part of the University expenditure. Hence, payment of APIT tax is not accounted in the accounts of the University.

3.9. Employee Benefits

3.9.1. Definitions

3.9.1.1. Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognized for the amount expected to be paid if the University has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of the past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

3.9.1.2. Defined contribution plan

Employees are eligible for University Provident Fund (UPF) Contributions, Employees' Trust Fund (ETF), University pension fund and contributions are in line with the respective statues and regulations. The University of Kelaniya pays fixed contributions on basic emoluments plus cost-of-living allowances, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of employees to the University Provident Fund, Employees' Trust Fund and University pension fund and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. This obligation falls within the scope of the defined contribution plan SLPSA 19 on employment benefit. Obligation for contribution to defined contribution plan are recognized in profit or loss as the related service is provided.

3.9.1.3. Defined benefit obligation

In accordance with the Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, a liability arises for a defined benefit obligation to employees. Such defined benefit obligation is a post-employment benefit obligation falling within the scope of SLPSAS-19 on 'Employee Benefits'.

3.9.1.4. Measurement of defined benefit obligation

The liability recognized in the Statement of Financial Position is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the Projected Unit Credit method (PUC). Re-measurement of the defined benefit liability, which comprises actuarial gains and losses are recognized immediately in the Statement of Financial Performance. The University recognizes the increase in defined benefit liability attributable to the services provided by employees during the year (current service cost) in Statement of Financial Performance. The discount rate has been derived, and approximation of a long-term interest rate of 11.5% p.a. (2020 – 11.0%) has been used to discount future liabilities. The liability is not externally funded.

3.9.1.5. Accounting Estimate

The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions about discount rates, future salary increases and mortality rates. The complexity of the valuation, the underlying assumptions and its long-term nature, the defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.

3.10. Liabilities and Provisions

Current Liabilities

Current Liabilities are stated at their book value.

Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the University has a present obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligations and reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The provisions are shown under the accrued expenditure. The University arrives at an estimate on the basis of an evaluation of the most likely outcome. All known provisions have been accounted for in preparing these Financial Statements.

3.11. Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the programme or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainly does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the financial statement.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University. The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses it existence where inflow of economic benefits is probable but not virtually certain.

3.12. Revenue recognition

3.12.1. Income from fee levying courses

Income from fee levying courses and other activities are recognized on accrual basis over the period of course and degrees.

3.12.2. Finance Income

Interest income is recognized on accruing basis using effective interest rate method according to SLFRS 09 due to the absence of SLPSAS.

3.12.3. Expenditure Recognition

Expenses incurred in carrying out all activities of the University are recognized on an accrual and charged to the statement of Financial Performance.

3.12.4. Statement of cash flows

The cash flow statement has been prepared by the using the indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

4. Explanatory Notes

4.1 Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development Operation (AHEAD) Project

AHEAD (Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development) Operation is another World Bank funded project aimed at supporting higher education sector in the entire country from 2018 to 2023. The scope of this operation will be the higher education activities under the Ministry of Higher Education, the UGC, and the 15 universities, SLIATE, ATIs and non-state HEIs.

The Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS) at University is the apex unit at University Level to facilitate the project implementation, headed by a Director and other staff handling Finance, Procurement, Administration and Project Coordination. It is the responsibility of the project staff at the OTS, to coordinate, monitor and facilitate project execution. Finance operations of the project is handled by team headed by Director – Finance under the supervision of Director- OTS. The Operations and Monitoring Support Team (OMST) of the Ministry of Education, integrated

4.2 Science and Technology Human Resources Development Project

The Science and Technology Human Resource Development Project funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) supports the government to develop technology faculties in three universities viz. University of Kelaniya, Rajarata University of Sri Lanka and Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, and the Faculty of Engineering at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura to nurture a new breed of technology-oriented graduates equipped with market-relevant skills and entrepreneurial spirit.

The Faculty of Computing and Technology of the University of Kelaniya has been allocated a total sum of USD 29.2 Million under this project and a further sum of USD 10 Million is available for the four universities to be utilized under competitive proposal basis.

The Faculty of Computing and Technology will utilize the above funding to construct a building complex at the proposed Mudun Ela premises, procure books, software & equipment, train the staff, establish partnership programmes with reputed international universities and develop collaborative programmes with the industry.

The overall project is managed by the Project Management Unit (PMU) established under the Ministry of Education while the project coordination at the university level is handled by the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) headed by a Deputy Project Director. The responsibilities of the PIU includes monitoring and supervising construction of the faculty buildings and designing and implementing project activities, including procurement of goods and services, within the scope of the project to develop the faculty with assistance of the University Council/Senate and university academic staff. Finance operations of the project is handled by team headed by Director—Finance under the supervision of Deputy Project Director—PIU.

4.3 Pending legal cases as at 31st December 2021

District Court Gampaha Case No. 6411/M

District Court Colombo Case No. 3785/16/DMR

Filed by the University against a member of staff who acted in violation of the agreement he had entered in to with the University for the purpose of granting study and against the two sureties to the bond. The University is seeking to recover a sum of Rs.3,233,787.70 in this case.

District Court Colombo Case No. 2896/19

Filed by the University against a member of staff who had acted in violation of the agreement he had entered with the University for the purpose of granting study leave and against the two sureties to the bond. The University is seeking to recover a sum Rs.5,919,751.55 in this case.

District Court Colombo Case No. 2515/19

Filed by the University against a member of staff who had acted in violation of the agreement he had entered into with University for the purpose of granting study leave and against the two sureties to the bond. The University is seeking to recover a sum of Rs.8,472,381,49 in this case.

Since the budget and financial statements are prepared on accrual basis of accounting, need for reconciliation of budget and actual amounts does not arise. The budget covers the fiscal period from January 01 - December 31, 2021, and includes all Faculties, Centers, Divisions and Units of the University. Statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts are shown in separate annexure.

4.5 Bond Violators

A sum of LKR 174,823,340 has been due from 28th Bond violators as at 31st December 2022.

4.6 Mahapola Grants for the Students

A sum of Rs.162,077,605 has been paid to the students as Mahapola Grants during the year and all these payments directly had been done by the Mahapola Trust Fund.



Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ended 31 December 2021 in terms of the National Audit Act No.19 of 2018

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the University of Kelaniya for the year ended 31 December 2021 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2021 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with the provision of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the annual report of the University in terms of sub-section 108 (1) of the University Act, appear in this report. My report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(6) of the Constitution will be tabled in due course. In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the basis for qualified opinion section of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University as at 31 December 2021 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for Qualified Opinion

- (a) Since useful lifetime of the non-current assets had not been reviewed annually in terms of Paragraph 65 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07, property, plant and equipment costed for Rs.1,582,224,300 and library books and graduation cloaks costed for Rs.293,815,186 were further in use despite being fully depreciated. As such, action had not been taken to revise the said estimated error in terms of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03.
- (b) Capital grants of Rs.140,000,000 received during the year under review had not been identified and measured in the financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 11.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

1.3 Other information included in the University's 2021 Annual Report.

The other information comprises the information included in the University's 2021 Annual Report but does not include in the financial statements and my auditor's report thereon, which I have obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report. Management is responsible for the other information.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not express any form of assurance or conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information identified above and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If based on the work I have performed on the other information that I have obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

1.4 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal

control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements

that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the University's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intend to liquidate the University or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the University's financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University of Kelaniya is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the University.

1.5 Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

 Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and

obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing
 an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

- 2.1 National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 includes specific provisions for following requirements.
- 2.1.1 Except for the effects of the matters described in the basis for qualified opinion section of my report, I have obtained all the information and explanation that required for the audit and as far as appears from my examination, proper accounting records have been kept by the University as per the requirement of section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

- 2.1.2 The financial statements presented is consistent with the preceding year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.1.3 Except for the observation made under section (a) in the basis for the qualified opinion of my report, the financial statements presented includes all the recommendations made by me in the previous year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.2 Based on the procedures performed and evidence obtained were limited to matters that are material, nothing has come to my attention to make the following statements.
- 2.2.1 to state that any member of the governing body of the University has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the University which are out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018;
- 2.2.2 to state that the University has not complied with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the University as per the requirement of section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 except for;

2.2.4 to state that the resource of the University has not procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.3 Other Matters

- (a) Although provision of Rs. 7,714,000 had been made to conduct 25 research activities in the year 2021, due to the fact that 14 research projects had not been started, a provision of Rs. 6,489,479 could not be utilized. Although Rs. 737,403 had been granted for 06 research works which should be started in 2018 and should be completed by 2021, extensions of time had been obtained without completing those researches till 31 December 2021. Although progress reports should have been submitted in every 6 months during the period of research, there were also 04 research activities which were not done in that way.
- (b) Although a total interest income of Rs. 11,286,893 was earned as of 31 December 2021 by investing funds in 53 scholarships, prizes and other funds, it was not spent for the intendent purposes for which the funds were established.
- (c) 196 cheques amounting to Rs. 2,628,608 issued to various creditors were cancelled during the period from 2018 to 2021 but action had not been taken to settle those till 31 December 2021.
- (d) Action had not been taken to dispose 187 consumer items with a cost of Rs. 4,204,684 which were identified as obsolete and damaged, related to the period from 2012 to 2021, by the board of survey report in the year 2021. Also, 446 stock items costing to Rs.4,013,155 remained as slow moving and non-moving items due to purchases were made without identifying the requirement. Further, cost of 179 stock items which were remained as excess stock amounting to Rs.1,108,577 had not been taken in to the books and action had not been taken in terms of Financial Regulation 3 regarding 91 shortage stock items costed of Rs.970,236.

The Committee met four times in the year under review and the internal and external audit reports were discussed at these meetings. The Committee reports were submitted to the University Council for information and necessary actions.

Activities within the year.

The Committee was engaged in the following activities within the year under review.

1. Approval and Supervision of the annual internal audit plans and programmes.

The Committee approved and supervised the internal audit plan and programme for the year 2021. The Committee reviewed and supervised the effectiveness and performance of the internal audits, audit queries and the performance of the Internal Audit Division.

2. Compliance with Laws and Regulations

The compliance with the relevant laws and regulations were reviewed with the reports submitted by the external and internal auditors. Reminders had been sent for 04 persons who had dues, informing them to pay the installments on time.

4. Review and strengthening of the internal control system.

Necessary recommendations had been made on the control of Fixed Assets, regulating the expenditure for contractual activities, lending library books, annual board of survey of stores/survey of fixed assets, recovering the unsettled advances, settling the unrecognized and settled loan balances and strengthening the internal controls. Further Committee continuously reviewed the action taken to correct the weaknesses pointed out by the Auditor General's Report and the Audit Queries issued during the year 2021.

5. Audit Committee Meetings

The Audit Committee meetings were held at four occasions within the year ended as at 31st December 2021. All the Audit Committee members actively participated in all the Committees. A representative from the Auditor General's Department participated at every meeting of the Audit Committee as an observer. Other staff members from the University were also invited when required. The secretary to the Audit Committee is Senior Assistant Internal Auditor.

The Committee was satisfied with the success of the follow up activities based on the recommendations on the matters considered by the Committee in the year 2021.

(i) Deficient stocks

15 deficient items can be seen in the stores of the faculty of medicine. Most of them exist due to the reason that issuance of other goods that have a similar price as of the deficient items. A special attention will be drawn to this in the future and necessary steps will be taken.

(ii) Slow moving stocks

Relevant divisions are informed, and necessary steps will be taken to issue them immediately paying a special attention.

(iii) Unissued stocks

Most of the unissued stocks of the faculty of the medicine are toners. Toners that were obtained for the changes in printing machines, remain unissued. Further, there are goods that are not in use anymore. Relevant divisions are informed regarding this, and future steps have been already taken.

(iv) Damaged and expired stocks

Most of the damaged and expired stocks belong to expiring. Other division that are in need of them are informed, and necessary steps have been already taken to removal.

(v) Excessive stocks

The reported excessive stocks are the goods that were requested by many divisions and that were delayed to take over after the issuance. Excessive stocks occur due to the reason that they are added again to the existing stocks. Steps have been taken to match these stocks with store stock book balance.
